Taliban attack parliament

Six gunmen killed in two hours' fight

A Taliban suicide bomber and six gunmen attacked the Afghan parliament yesterday as lawmakers met to consider a new defence minister, and another district in the volatile north fell to the militants as they intensified a summer offensive.

The brazen assault on the symbolic centre of power, along with territorial gains elsewhere, highlight how NATOtrained Afghan security forces are struggling to cope with worsening militant violence.

Fighting has spiralled since the departure of most foreign forces from Afghanistan at the end of last year. The insurgents are pushing to take territory more than 13 years after U.S.-led military intervention toppled them from power.

Monday's attack began as lawmakers met with the new acting defence minister, Masoom Stanikzai. He is the third candidate so far for the key security post, and his appointment must be confirmed by parliament.

Oil cleanup efforts on

Spillage spreads, seen in Halda river too

Three days into the oil spill from sunken train wagons in a Boalkhali canal, the local authorities yesterday put an oil-boom in the water body to collect oil slick.

The oil-boom (floating barrier) was being handled manually due to heavy currents in the canal, locals said.

Meanwhile, the oil slick has spread about five to six kilometres inside the Halda river, about 10-km upstream from the accident spot.

A furnace oil-carrying train derailed and three of its wagons plunged into the canal on Friday.

Staff of Chittagong Port Authority

(CPA) put the barrier in place after hours of hectic pursuit.

During low tides, the height of the barrier was being maintained with rope swings tied to a bridge in the military pole area.

Captain Nazmul Alam, chief conservator of CPA, said a floating barrier is used in water bodies where the flow is low.

"As the canal has a high flow of water, our men are maintaining its height manually and trying to stop oil from spreading," he added.

Four vessels equipped with oil extraction equipments explored the Karnaphuli in last two days, but didn't find any oil slick, said Nazmul.

Fisherman Mansur, who depends on the Halda for his livelihood, yesterday said he found oil layers on riverside plants.

"Locals noticed a layer of oil in the Halda at Modunaghat area, some six km off the Karnaphuli, and informed me," said Manzoorul Kibria, associate professor of zoology at Chittagong University.

The Halda is a major breeding ground for sweet water carps in the country, he said, adding that the oil slick might damage its biodiversity and cause irreparable damage to vari-

Robber killed in 'gunfight' with police

during a gunfight with police in Magura Sadar Upazila early yesterday.

"We came to know this morning that my brother was killed during a gunfight with police," the victim's brother Majba Uddin said yesterday.



Indigenous boy killed in clash

An indigenous boy was killed and five others injured in a clash over a land dispute at Akbarpur village of Potnitala upazila in Naogaon yesterday.

The boy was identified as, Mithu Oraon, 12, son of Sonu Orao of Akbarpur village under Potnitala upazila in Naogaon. Police said the clash was a result of a dispute between one

Abdul Matin and some indigenous families over a khas land at Akbarpur village. Abdul Matin and his men went to the khas land - a pond

over one acre - at Akbarpur at around 9:00 am. Armed with sharp weapons, bamboo sticks and a gun to force grab the land, they attacked the people of indigenous community who opposed it. Abdul Matin opened fire from his licensed gun, leaving Mithu Oraon dead on the spot. At least five others were also injured.
