Both the kidneys of Md Ali Hossain, 17, who passed the SSC examinations this year, have been damaged. He was diagnosed with the problem last month at Mymensingh Medical College Hospital where he is undergoing treatment. Four BNP leaders get bail in 56 cases

The High Court yesterday granted anticipatory bail to BNP leaders MK Anwar, Tariqul Islam, Abdul Awal Mintoo and Amanullah Aman in 56 arson and vandalism cases. BNP's standing committee members Anwar and Tariqul got bail in nine and four cases respectively while party chief Khaleda Zia's adviser Mintoo obtained bail in one case and BNP's Joint Secretary General Aman in 42 cases, their lawyer AKM Ehsanur Rahman told The Daily Star. The HC granted the bail for four weeks after the BNP leaders appeared before it with separate bail petitions. The HC granted them bail on the ground that there was no specific allegation against them of vandalism and arson attacks, Ehsan said. All the cases were filed in and around Dhaka during the blockade and hartals enforced by BNP-led 20-party alliance this year. Meanwhile, the Appellate Division yesterday upheld the HC orders that granted ad-interim bail to BNP leaders Ruhul Kabir Rizvi Ahmed and Gayeshwar Chandra Roy in similar five cases following petitions filed by the government against the HC orders. The apex court passed "no order" on the government petitions, meaning that their bails will remain in force.

Taps run dry in Kazipara of Dhaka for 2 months

Over 1,000 families living in North and East Kazipara in the capital have been facing a severe water crisis for about two months. According to residents and officials of Dhaka Wasa, the main reason behind the crisis is ongoing work to replace old water pipelines. Locals said some of them have not been receiving even a drop of water in the last two months, while others are getting very dirty water which is unusable. AKM Shahid Uddin, director of Dhaka Wasa's water supply sector development project, said they will set up new pipelines with a total length of 54km, adding that out of the total length, they have already set up 12km pipelines. He said when setting up the new pipelines, some existing ones in Road-6 of North Kazipara were damaged which were repaired later. Shahid Uddin said the problem was temporary and they are working at top speed to set up the pipelines and start supplying water as usual. He added that they have already started supplying water through the new lines set up. Like many other residents, Morsheda has to regularly get five buckets of water every day from trucks of Wasa which have been providing water to the residents on a temporary basis. The trucks are parked on the main road and they supply water through pipes that branch off to smaller roads, bringing the water closer to households. She said it takes about 20 minutes for her to go and get one bucket of water and she has to do this five times a day along with other household chores. Tarabanu, a nine-year-old domestic worker, said carrying buckets of water every day is a huge chore for her. Mohammad Rezaul Karim, another resident of the area, said recently they brought out a short procession demanding supply of water, but had to disperse after the local police intervened. He said afterwards some people started getting water but it was dirty and unusable. Md Polash, owner of a two-storey building in East Kazipara, said although Wasa is also providing free water in tanks, it takes two to three days for a household to get a tank of water after applying for it. He said Wasa gives around 50 tanks of water every day.

German envoy advises long term urban planning

German Ambassador in Dhaka Dr Thomas Prinz yesterday called for a sophisticated and long-term urban planning based on reliable data for it is essential to manage the inflow of people into Bangladesh's metropolis. "Urbanisation is one of the megatrends of this century. More and more people are moving to cities searching for job opportunities or adjusting to the impacts of climate change in rural Bangladesh," he said. "Dhaka is one of the fastest growing cities in the world," he added while visiting the capital's Geological Survey of Bangladesh (GSB) which conducts systematic geological mapping and geoscientific activities. GSB is supported by German development cooperation funds provided by Bundesanstalt für Geowissenschaften und Rohstoffe (BGR) or the Federal Institute for Geosciences and Natural Resources based in Hanover, says a German embassy press release. Initiated in 2013, the joint German-Bangladeshi project, "Geo-Information for Urban Planning", is scheduled to be finalised in 2016. So far, the geoscientific sub-ground conditions in Bangladesh have been analysed and currently work is centred around an "Infrastructure Suitability Map" of Dhaka that will help transform the capital into a more sustainable, accessible and liveable city.

SC defers Bangladesh Bar Council election to August 26

The Supreme Court yesterday deferred the Bangladesh Bar Council election to August 26 following a petition filed the authorities seeking more time to update the voter list. It also asked the authorities to publish the voter list by July 30. Earlier on May 28, the SC fixed August 13 for holding the election and asked to publish voter list by July 12. But the authorities said they would not be able to do so by that time since they could not collect the names of all voters.

