BOA to get Tk 10 crore

The Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) is set to get Tk 10 crore from the government to run training camp for the 12th South Asian Games, which is scheduled to be held in India from January 10 to 20.

The youth and sports ministry allocated the fund which is Tk 6.75 crore less than what BOA had sought, informed the association's joint secretary general Ashiqur Rahman Miku yesterday.

The BOA had already started the training camp from last month with a plan of providing each athlete with Tk 500 as food allowance and Tk 300 as pocket money. The association is now thinking about reducing the amount of allowances due to the curtailed allocation from government.

Venus in way of 'Serena Slam'

Serena Williams will play sister Venus for the 27th time as professional rivals in a

US Open quarterfinal Tuesday, but no prior matchup has had so much at history stake.

World number one Serena is three wins shy of completing the first calendar Grand Slam since Steffi Graf in 1988 and taking a 22nd Slam singles title to match Graf's Open Era record, two shy of Margaret Court's all-time mark.

Exactly 14 years to the day after they met in their first Grand Slam final at Arthur Ashe Stadium, the sisters will return for their 14th career Grand Slam meeting, one that might be the toughest hurdle between Serena and a rare feat she has not achieved.

Serena, two years younger than Venus at 33, leads the Williams sibling rivalry 15-11 with an 8-5 edge in Grand Slam meetings, but they have split four US Open meetings, including Venus winning the 2001 final and Serena taking a 2002 rematch.

"The only player in the draw I don't want to play, not only because she's my sister, but for me she's the best player," Serena said of Venus.

"She has beaten me so many times. She's a player that knows how to win, knows how to beat me and knows my weaknesses better than anyone."

collection that includes the 2000 and 2001 US Opens and five Wimbledon titles, the most Stosur. recent in 2008.

"I would love to. But it's easier said than done," Venus said. "Even though you're playing your sister you have to be prepared and focus. The preparation doesn't change."

Serena's 32-match Grand Slam win streak includes a Wimbledon title run to complete a "Serena Slam" and make her the oldest major champion at age 33.

Serena, whose first "Serena" Slam in 2002-03 came by beating Venus in four consecutive Slam finals, has won 25 US Open

matches in a row since a 2011 final loss to Australian Samantha "I would rather lose to Venus

as opposed to anyone else," Serena said. "I, in general, don't like to lose. "We play a lot. She plays similar.

She's fast. I'm fast. She hits hard.

hit hard. She serves big. I serve big. It's like playing a mirror." Serena credits Venus, her only practice partner for years as a child,

for helping her become as successful as she is. "I think she helped create me,

for sure," Serena said. "She always won. Like always. I just remember I

never was able to beat her." In their younger days, nerves

and sisterly devotion made for some ugly matches, but maturity has created sibling spectacles. "It's more fun than it used to

be," Serena said. "We really relish the opportunity. We're both happy to still be involved in getting so far. And it's still super intense. She's doing well and she wants to win this. So do I. It's not easy."

It's only their fourth meeting since 2009, with Serena taking the most recent matchup in the fourth round at Wimbledon in July and Venus winning the one before last year in a Montreal semi-final.

"It has been an amazing rivalry," Serena said. "I think it has meant a lot. Venus and I have Grand Slam quarterfinal definitely proven that you can be . enemies on the court and friends . and sisters off the court." Tuesday could be one of the last

great moments in the epic rivalry.

"It has helped the sport to grow because it has been such an unusual circumstance and intriguing for everyone," Venus grew up together playing

"That's what we always . wanted growing up, just to be out there on the big stage duking . It's not possible. I would it out when someone named Williams will win."

Djokovic finds it impossible

 Novak Djokovic tipped his · hat to Serena and Venus · Williams ahead of their 27th career meeting but admitted he would find it impossible to play his own brother.

The world number one · has two tennis-playing younger brothers -- 24-yearold Marko and Djorde, who's 20.

Both play on the sport's lower-level tours, which suits Djokovic just fine.

That's a luxury which neither Serena nor Venus can afford and they clash again on Tuesday for a place in the US Open semi-finals with Serena chasing a calen-dar Grand Slam.

"The first thing that comes to my mind is how would I feel to play my brother, and I don't think that would be possible, honestly," said Djokovic · after reaching his 26th Sunday in New York. "In a way I admire what

they're doing for so many · years to play against each other on such a big stage. It's strange. They are sisters. They live together. They "But I don't know if I'll

Azarenka, Wawrinka through to quarter-finals

World number one Novak Djokovic reached his 26th consecutive Grand Slam quarterfinal Sunday

but only after surviving a US Open scare against Spain's Roberto Bautista Agut.

Meanwhile, two-time runner-up Victoria Azarenka reached her fourth US Open quarter-final on Monday with a 6-3, 6-4 win over Varvara Lepchenko of the United States. On the other hand, Stan Wawrinka

beat Donald Young in a hard fought contest to go through to the quarterfinals. Wawrinka beat the American 6-4, 1-6, 6-3, 6-4. It was a tough match considering that the Swede was beaten 1-6 in the second set. He however, came back well to win the game three sets to one.

The Belarusian, whose season has

been stalled by a left thigh strain, appeared on Arthur Ashe Stadium with both biceps tightly strapped.

"It's a little embarrassing. I have blisters from my shirts rubbing against my arms so I needed the bandages, "said Azarenka.

