## Power, gas to get pricier next month

Single gas burner Tk 600, double burner Tk 650

Retail customers will have to spend on average 2.93 percent more on electricity and Tk 200 more on gas from this September.

"We have closely examined the logic behind the hike in gas and power tariffs. We have kept the rise to a minimum level," said AR Khan, chairman of Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission (BERC), while announcing a new tariff structure at his office yesterday.

From now on, the more one consumes, the more he or she pays, he added.

Under the new rates, which take effect on September 1, households using a single burner will have to pay 50 percent more with the monthly gas price going up to 600 from Tk 400. For double burner users, the tariff has been raised to Tk 650 from Tk 450 a month.

through generators will see gas tariff double -- Tk 8.36 from Tk 4.18 per cubic metre.

"Unlike in many countries, gas price is too low in Bangladesh. Hiking the gas price became inevitable. Our gas price was one-third of what it should be," said the BERC chief.

This is the first hike in gas tariff since 2009 though CNG prices went up twice in RELATED STORY ON B1 SEE PAGE 2 COL 4

#### 1,100 died in sea in 18 months

Victims were from Bangladesh, Myanmar, says UNHCR report on human trafficking

At least 70 people are estimated to have died of starvation, dehydration, disease and abuse by the crews at sea on ships abandoned in May this year, said the UN Refugee Agency yesterday.

With the new figure, the UNHCR estimates that over 1,100 people (Bangladeshis

and/or Rohingyas of Myanmar) died between January 2014 and June 2015.

Additionally, there were reports of drowning while disembarking, and many remained missing, the UNHCR said in a quarterly report of April and June.

#### Unease among AL allies over JSD role

While Awami League's allies see the spat over Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal's role in creating the grounds for Bangabandhu killing as a plot to split the 14-party alliance, some AL leaders maintain they were simply pointing out the "historical facts".

"The incidents between October 31, 1972 and August 15, 1975 come up naturally if

we discuss the assassination of Bangabandhu," said AL Organising Secretary AFM Bahauddin Nasim.

On Sunday, AL Presidium Member Sheikh Fazlul Karim Selim alleged that antiliberation forces would never have dared to attack Bangabandhu if the JSD had not created the circumstances by carrying out robberies and killings.



### Rawhide market braces for crisis

Leather product manufacturers see 'limited impact' as they have stock from last year's purchase

With Indian cattle supply drying up the local leather industry is feeling nervous about a short-term crisis in rawhides.

Even though they depend largely on local rawhides, yet tanners fear that they won't be able to get even half of their requirements this year.

The shortage is likely to result from fewer Indian cattle coming to the Eid market. "We are anticipating that there will be a shortage for

20 to 25 lakh cattle during this Eid, and we won't be able to collect those rawhides," said Md Shaheen Ahmed, president of Bangladesh Tanners Association.

Mazakat Harun Manik, senior vice-chairman of Bangladesh Tanners Association, said, "It means price of local cows will go up in the Eid market and rawhides prices may increase locally."

If the prices upswing is abnormal, then it might create a crisis in the industry, he said.

Ali Hossain, chairman of Bangladesh Hide and
