Raise voice against India's river linking project

BNP urges govt STAFF CORRESPONDENT

BNP yesterday expressed its concern over India's fresh move to implement the controversial river interlinking project as it will diminish the water flow in some Bangladeshi rivers.

BNP spokesperson Asaduzzaman Ripon said it was India's internal issue but Bangladesh's rivers would be affected by the project. Addressing a press con-

ference at the party's Nayapaltan headquarters, he urged Bangladesh's government to raise its voice against the move. India plans to link 30

major rivers including the trans-boundary Brahmaputra and Ganges to divert water, especially for irrigation.

Quoting Indian Water Resources Minister Sanwar Lal Jat, several Indian newspapers reported recently that his ministry would soon be taking up the planning of a very important link, Manas-Sankosh-Teesta-Ganges, in consultation with the governments SEE PAGE 4 COL 1

The government's move to import 500MW of electricity from Indian private sector is unlikely to see any breakthrough before mid-2017.

According to official sources, the state-owned Power Development Board (PDB) will solidify the move once the construction of a separate substation which will require about two years time is completed.

"That's why the whole process of the proposed import of 500MW of electricity in addition to the existing one is getting delayed," chief engineer (planning) of PDB Mizanur Rahman told the news

agency. On several occasions in the past, New Delhi gave its consent to Dhaka's proposal to import 500MW of electricity from its private sector in addition to the import of the existing 500MW one.

The bench of Justice Farah Mahbub and Justice Md Ashraful Kamal came up with the decision after hearing arguments from the counsels for the state and the petitioner.

Man hacked to death in Savar

Two bodies found in Dhamrai

A man was hacked to death at his house in Rajashon of Savar on Tuesday night.

The deceased was Md Korban Ali, 40, a Bangladeshi expatriate living in Kuwait. Police detained his wife, Kohinoor Begum, for interrogation.

SM Kamruzzaman, officer-in-charge of Savar Model Police Station, said the victim was hacked on the head.

He said they have not yet unearthed the reason behind the murder. The body was sent for an autopsy.

Meanwhile, two bodies were found in Valum and Taltola areas of Dhamrai yesterday.

Police said the decomposed body of an unidentified man was found on the bank of Bongshi river in Valum.

In Taltola, police recovered the hanging body of Jesmin

Akhter, 23, from her house. The law enforcers are not sure whether it was a murder or

a suicide.

Both the bodies were sent for autopsies and separate cases were filed.

Dhaka eyes Iran-US deal for boosting trade relation

Bangladesh is interested in enhanced trading with Iran if the landmark nuke deal can significantly limit Tehran's nuclear ability as this will facilitate lifting of international sanctions.

"Of course, our trade and commerce and communication will get a boost once the agreement is implemented," said Foreign Secretary Md Shahidul Haque.

Talking to reporters at his office after a meeting with European envoys, the foreign secretary said Bangladesh cannot carry out business with Iran in some cases because of UN sanctions, but if the sanctions are lifted then trading will be easier.

European Union Ambassador to Bangladesh Pierre

Mayaudon, France Ambassador Sophie Aubert, UK Deputy High Commissioner Mark Clayton and German embassy diplomat Mathias Keller met the foreign secretary and discussed various aspects of the accord.

After the meeting with the foreign secretary, EU envoy Pierre Mayaudon told reporters that the meeting was an

year following a factional clash.

On July 20, BCL's central committee made Alamgir Tipu president of the CU unit and Fazly Rabby Sujan general secretary. No other posts were announced.
