

Landmark deal with Iran

Seize the opportunity for cooperation

AFTER the marathon 18-day Vienna talks a historic deal was signed on Tuesday between Iran and six global powers -- the US, Russia, China, Britain, France and Germany. The deal is aimed at heading off Iran's nuclear ambition. At the same time it will resolve the 13 year stand-off between Iran and the West by lifting the international sanctions that have strangled Iranian economy and meant severe hardship to its people.

The agreement is a triumph of multilateral diplomacy. It brought together the great powers to resolve the Iranian crisis in a peaceful way rather than resorting to the often flaunted military means. The deal happens at a particularly explosive time when the Middle East is grappling with the rise of IS which holds sway over a large area of Syria and Iraq. According to experts, the agreement will help foster cooperation between Tehran and Washington to deal with this growing threat.

The accord will be a great boost for Iran's oil export, the fifth largest OPEC country, and will unblock its billions of dollars in frozen assets. It will enable Iran to realise its enormous potential and the world economy will also be immensely benefited from its great opening up.

We heartily welcome this breakthrough in the relations between Iran and the West. We hope this deal will contribute a lot to bring peace and stability in the Middle East by introducing a new balance of power in this volatile region.

Extortion with help of DNCC officials

Abuse of public trust

THE Daily Star's report on illegal toll collection by a gang of extortionists in collusion with DNCC staff highlights an undeniable fact. The practice of extortion from truck and other vehicle drivers as well as traders has flourished because of the involvement of corrupt officials of the city corporation.

The investigation has found that a well organised gang has been operating for the past few months charging each truck Tk 50 at night and Tk 10 for each CNG-run three-wheeler and rickshaw van for parking in the Karwan Bazar wholesale kitchen market. Parking is supposed to be free throughout the night with trucks being allowed into the city after 10pm.

Unsurprisingly, the rate of extortion has doubled in the month of Ramadan to make sure that the extortionists can fill their pockets before Eid holidays. It has been found out that since the expiration of a lease given to a private firm to carry out the parking fee collection on behalf of the DNCC, the city corporation has taken over the task. But while doing so, some of its members have been making a quick buck by assisting the extortionists.

Such blatant corruption must be remedied immediately. The mayor of the DNCC is morally obligated to investigate the matter and take proper action against his errant officials. The Karwan Bazar operation is but a small instance of the widespread extortion being carried out by goons with the support of corrupt public representatives.

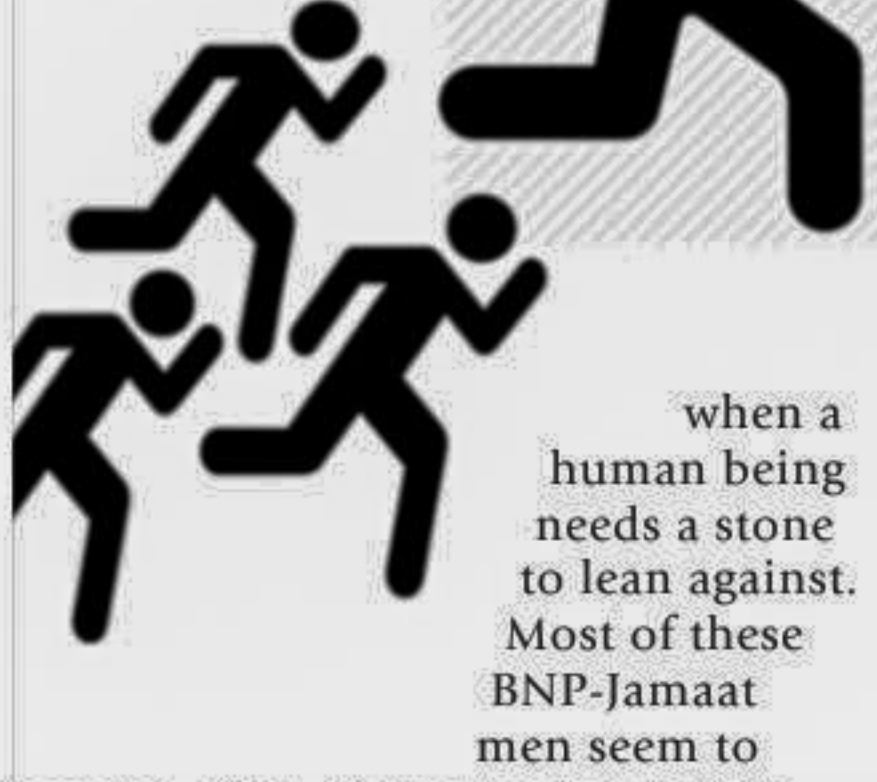

FOR RAJON'S SAKE

THIS week alone, thirteen-year-old Rajon was tortured to death by a group of men in Sylhet, seven-year-old Tikon was beaten to death by his uncle in Chittagong and Lucky Akther, a transgender, otherwise known as a "hijra", was killed by villagers in Natun Bazar. A new video has just surfaced showing two minor girls being

severely beaten at an orphanage in Barisal.

We're disgusted, but not shocked, at the inhumanity shown by the gang of thugs captured in the video of Rajon being tied to a pole and his teenage body being brutally assaulted. We're repulsed, but not shocked, at Tikon's infant body being caned because he dared to leave home without permission. We are sickened, but not shocked, by the mob beating of Lucky Akther to death. We're ashamed, but not shocked, by the incident in Barisal.

We're outraged, but shocked we are not. Saying we're shocked would be naïve. It would mean that child abuse in Bangladesh is an anomaly. It would mean that Rajon and Tikon's deaths were isolated incidents. It would mean that like Lucky Akther, those belonging to marginalised "hijra" communities are not viewed as subhuman, or as inherently criminal by Bangladeshi society. We are not shocked that all these incidents were perpetrated by able-bodied, adult men. Because in the patriarchal society and world we live in, the adult male is the default. And the rest of us are aberrations.

Every such brutal crime on the poor child, woman, *hijra* becomes a sensational headline for the media, a common occurrence to be temporarily condemned and forgotten for the privileged, and a stark reminder of what it means to exist for the impoverished.

So don't tell me Rajon and Tikon's murders were 'shocking'. In a country where child labour and child abuse is rampant and suspended in full public view on a daily basis, we know better than to be 'shocked'. We have *no right* to feel unsettled when we, as a nation, continue to perpetuate in our everyday lives a culture where kids are no longer allowed to be kids. We watch children being hurled abuses or smacked by grown men on the streets and we do nothing. We see children pulling carts and chipping bricks and we turn a blind eye. We utter annoyances at the hungry kid who hopes to make a few bucks by wiping the windshield of our private car. We live in a country where people see nothing wrong with lowering the marriageable age for girls. So don't tell me you're 'shocked' at how a thirteen-year old child was beaten to a pulp by a gang of grown-ups.



Don't tell me Rajon and Tikon's murders were 'shocking'. In a country where child labour and child abuse is rampant and suspended in full public view on a daily basis, we know better than to be 'shocked'.

Let's quit treading the moral high ground to make ourselves feel better and see ourselves for the kind of sick society we have nurtured and the toxic, child unfriendly environment we have let thrive. It's hypocritical to expect our fellow countrymen to treat children with respect when we are collectively responsible in twisting and perverting the very definition of what it
