

Trust fund for community clinics in offing
Says PM while distributing awards to best clinics, launching interactive learning module

The government has a plan to create a trust fund for community clinics across the country to give those a permanent shape and ensure smooth medicare services for people, said Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday.

"We would like to form in the future a trust fund like the PM's Education Trust Fund..." she said.

The premier was addressing a programme arranged by the health and family welfare ministry in Osmani Memorial Auditorium to distribute Best Community Clinic Award 2014 and launch the Interactive Learning Module for community clinic health providers.

Hasina said the objective to establish such a trust fund was to give a solid ground for the community clinics across the country so that no one could shut these down through just an order after the change of government.

"We've had a very bitter experience... we want to make these community clinics self-reliant financially."

She mentioned that each community clinic would have its own account and local people will be the members of the committee for running it.

"Government grants will go to that account and the affluent section of the community will donate to the fund, too."

The local committee will fix how many signatures will be needed to withdraw money from the account, said Hasina, adding that the people who would come to the community clinics for receiving preliminary treatment could donate if they wanted to. "Different organisations can donate to this fund as well."

From this fund, she said, the community clinics would be operated, while the utility bills of the clinics would be paid from this

Journo Shawkat Mahmud sent to jail after remand

No bail petition filed, no lawyer was present, says general recording officer of court

A Dhaka court yesterday sent to jail Shawkat Mahmud, an adviser of the BNP chairperson and president of a faction of Bangladesh Federal Union of Journalists, on expiry of a three-day remand in a case filed over the death of a man in an arson attack.

There was no bail petition and lawyer for Shawkat, said Sub-inspector Mohammad Mahmudur Rahman, also general recording officer of the court of Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Md Waez Kuruni Khan Chowdhury.

Shawkat was arrested in front of Samurai Convention Centre in Panthapath on August 18.

On January 9, miscreants hurled a petrol bomb at a private car in front of Celebration Community Centre in Moghbazar. The driver, Abul Kalam Azad, succumbed to his

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People must know about RTI Act for optimum use

Speakers tell first ever RTI Camp; chief info commissioner calls it the only law that can be implemented by citizens

Benefits of the Right to Information Act need to be highlighted to ensure its optimum use by citizens, said speakers at the country's first ever RTI Camp yesterday.

MRDI and Jagruto Nagorik Committee (JANAK) organised the camp with support from Manusher Jonno Foundation at Shaheed Moshirul Rahman High School in Jessor, according to a press release.

Chief Information Commissioner Mohammed Farooq was present as chief guest, while Deputy Commissioner of Jessor Dr Md Humayun Kabir chaired the function.

Mohammed Farooq said the act is

the only law in the country that citizens can apply on authorities instead of the other way round.

Citizens are empowered by the act and the maiden camp has added a new dimension to the campaign for people's right to know, he added.

Information Commissioner Nepal Chandra Sarker said implementation and benefits of the RTI Act depend upon the extent of use of the law by people. They would use it frequently if they were aware of the act's benefits, he said.

Hasibur Rahman, executive director of MRDI, said the camp wants to make the people's right to know movement more dynamic.

Dr Md Humayun Kabir said the act would make the district administration and the activities of upazila and union parishads more transparent and people-friendly.

"The presence of dignitaries has inspired us to be more positive about people's right to know," he said.

Additional Superintendent of Police of Jessor Md Shahid Abu Sarowar and Chairman of Chowgachha upazila SM Habibur Rahman, among others, also spoke.

Representatives from the district and upazila administrations, journalists, teachers, students and about 1,500 people from all walks of life were present.

Govt killing own people to hold onto power

BNP's Hannan Shah claims at Swechchhasebok Dal's 35th anniversary discussion

BNP standing committee member Brig Gen (retd) ASM Hannan Shah yesterday said the government was killing its own people one after another in crossfire because its "doomsday bell" started ringing, with party men creating anarchy and fighting with one another.

"We don't support the killing of anyone in crossfire. The government got worried about losing power due to the ruling party men's involvement in anarchy and infighting. It is not hesitating to kill its own people to stay in power," he said.

Addressing the 35th founding anniversary discussion of pro-BNP Jatiyatabdhi Swechchhasebok Dal at the capital's Diploma Engineers Institute, he hoped that the BNP would take over after unseating the ruling Awami League within one year.

"Don't get disappointed; you just do your duty staying on the path of justice. We hope to observe the next founding anniversary in a free Bangladesh in a nationalist government in power," Hannan Shah said, without elaborating.

Party insiders said Swechchhasebok Dal president, general secretary and organising secretary did not attend the meeting due to the fear of arrest in the several cases they were facing over "destructive activities" during the BNP-led 20-party alliance's movement from January to March demanding a fresh election under a non-party administration.

Without any official announcement, the opposition alliance called off their movement on April 5, the day BNP chief Khaleda Zia surrendered before a special court and later returned to her residence after staying at her Gulshan office for 92 days since January 5.

VAT on pvt universities worries guardians

The government's rigid stance not to remove the value added tax (VAT) on the private university tuition fees has worried students and parents because they have to bear the additional cost.

Talking to the news agency, a number of students and guardians said the decision would hamper the private sector's role in higher education in the country.

They said the government should encourage the growth of private universities across the country since the existing public universities could not accommodate the rising number of students seeking to pursue higher education.

The government imposed a 7.5 percent VAT on the tuition fees of private university students from this fiscal year. Soon after the announcement, the students started movement demanding the removal of the VAT.

But on August 14, at a programme in Sylhet, Finance Minister AMA Muhith said, "It cannot be accepted that they (private

university students) cannot give 7.5 percent VAT while they pay Tk 30,000-Tk 50,000 as tuition fees."

There are currently 84 universities in the country where 328,736 students study.

They said if the government stuck to its decision, students from middle-income families would be deprived of higher education due to the high costs.

However, an education expert supports the government's step to impose VAT on private university tuition fees but suggested that it should be realised from the profits of the university authorities, not from the students.

Siddikur Rahman, a professor of the Institute of Education and Research at Dhaka University, said it was a good decision because private universities were doing business in the name of imparting higher education.

Several hundred students of Rajshahi University yesterday blocked the Dhaka-Rajshahi highway for half an hour protest against an attack on three fellows by auto-rickshaw drivers the night before.

The demonstrators called off the blockade after the proctor and law enforcers intervened and assured them of arresting the attackers.

A case was filed against 10-12 three-wheeler drivers with Motihar Police Station, and the prime accused, Asaduzzaman Munna, was held.

The injured, Chanchal Kumar, Yakub Ali, and Liton Hossain, all master's students of mathematics, were admitted to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital.
