FAKHRUL'S CONDITION SC now asks for 'complete' medical report

The Supreme Court yesterday ordered Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University authorities to form a new board to examine BNP acting secretary general Mirza Fakhru Islam Alamgir's health and submit a "complete" medical report before it on July 12.

The five-member board of BSMMU will have to submit the report by 3:00pm on that day, said a four-member bench of the Appellate Division headed by Chief Justice Surendra Kumar Sinha.

The apex court also fixed July 13 for passing order on the government petitions against the High Court orders that had granted bail to Fakhru in three vandalism and arson cases.

The SC had ordered to form the fresh medical board, as Fakhru's lawyers raised questions over the report submitted by a three-member medical board of the BSMMU on Wednesday. The report said that Fakhru's heart condition was stable.

Fakhru's lawyer Khandaker Mahbub Hossain told the SC that the BNP leader had been suffering mainly from neurological problems, but the BSMMU medical board had prepared the report on his heart condition.

He prayed to the SC to order the BSMMU authorities to thoroughly examine Fakhru's health and submit a

It was a depressing day for Prabhati Rani, an eight-year-old girl.

She was crying putting her arms around her grandmother, requesting her not to fill up the form to become an Indian national.

"Grandmother please don't fill up the form, please don't," Prabhati appealed. But Minoti, the 56-year grandmother, who was also in tears, could not help filling the form Thursday afternoon.

Minoti has been living in the Indian enclave Gotamari which is located in Hatibandha upazila. Her daughter Suchitra Rani was married off to Ashis Kumar Roy whose house is in Sindurna village, about seven kilometres from Gotamari. Suchitra's daughter Prabhati has been living with her grandmother since she was one year old.

"I was with my parents in the enclave, but I was married to a man living in the mainland ten years ago. Our daughter Prabhati is crying as my mother desires to

BAIL FOR POLITICAL VIOLENCE ACCUSED SC for considering victims' feelings

The High Court should consider the feelings of vandalism and arson victims in granting bail to accused, the Supreme Court said yesterday.

Vandalism and arson attacks, carried out in the country in recent months, were inhuman and unprecedented, observed the court while hearing a review petition filed by the Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA).

The lawyers' platform sought review of the SC's guideline for the HC in granting

anticipatory bail to accused.

The five-member bench of the Appellate Division, led by Chief Justice Surendra Kumar Sinha, yesterday dismissed the review petition saying that its directives on granting anticipatory bail to accused might have been different had such subversive activities taken place before issuance of the directives.

The other members of the bench were Justice Nazmun Ara Sultana, Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain, Justice Hasan Foez

Dead Zone Scientists puzzled as Florida birds leave nests

The din created by thousands of nesting birds is usually the first thing you notice about Seahorse Key, a 150-acre mangrove-covered dune off Florida's Gulf Coast.

But in May, the key fell eerily quiet all at once.

Thousands of little blue herons, roseate spoonbills, snowy egrets, pelicans and other chattering birds were gone. Nests sat empty in trees; eggs broken and scattered on the muddy ground.

"It's a dead zone now," said Vic Doig, a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist. "This is where the largest bird colony on the Gulf Coast of Florida used to be."

For decades, Seahorse Key has been a protected way station for myriad bird species. It's part of the

95 more return from KL Malaysian authorities rescued them in sea several weeks back

Ninety five more Bangladeshi trafficking victims who were rescued by the Malaysian authorities from the Andaman Sea in May returned home yesterday from Kuala Lumpur.

Officials of International Organisation for Migration (IOM) received them at the Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport around 5:30pm.

The IOM officials assisted them with some grants from the IOM to reach their homes.

The returnees are from Cox's Bazar, Sirajganj, Narsingdi, Narayanganj, Jessore, Jhenidah, Chuadanga and Joypurhat, Sayedul Islam, counsellor (Labour Wing) at the Bangladesh High Commission in Kuala Lumpur told The Daily Star over the phone yesterday.

With the 95, the total number of returnees from Malaysia stood at 441, he said, adding that 96 others would return to Dhaka today.

"We are sending back the rescued migrants whose nationality verifica-

tion was confirmed by our government. We will try to send back around 300 others before Eid," the counsellor added.

He said the government was bearing all the expenses regarding the repatriation of the rescued Bangladeshis from Malaysia.

A total of 715 Bangladeshi migrants were among over 1,051 trafficking victims, including Rohingyas, rescued from Langkawi island of Malaysia on May 11. The traffickers had abandoned

HUMAN TRAFFICKING US 'upgrading Malaysia' in annual report

The United States is upgrading Malaysia from the lowest tier on its list of worst human trafficking centres, US sources said, a move that could smooth the way for an ambitious US-led free-trade deal with the Southeast Asian nation and 11 other countries.

The upgrade to so-called "Tier 2 Watch List" status removes a potential barrier to President Barack Obama's signature global trade deal.

A provision in a related trade bill passed by Congress last month barred from fast-tracked trade deals Malaysia and other countries that earn the worst US human trafficking