Ctg man to die for killing wife

A Chittagong court yesterday sentenced a man to death for killing his wife over dowry in 2008. The convict, Md Anwar Hossain Sujon, 30, of Battery Goli in Chittagong, is in jail. According to the prosecution, Anwar often tortured his wife Khaleda Akhter for a Tk 1 lakh dowry. On April 20, 2008 Anwar strangled Khaleda and then hung her body from the ceiling of a room in their house after an argument over the money. On May 5 of the same year, Khaleda's sister Jahanara Begum filed a case against him.

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way political," he said. However, he hoped that Khaleda would visit Saudi Arabia to perform Umrah in a convenient time this Ramadan or after Eid-ul-Fitr. On Wednesday night, several senior BNP leaders confirmed to the media that Khaleda postponed the visit as her elder son Tarique Rahman did not get him visa for Saudi from London, but some others said the BNP chief cancelled it as she heard that the government might hatch out a conspiracy over party acting secretary general Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir's bail. But both sides confirmed to the newspaper that Khaleda cancelled the tour after talking with Tarique. Earlier, BNP insiders said she was supposed to hold a series of meetings with Tarique in Saudi Arabia during the trip. At yesterday's press conference, Ripon also said, "Like previous years, Khaleda Zia was invited by the Saudi government this year for performing Umrah as she used to do it every Ramadan." "But our party chief was not feeling well physically from the beginning of Ramadan. For that reason she might have cancelled the visit," said Ripon, also the party's foreign affairs secretary. Ripon, however, told reporters that the BNP chief was not interested in performing Umrah as most party leaders were now in jail. He also criticised the media for reporting that Tarique did not get a Saudi Arabian visa in London. Ripon said some media also reported that the validity of the invitation by the Saudi government expired. It is not true; she can visit Saudi Arabia anytime to perform Umrah, he added.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE Hearing cases at special, family courts urged

Prothom Alo, Plan International Bangladesh hold talks on enforcement, effectiveness and implementation

Cases filed under the Domestic Violence (Prevention and Protection) Act, 2000 should be tried either at special courts or under family courts, speakers told a discussion yesterday. "The environment of criminal courts is not conducive for such cases," said Towhida Khondoker, director, Legal Services, Bangladesh National Women Lawyers Association (BNWLA). She was giving a presentation on the act's enforcement, effectiveness and implementation, which was the discussion's topic. Bangla daily Prothom Alo organised it at its office in the capital in association with Plan International Bangladesh. The law's main objective is not just to punish, rather prevent domestic violence by keeping the family relationship intact, explained BNWLA Executive Director Salma Ali. Sabbir Mahamud Chowdhury, a senior assistant judge of Dhaka, agreed, saying that when these cases were tried in magistrate courts, a "war-like" sense prevailed among the parties. "Rather we should think how the problems could be solved through arbitration," he said. "Women often do not want to avail legal service in fear of social stigma and threat of divorce," said Humaira Aziz, director of Women and Girl's Empowerment Programme of Care Bangladesh, emphasising counselling of men to change their attitude. Making counselling available for couples was also suggested by Prof Shahnaz Huda, former chairman of Dhaka University's law department, and Abul Hossain, project director, multi-sectoral programme on violence against women, Ministry of Women and Children Affairs. The law does not clearly state anything about arbitration though 60 percent of the victims want a solution through it, said Towhida, adding that even many lawyers, ignoring the sensitive nature of these cases, conducted those like general criminal cases. She also noted the scarcity of shelter homes and lack of female officials at the government's upazila women affairs offices. Gourango Chandro Mondol, one such officer from Balaganj, Sylhet, spoke of the lack of personnel and funds to recover assets when dealing with such cases. "The rules of the law also do not specify where the goods will be kept after recovery," he said, sharing his experience of facing resistance from defendants during such drives. Syeda Shirin Akter, panel lawyer of Protecting Human Rights (PHR) programme, urged for training and sensitising all stakeholders involved including police, the ministry's officials, lawyers, court magistrates and NGO officials on the law. PHR is a five-year domestic violence prevention and protection project launched in 2011 in 102 unions of eight upazilas of 6 districts by Plan International Bangladesh in partnership with BNWLA and 12 other NGOs. Malik Abdullah Al-Amin, senior district judge and director of National Legal Aid Services Organisation, talked about how the organisation's budgetary allocation increased to Tk 6 crore last year and about its services for the poor.