Lepchenko, who was bidding to become the first American woman not called Williams to make the last-eight since 2009, was broken in the third and ninth games of the opening set.

She rallied to edge ahead in the first game of the second but handed the break straight back to the 26-year-old Azarenka. The Belarus star carved another break for 5-3 before faltering when she served for the match.

But she secured victory in the next game on her first match point when left-handed Lepchenko went wide.

"I felt at 5-3 that I never went for my shots, she didn't give me much rhythm," she said. "But I told myself to

be aggressive and go for it."

Djokovic, the 2011 champion won 6-3, 4-6, 6-4, 6-3 to set-up a clash against Spanish veteran Feliciano Lopez in what will also be his ninth US Open last-eight place in a row. Djokovic gave up a 4-2 lead in the

second set and saw an early break clawed back in the fourth by the 23rd seeded Agut, a former junior footballer with Villarreal in Spain. The Serb was also broken when

serving for the match at 5-2 as Agut unleashed a barrage of deep, murderous forehands before steadying himself to claim his 60th win of the year. Defending champion Marin Cilic

made the last eight for the fourth time with a 6-3, 2-6, 7-6 (7/2) 6-1 win over France's Jeremy Chardy. French 19th seed Tsonga reached

his second New York quarter-final with a 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 win over Benoit Paire.

Iceland make history

Iceland made footballing history on Sunday as they qualified for a major tournament finals for the first time, joining the Czech Republic in securing their

berth at Euro 2016.

The island nation, with its population of barely 330,000, became the least populated country ever to qualify for a European Championship thanks to a nervy 0-0 draw with Kazakshtan in Reykjavik. Iceland only needed a point to secure

one of the top two places in Group A, and

captain Aron Gunnarsson of Cardiff City was sent off in the 89th minute just before celebrations erupted on the final whistle. The result allowed the side coached

jointly by Heimir Hallgrimsson and the Swede Lars Lagerback to follow the Czechs and England in being able to book flights to France next year. England became the first nation to

qualify for the 24-nation jamboree on Saturday and the Czechs sealed their place by beating Latvia 2-1 while the struggling Netherlands slumped to a potentially

disastrous 3-0 defeat in Turkey.

First-half goals from David Limbersky and Vladimir Darida put the Czechs in control in Riga, and they held on after Arturs Zjuzins got a goal back for Latvia. Bosnia were comfortable 3-0 winners at

Edin Dzeko and Senad Lulic all scoring in the first half. Both sides were reduced to 10 men after the restart as Everton's Muhamed Besic was

home to Andorra, with Ermin Bicakcic,

sent off for the hosts along with Andorra's Victor Rodriguez. Italy edged closer to qualifying from

Group H after Daniele De Rossi's sixthminute penalty proved enough to beat Bulgaria 1-0 in the Sicilian city of Palermo. De Rossi and Bulgaria's Ilian Mitsanski

were both sent off in the second half, while Italy goalkeeper Gianluigi Buffon won his 150th cap.

The Euro 2012 runners-up are two points clear of Norway, who leapfrogged Croatia into second place thanks to a 2-0 win when the sides met in Oslo, Jo Inge Berget of Malmo scoring twice.

In the other game in Group H, Malta and Azerbaijan drew 2-2, with Rahid Amirguliyev scoring twice for the visitors either side of goals by captain Michael Mifsud and Alfred Effiong for Malta.

Andrea Pirlo's status as one of Italy's 'untouchables' has been shaken after the Azzurri legend was

sidelined by coach Antonio Conte in the wake of criticism following a mediocre performance in a Euro 2016 qualifier.

Pirlo has 116 caps and is widely regarded as one of the world's all-time great deep-lying playmakers. But the 36-year-old's move from

four-time consecutive Serie A champions Juventus to New York City FC has coincided with a dip in form and the 'orchestrator', as Pirlo is often known, has looked somewhat out of tune.

Pirlo looked far below his usual best during a 1-0 win over Malta last Thursday and, although he has Conte's backing, he was sidelined for Sunday's 1-0 win at home to Bulgaria which took Italy to he brink of booking their ticket for next summer's finals in France.

The back-to-back wins sent Italy top of Group H with a two-point cushion on Norway and they require just one point from their next two encounters -away to Azerbaijan and at home to Norway -- to qualify for the European Championships.

The Euro 2016 finals will Pirlo's last international tournament, but his performance against Malta last week has prompted debate that even that could be a step too far.

"I think every player has to know when it's time to hang up his boots," said Beppe Marotta. Coming from the

midfielder with a history of indiscipline, fired Italy into a sixth-minute lead from the penalty spot after Antonio Candreva was fouled in the area.

But De Rossi's poor disciplinary record was blotted again when he was sent off 10 minutes after the restart for

CEO of Juventus, whom Pirlo helped retaliating to a foul by Iliyan Mitsanski by kicking back at the striker. Mitsanski

was also dismissed. Conte's feelings on the incident were clear after the game when the coach, before walking briskly away from the interviewer, said curtly: "He shouldn't have done it."

Indiscipline of the sort will not be welcome at next summer's finals, where Italy would be looking to make amends for their first-round exit from last summer's World Cup in Brazil.

And Conte, perhaps riled by Marotta's comments, continues to give Pirlo his backing. "What disappoints me most is the

lack of respect shown towards an immense player. He deserves more respect in every way," Conte told Sky Sport after Sunday's win. "Pirlo cannot be considered irre-
