## Interference made cops' job difficult

Complain SPs; police chief asks them to work neutrally

Amid growing number of complaints from superintendents of police (SPs) about feuds between ministers and lawmakers, the police chief yesterday instructed the SPs to be impartial and strict in enforcing the law.

The instruction came at the quarterly crime conference at the Police Headquarters yesterday where many district police chiefs claimed that they face problems in doing their duties due to the interferences of the ministers and lawmakers who are rivals.

Inspector General of Police AKM Shahidul Hoque said

despite being asked to do their duties and follow the rules and laws strictly, many SPs were unable to perform their duties properly. Chief Justice SK Sinha attended the conference as the

chief guest while IGP Shahidul chaired the conference attended by SPs of all districts, deputy commissioners of the metropolitan cities and other high-ups in police. The police boss told the SPs that the performance of

around 25 percent of them were very poor. He named none. SEE PAGE 17 COL 2

#### ISIS blast kills 76 in Baghdad

More than 200 injured in the blast at a busy market REUTERS, Baghdad

At least 76 people were killed and 212 wounded yesterday in a blast claimed by Islamic State in Baghdad's Sadr City, police and medical sources said, one of the biggest attacks on the capital since Haider al-Abadi became prime

minister a year ago. "A refrigerator truck packed with explosives blew up inside Jamila market at around 6:00 am, police officer Muhsin al-Saedi said. "Many people were killed and body parts were thrown on top of nearby buildings."

A statement circulated online by supporters of Islamic State said the blast had targeted what it called a stronghold of the "charlatan army" and Shia Muslim militias.

#### 'An atomic bomb?'

Asks a terrified resident as huge blasts at Chinese port kill 50, hurt more than 700

Two huge explosions tore through an industrial area where toxic chemicals and gas were stored in the northeast Chinese port city of Tianjin, killing at least 50 people, including at least a dozen fire fighters, officials and state media said yesterday.

At least 700 people were injured, more than 71 seriously, the Tianjin

government said on its Weibo microblog, and the official Xinhua news agency said two fires were still burning. Wednesday night's blasts, so large that they were seen by satellites in

space, sent shockwaves through apartment blocks kilometres away in the port city of 15 million people. Internet videos showed fireballs shooting into the sky and the US Geological Survey registered the blasts as seismic events. Vast areas of the port - the 10th largest in the world - were devastated,

crumpled shipping containers were thrown around like match sticks, hundreds of new cars were torched and port buildings left as burnt-out shells, Reuters witnesses said. "I was sleeping when our windows and doors suddenly shook as we

heard explosions outside. I first thought it was an earthquake, " Guan Xiang, who lives 7 km away from the explosion site, told Reuters by telephone. Guan, 24, said he saw flames and a mushroom cloud in the sky as he and

other residents scrambled to get out of the building. Video posted on YouTube from what appeared to be an apartment build-

ing some distance from the scene showed an initial blast followed by a second, much bigger, explosion. Shockwaves hit the building seconds later. "Our building is shaking. Is this an atomic bomb?" said a frenzied voice inside.

Xinhua said the explosions, the first equivalent to 3 tonnes of TNT and the second to 21 tonnes of TNT, ripped through a warehouse. Tianjin authorities said 12 firefighters were among the 44 killed.

The cause of the blasts was being investigated but Xinhua said several SEE PAGE 17 COL 1

the Private University Act-2010. Many of them are still running unauthorised outer campuses and disobeying the rules regarding syndicate meetings. Despite extending deadlines three times, only 17 universities have so far moved to their own campuses.

Many still have disputes within their trustee boards and do not have enough qualified teachers, properly equipped libraries and laboratories, and any publication of research journals.

This appalling picture was portrayed by none other than the chairman of University Grants Commission (UGC), the statutory apex body for higher education, at a views-exchange meeting with the authorities of private universities yester-

UGC convened the meeting to discuss the overall picture of the private universities at its auditorium in the capital's Agargaon. Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid, and vice chancellors and chairmen of the board of trustees of 76 private universities attended the meeting.

According to the act, private universities have to relocate to their own campuses

### LA fights drought with plastic balls


With no apparent relief to California's recordbreaking drought, Los Angeles has turned to more unusual methods to protect the city's water. Officials recently released 96 million floating

'shade balls' into the 75-acre Los Angeles Reservoir in Sylmar, California.

The black plastic balls are designed to help protect the water against dust, rain, chemicals and wildlife, as well as prevent 300 million gallons of water from evaporating each year. The balls work by floating on the surface and blocking the sun's rays.

As well as protecting against evaporation, they also prevent the chemical reaction that creates the carcinogenic compound bromate. For most people, exposure to bromate - created from naturallyoccurring bromide in water -is unlikely to be cause problems.
