Dhaka University campus yesterday was in a festive mood and abuzz with its current and former students celebrating their association with the 94-year-old institution.

Despite summer vacation and the ongoing month of Ramadan, students in colourful attire thronged the campus to celebrate Dhaka University Day.

The celebration kicked off in the morning at Mall Chattar where students gathered with banners and festoons and with an orchestra. Prime Minister's International Affairs Adviser Dr Gowher Rizvi inaugurated the programme by hoisting the national and university flags, and releasing pigeons.

He urged DU students to prepare themselves with the power of knowledge to get succeeded in global competitions.

In a message, DU VC Prof AAMS Arefin Siddique said the university has

a history of producing brilliant students who later took leadership and played vital roles in every possible sector at home and abroad.

The VC led a colourful procession which paraded through the campus and ended at Teacher-Student Centre (TSC) where a discussion on this year's theme "Higher Education and Sustainable Development" was held.

Bangladesh attends CICA forum

Six admit to killing man in capital

Detectives yesterday arrested six persons involved in killing and mugging incidents in the capital.

They also recovered a pistol, three bullets, a motorbike and 300 Yaba pills from Md Omor Faruk alias Al Amin, Pabitra Samaddar, Md Rakib, Zahirul Islam alias Zakir, Rifat Hossain and Zakir Hossain in Badda.

During primary investigation, the six admitted that they shot Selim Akhtar, 30, an accountant of Distribution Ltd, in Moghbazar and snatched away Tk 33.27 lakh from him on May 24.

Govt team starts archeological site protection work

A 10-member team created jointly by the cultural ministry and the Department of Archeology started working yesterday to mark property zone (core zone) and buffer zone of the country's protected archeological sites.

The team was created to protect the sites with an aim to have them enlisted as Unesco World Heritage Sites, says a cultural affairs ministry press release. The team led by the director general of the Department of Archeology includes archeologists from the country and abroad, and officials of Unesco, and the International Council on Monuments and Sites. Cultural Minister Asaduzzaman Noor inaugurated the first zone marking task of the team at Comilla's Lalmai Mainamati Shalbon Bihar yesterday. Property zone is the main area of an archeological site, where no structure can be built without special reasons. The buffer zone is a specific portion outside the property zone used for managing the site, where no structures can be built that can damage the site.

Local staff of icddr,b to continue demos for salary hike

Staff Welfare Association (SWA) of icddr,b yesterday announced that they would continue demonstrations demanding salary hike and other privileges.

"We will demonstrate tomorrow (Thursday) to restrict entry of the chief operations officer who is a foreigner and whose recruitment was totally unnecessary," said SWA General Secretary Dr Firoz Ahmed.

SWA yesterday held a meeting with the management of the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease Research, Bangladesh (icddr,b) on the invitation of the latter to address the demands.

"There was no outcome of the meeting. Another meeting was scheduled for Sunday," said Dr Firoz.

SWA has been demonstrating for the last few days demanding cancellation of a contract through which 40,500 square feet of its space was leased out to Brac at a "throwaway price" for 49 years and stopping recruiting foreign staff to posts not related to science.

They also demanded that the icddr,b cut down food costs at its canteen and monthly transport costs and provide festival bonus and increase the retirement age.

They demand that the copyright of the Journal of Health, Population and Nutrition of icddr,b be bought back from a UK company.

Senior Communications Manager at icddr,b Nasmeen Ahmed said the management would hold Sunday's meeting to further discuss and address the issues raised by SWA.

Rizvi of BNP gets bail

The High Court yesterday granted ad-interim bail to BNP leader Ruhul Kabir Rizvi Ahmed in four vandalism and arson cases.

The HC passed the order after hearing four separate petitions filed by the accused.

Rizvi, however, cannot get released from jail as he is accused in eight other cases, his lawyer Sagir Hossain Leon told The Daily Star.

He said the four cases were filed with Mirpur and Pallabi Police Stations on different days in January.

It cannot be thought in case of FCI that any unpaid overtime will be done here or any worker is forced to work. Actually, without any reason or any prior information yesterday at about 7:00am some undisciplined workers suddenly stop their works and attacked our three officers. This undisciplined workers vandalized machines, C.C. Camera, Computer and office furniture."

The story however mentioned that The Daily Star could not reach FCI (BD) authorities despite repeated attempts.

along with the Pakistan army men had launched massacres in different areas of Raozan under Chittagong in 1971.

Several eyewitnesses have testified about the atrocities he had committed [in 1971] and therefore, he (Salauddin) deserves the death penalty," said Mahbubey Alam, as he completed his submission yesterday.

He, however, said if necessary, he may place further submission after defence arguments.

The four charges for which Salauddin was given the capital punishment are: involvement in two acts of genocide; killing of Nutan Chandra Singh; and murder of Awami League leader Mozaffar Ahmed and his son in Raozan.
