India series Sanga's last

Sri Lanka's batting great Kumar Sangakkara on Saturday ended speculation about his future, saying he will retire during the home series against India in August.

"This is my time to call it a day," Sangakkara, 37, told reporters on the sidelines of the second Test against Pakistan.

The left-hander said he will play two of the three Tests against India that will take place in Sri Lanka in August. He also said he will skip the third and final Test of the ongoing series against Pakistan.

"I wanted to retire after the World Cup, but was requested by the selectors to stay on," he said. "I agreed to play four more Tests. I will honour that agreement."


"I don't want to extend my career for individual records. This is the time to go.

"I am going to miss playing for Sri Lanka a lot," he said. "I had the time of my life playing for Sri Lanka. I enjoyed playing every format but donning whites for Sri Lanka has been special. "I can walk away happy

that good days outweigh the disappointments."

Sangakkara dismissed the idea of becoming a coach after retirement with a laugh saying he would "make a bad coach".

"I don't know if I will have the patience for that," he added.

U-19s off to South Africa

The Bangladesh under-19 cricket team left here for Durban early today to play a seven-match one-day series against South

Africa. The two teams have already played a series this year. Reigning world champions South Africa had come to Bangladesh in April to play seven one-dayers, a series which Bangladesh won 6-1. With the U-19 World Cup due to

take place in Bangladesh in January next year, the Bangladesh Cricket Board is making an attempt to host as many matches as possible for the junior national team.

Speaking to reporters at the Shere-Bangla National Stadium yesterday, Bangladesh U-19 captain, Mehidy Hassan Miraz said, "It will be a very good tour for our World Cup preparations. Since the start of June we have been practising very hard for this tour. There will be plenty of challenges there with regards to the conditions and the weather over there.

"The captain will need to be a bit more upfront from now on since the rules don't force him to make field changes. He will have to be a bit more imaginative from now on. "It will definitely help the bowlers though. It will give

them a bit more of a breathing space," he added. Bangladesh skipper Mashrafe Bin Mortaza echoed Hathurusingha's sentiments and believed that his side would be able to get used to the rules by the time the South

Africa series began. "It's all about adjustment really. It's not as though it's one rule for us and another for them. It's the same for both sides, so we need to adjust as soon as possible," he said.

Bangladesh's bowling coach and former Zimbabwe bowler Heath Streak appreciated the changes made by the ICC and believed that it would make the bowlers a lot more happy.

"The bowlers will obviously enjoy it. The batsmen will have to adapt a little bit on those phases. The extra man out in the last ten overs will inhibit the boundary hitting. But I think for us it will be fine," said Streak.

"It's good that the ICC is giving the bowlers a bit of a chance. If you look at the England-New Zealand series, the matches were played on flat wickets and it was a really big challenge for the bowlers to contain the batsmen. The new rules will make it a bit more challenging for the batsmen," he added.

Pakistan hit back

Pakistan's batsmen bounced back after the first innings debacle to throw open the second Test against Sri Lanka at the P Sara Oval in Colombo on Thursday. The tourists, who conceded a lead of

177 runs after being dismissed for 138 in the first innings, closed the third day's play at 171 for two in their second knock. When bad light halted play an hour

early, Pakistan trailed by just six runs with eight wickets in hand, promising a keen tussle between bat and ball over the next two days. Sri Lanka, looking for a series-levelling

win after losing the first Test in Galle, removed Mohammad Hafeez cheaply for eight before lunch, caught in the slips by Kumar Sangakkara off Angelo Mathews.

Opener Ahmed Shehzad hit 69 during a second-wicket stand of 120 with Azhar Ali, the pair batting through the post-lunch session to defy the Sri Lankan bowlers.

Shehzad was dismissed off the first ball after tea, top-edging a hook off Dhammika Prasad, but Younis Khan joined Azhar to

put on 42 for the unbroken third wicket.

Azhar was unbeaten on 64 and Younis, determined to make his 100th match special after falling for six in the first innings, closed the day on a watchful 23.

Sri Lanka, who began at their overnight score of 304-9 after a delayed start due to bad weather, were dismissed for 315 in their first innings in reply to Pakistan's 138.

Yasir had claimed seven wickets in Sri Lanka's second innings in Galle to fashion Pakistan's 10-wicket victory.

Sri Lanka were dealt a scare in the field when Chameera, the debutant seamer, went off the field in the morning session after sending down just nine deliveries. But he returned after lunch to bowl seven more overs and conceded 28 runs without any success.

Drone over Wimbledon preparations

Police have seized a drone which was flown over Wimbledon as some of the world's top players warmed up for the Grand Slam in south-west London.

Officers are investigating the incident after being alerted to a man flying a drone over the All England Club from a nearby golf course on Saturday morning.

Roger Federer, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal, Serena Williams and Maria Sharapova were among the top stars on site on Saturday as they hone their games ahead of Monday's opening matches.

Inspector Roger Robinson of Merton police said: "It is an offence to fly a drone within 50 metres of a structure. Anyone intending to fly a drone should give prior consideration to the surrounding landscape and any structures or venues.

"While it is not our intention to prevent people from enjoying the use of drones, it is important that regulations are adhered to. Police will take positive action against anyone committing an offence."

Drones have become a security concern at major sporting events since October when a Euro 2016 qualifier between Serbia and Albania ended with the match abandoned after a drone carrying a political banner was flown into the stadium.

'It may be different for SA'

The ploy of using four pacers against India worked well for Bangladesh. While the Indian team manage-

ment claimed not to be surprised by the hosts' strategy, their batsmen found it difficult to manoeuvre their way against the likes of Taskin Ahmed and Mustafizur Rahman.

While the strategy did work against India, Bangladesh all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan however, reckoned that the Tigers might use a completely different strategy against South Africa next month.

In an interview with Wisden India, published on June 26, Shakib said, "We attacked against India with four seamers, but against South Africa, I think it might be the opposite. You never know, we might end up playing with four seamers as well, but we may change our plans."

"I still believe South Africa are the favourites because they have a better bowling attack. It will be an even contest, but we need to adjust our

plans," he added.

Shakib of course, wasn't the only player who hinted at the possibility of enforcing a different strategy against the South Africans. At the end of the series, skipper Mashrafe Bin Mortaza was asked as to why Jubair Hossain was included into the side as a late replacement for Taskin Ahmed and not included in the starting eleven of the third ODI.

To that Mashrafe replied, saying the leg-spinner was brought in to help him get used to the atmosphere of the national team since he might get a chance to play against South Africa.

Whether the hosts are going to depend on their spinners a bit more as compared to the India series is a question that will only be answered once the entire team gets together. As of now, the players and the members of the team management are enjoying their break and will only be back on June 29 -- the first day of the camp.

In the past though, the visitors have depended more upon their spinners against South Africa. Bangladesh have never managed to bowl South Africa out at home. In the six matches that they played against them, 15 wickets were taken by spinners, whereas the pacers managed to take only six.

Regardless of the strategies, Shakib said that the team was looking forward to facing South Africa.

"The way we are playing, especially in ODIs at home, we can beat any side on our day. And I think we showed the world and ourselves how much of an improved side we are now in ODIs."

Smith rejected England
