However, despite the heavy defeat, the fact remains that Bangladesh have achieved a number of things in this series for the first time. It was, no doubt, a landmark series for the Tigers and the numbers go on to prove that.

For starters, left-arm pacer Mustafizur Rahman achieved a number of records in this series. He scalped 13 wickets in the three-match ODI series. By doing so, he equalled Ryan Harris's record for the most number of wickets in a three-match series. But he does however hold the record of getting the most number of wickets by any bowler in their first three ODIs.

Mashrafe Bin Mortaza might not have had a good time on the field yesterday. He went away for 76 runs in his 10 overs and was hit for quite a few boundaries. His economy rate of 7.60 was very unlike him. However, the three wickets that he took helped him overtake slow left-armer Mohammad Rafique as the Bangladeshi with the highest number of wickets against India. It's a record though that is not likely to last very long. Mustafizur already has 13 wickets against them, while Shakib Al Hasan has 17.

The series might have been a disappointment for slow left-armer Shakib who ended the series with just three wickets. He needed two more to become the second Bangladeshi bowler, after Abdur Razzak to take 200 wickets in ODIs.

Bangladesh. Bangladesh's pacers have scalped 21 wickets in this series, which is their highest ever in a bilateral competition. It overtook the 20 wickets taken by pacers back in 2009 in a five-match ODI series against Zimbabwe. On the flipside, Arafat Sunny, who was the highest

wicket-taker for Bangladesh in the last series against Pakistan, got a rude awakening in his first match of the India series yesterday as he was taken away for 42 runs in six overs. Thirteen matches into his ODI career, this is his worst bowling effort in terms of economy rate.

Taskin may miss SA series

Taskin Ahmed missed the third and final ODI against India yesterday due to side strain and the bad news for the right-arm paceman was that he might not recover in time for selection for next month's series against South Africa.

The final assessment on his injury will however take place today, but initial assessments suggested a three-week recovery time.

The Proteas arrive here on June 30 to play two T20 Internationals, three ODIs and two Tests. The first phase of the series will include the limited-overs matches. The T20Is take place on July 5 and 7, whereas the three ODIs will be played on July 10, 12 and 15. As a result Taskin will barely have two weeks to get ready for the South Africa series.

The Tigers will enjoy a four-day break from today and then get back to business to prepare for the South Africa series.




India's captain cool came under heavy criticism after his side surrendered quite meekly in the first two matches against Bangladesh. In the third and final ODI yesterday, though, Mahendra Singh Dhoni sort of took things into his own hands after coming in to bat at number four in the

20th over following the departure of Virat Kohli. The number four position, where Dhoni batted only 20 times in his 265-match career so far, has been his best yielding him an average of 68, which is a staggering 16 better than his career average. The 33-year-old skipper got enough time to get himself in and then unleashed a wide range of strokes on way to crafting a 77-ball 69, including six fours and a six. It wasn't the best of Dhoni's knocks, but it did ensure India 317 runs on the board, their best in this series by a long way.

'The loss is a lesson'

At the end of the day, both the team management and the fans will readily acclaim the 2-1 series victory. After all, none of the players had spoken of a series-win prior to the start

of the tour. However, one can't overlook the fact

that the Tigers were presented with an opportunity to create something even more special yesterday. The Indians had their backs against the wall. They were clearly under pressure and this would have been the best possible time to complete a flawless victory. Yes, India did score a total past 300.

But with seven batsmen on a good batting track and an Indian attack that lacked confidence, the target was reachable. After the match, Mashrafe Bin

Mortaza did say that they had achieved far more than what they had expected, however, he did admit that the Tigers weren't at their best on the field yesterday.

"I think there was more pressure on the last match than before the series. Whenever we win one match, there are chants of a Banglawash and that does put a bit more pressure on the players.

"So yes, the body language wasn't at the top of the mark. We couldn't get breakthroughs, neither could we form partnerships. But we have to learn from these aspects. On the whole we weren't too far away, but we weren't at our best either," said Mashrafe.

While the bowlers won Bangladesh the first two matches, they had a rare failure yesterday. Despite the 300-plus score in the first match, it would be fair to say that the batsman could have done much better. None of them for instance converted their good starts into three figures, something that they had managed to do against Pakistan in the last series.

"There were many batsmen who couldn't score despite making starts. Yesterday everyone did mistakes. Right from batsman number two to number seven, there were scores of 25, 30 and

40. We needed a 60 or 80.

"Until the 35th over, we were ahead of India in terms of runs. But it was the wickets column that was a concern. That put us on the backfoot and it was a big mistake on our part. Hopefully we can learn from this and do better next time," explained Mashrafe.

Among the seniors, Mushfiqur Rahim is one player who had a disappointing run. When asked if there the wicketkeeper-batsman was going through a tough time Mashrafe said, " don't think he is going through any trouble mentally. But maybe its difficult when you expect something from a player all the time. He is bound to go through a bad patch.

"If you ask me if I am concerned about his focus, I'll tell you that I am sometimes worried that he is overfocused. Sometimes it's good to stay away from cricket. There's no chance of him being less focused. I think cricket dominates his life. He is an amazing batsman and he will come back," added Mashrafe.
