About her role, Bhabna said "I play a very simple village girl in 'Onugomon', who speaks a Rajshahi dialect. It's something I've never done before so it was challenging, but I am always drawn to off-track work. It's a love story in an impoverished community. The storyline moved me a lot."

Bhabna is slated to shoot two more TV plays for Eid, under the helm of the same director.

Asked why and how it had came to his mind to hold an International Art Biennale in Cox's Bazar, Rajiv said, "Cox's Bazar is not only the longest sea beach of the world but also displays multilingual, multicultural and multiethnic folk forms; art, as a medium of powerful expression, help create harmony among the diverse people. We would like to represent the biennale venue artistically. My artist friends Sabyasachi Mistry and Aranya Sharma who have held two art festivals in Cox's Bazar -- are co-organisers of grand art show."

According to him, discipline and restraint of self is the secret of every art. Photography, for him, is a miniature form of reality. "Individual creates the collective knowledge or idea that we experience from different grounds of life. Getting congenial atmosphere together with the connection with sense helps blossom artistic works. I believe in the power of promising artists and art initiators who will bring a good prospect for Bangladeshi art. A culturally vibrant Bangladesh gleams in the days ahead," he hoped.

Graduated from Pathshala, Rajiv participated in many exhibitions and worked as a curator for several exhibitions, including for noted photographers Munem Wasif, Andrew Biraj and GMB Akash.


### TV WATCH MAHI to sing on "Star Night"

Akshay and Pandey have earlier worked as actor-director in "Baby" and "Special 26", both of which found appreciation. But "Rustom" is not being directed by Pandey, and instead marks the directorial debut of Tinu Suresh Desai.

Inspired by real life incidents, the project is co-produced by Zee Studios, KriArj Entertainment and Friday Filmworks.

Apart from the actor, the movie will feature two "young actresses".

Pandey, who will pen the dialogues of the film, co-write the screenplay along with Vipul Rawal and contribute towards the film's edit, said: "When Tinu narrated 'Rustom' to us, we immediately got hooked to the quality of the narrative and its potential and instantly decided that it was something that we would like to produce. We also really felt that given the nature of the story, Akshay would be the perfect fit and him agreeing to come on board will definitely give it the canvas it requires."

The first schedule of the shoot of "Rustom" will commence by mid-December this year. It will travel to multiple locations globally in the course of its production.
