# England regain the Ashes

Durham pacemen Mark Wood and Ben Stokes set the seal on a crushing innings and 78-run victory over Australia in the

fourth Test at Trent Bridge on Saturday as England regained the Ashes in style.

Australia started the day on 241 for seven, 90 runs shy of making England bat again.

But they lost their last three wickets in just 40 minutes' play, with all-rounder Stokes, who'd taken five wickets on Friday, striking again on his way to Testbest figures of six for 36.

Fast bowler Wood ended the match when he had Nathan Lyon playing on as the number eleven tried to withdraw his bat.

Victory gave Alastair Cook's men an unbeatable 3-1 lead in the fivematch series as, for the second match in a row, they defeated arch-rivals

Australia inside three days following their eight-wicket win in the third Test at Edgbaston last week.

It was also the first time this year that England, whitewashed 5-0 in Australia in 2013/14, had won back-to-back Tests.

Australia were in trouble right from the start of this match as they collapsed to 60 all out in 111 balls -- the shortest completed first innings in Test history -- on Thursday's first day.

Man-of-the-match Stuart Broad, who took two wickets in the first over of the match, including his 300th at this level, finished with a Test-best return of eight for 15.

"I didn't think we were quite ready to win the Ashes at the beginning," said England captain Cook at the presentation ceremony. "I thought you needed a group of hardened."

"We have won really critical moments and the players have really stepped up which shouldn't surprise

me but it has," added Cook.

"For what we've been through over the last 18 months, to play like we did has been fantastic. I'm so proud of this young team."

Australian Trevor Bayliss, who took over as England coach shortly before this series, has been widely praised for his role.

But Cook acknowledged the role of Bayliss's sacked predecessor, Peter Moores, by saying: "A lot has happened behind the scenes, and we need to thank Peter Moores -- we did make some strides under Mooresy. This is for you, Peter." This win was particularly impres-

sive as England were without James Anderson after their all-time leading wicket-taker suffered a side injury at Edgbaston.

England, in reply to Australia's meagre first innings, made 391 for players who were match- nine declared, Joe Root top-scoring with 130, on Friday.

> Australia captain Michael Clarke said: "Our goal was to come here and try and have some success.

"Alastair Cook and the England team deserve a lot of credit -- they've shown us how to execute good swing and seam bowling," added Clarke, on the losing side for a fourth successive Ashes series in England.

"It's not for want of trying but the boys have been beaten by a better

Bangladesh's new bowling sensation Mustafizur Rahman returned to his home yesterday to enjoy a break after three gruelling home assignments.

Previously, whenever Mustafizur got any break he would go and spend time with his family at his village home in Tetulia of Satkhira, but those trips home were quiet and subdued.

However, the 19-year-old baby-faced assassin's world has drastically changed over the past three months and that's why he needed more than five hours just to embrace his parents after landing at the Jessore airport.

mother received me with sweets. The sweets tasted sweeter today," quipped the left-armed pacer, who enthralled the cricket fraternity with his famous cutters, when asked what the best part of his journey was?

Mustafizur has been suffering from flu, but he still enjoyed every moment.

"I am feeling unwell due to flu, but the way people received made me forget my illness. It's an amazing experience for me. It was not possible for me to enjoy Eid with my family and friends, but this looked like an Eid festival for me," said Mustafizur, who went home from Dhaka by air for the first time.

Mahmuda Khatun, mother of Mustafizur, was happy that her youngest son returned home after conquering the

"I'm happy that my son returned home after three months. Mustafizur might have achieved something in cricket, but he is the same to me as he was before," she said, speaking with the amount of excitement only a mother could have.

"My child is the country's property. I'm proud of him," said Abul Kashem, father of Mustafizur, while he was responding on the grand reception.

## 'Playing like this is the new test'

The year 2015 can probably go down as one of the greatest years of Bangladesh's cricket; even the sternest of critics would agree to that. However, according to toporder batsman Mahmudullah Riyad, who

surprised the world with his two centuries in the World Cup earlier this year, the Tigers now have a new challenge in store.

"2015 has been one of the best years in terms of cricket for us. But now we have a new challenge ahead of us. We have to hold on to this form and continue performing. That's what we have to do in the future," Riyad told reporters yesterday.

While the player had a brilliant run in the World Cup this year, his performance dipped during the series that ensued. In addition, he had injured his finger which led to him missing the India series.

"Personally, I want to do well in every match that I play. My target is to play consistent cricket," said Riyad.

The next challenge in store for the Tigers is a two-Test series against Australia which begins in October. The Australians might be in dire straits at the moment having been thumped by an innings in the fourth Test of the Ashes series. Their former captain Ricky Ponting during an interview has even gone on to say that there might be as many as eight players on the current side who won't play Tests in the near future. Riyad though, was unmoved by that statement.

"It doesn't matter which Australian team comes. We have the ability to compete against them," said Riyad.

The Tigers have nothing on their international calendar after the end of the Australia series. There is however a chance for the third edition of the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) to take place in November this year. The batsman said that hosting the tournament would do a lot of good for Bangladesh's players.

"The T20 World Cup is around next year and if we can host the BPL at this time, it will be good practice for us," said Riyad.

#### 'Most of the team not good'

Former Australian captain Ricky Ponting believes half of the touring Ashes squad "might not play" Test cricket again following the embarrassing outing against old foes England at the Trent Bridge.

"There could be up to eight guys who might not ever play Test cricket again in this touring squad. That's a big number... half the squad," Ponting was quoted as saying.

The legendary Australian batsman said the team was just not up to the task.

"You've got to break it down and look at the deficiencies. The cold, hard facts are there. If we got bowled out for 60 then England batted on the same pitch and declared for 391 it is indicative that, one, we didn't bat well, and two, we probably didn't bowl well either.

"Now, here we are again at 7-241, which actually should be the best batting conditions for the whole game," Ponting said after the end of day two.

"They just haven't been good enough. I don't care what they want to say or who they want to blame"

However, Ponting praised Australia openers Chris Rogers and David Warner for stitching a century partnership in the second innings.

### Clarke hanging it up after the Ashes
