




VAT ON PRIVATE UNIVERSITIES, WRATH OF STUDENTS









Anti-clockwise from top right, Dhaka city's artery that connects its south with the north snapped in the middle at Banani Chairman Bari as private university students' opposition against value added tax (VAT) on their tuition fees snowballs into a massive citywide demonstration yesterday. On Mirpur Road, one group shouts the slogan "No VAT on Education". Students of East West University do the same on nearby Rampura Bridge, with some protecting themselves in the extreme temperature. As always, the first casualty of any demonstration is the general public, but demonstrators in the bridge area help a man with a bandaged arm get onto a rickshaw. People walk with luggage in the area after they were forced to get down from buses, due to road blocks created by the demonstrators. Stuck in an indefinite traffic jam, an auto-rickshaw driver opts to carry his heavy vehicle over the road divider to the opposite direction on Mohakhali Flyover. 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'Rescued' children kept in shelter home

Four 'captors' on 2-day remand

Nine children, out of 10, who were "rescued" from a flat in the capital's Banasree on Saturday, have been sent to the Juvenile Development Centre in Gazipur while another was handed over to his family.

Police said the children were sent to the shelter home following a Dhaka court order as their guardians could not be contacted or identified immediately.

The court yesterday also put their four "captors"--Arifur Rahman, Hasibul Hasan Sabuj, Zakia Sultana, and Feroz Alam Khan Shuvo -- on a two-day remand each in a case filed by one Monir, uncle of one of the chil-

dren, under the human trafficking act. Officer-in-Charge of Rampura Police Station Mahbubur Rahman told The Daily Star that they will interrogate the four to verify whether their claim of running an NGO, Adamya Bangladesh, which "shelters such

street children" is true. Khadiza Begum, caretaker of the house, said the NGO had been paying Tk 17,000 as rent for the last 10 months.

After the incident, this correspondent talked to the children who said that they had been staying in the flat for at least six months. They were treated well and no one even tortured them.

Families of migrants see better living

Reveals survey disclosed at consultation organised by Manusher Jonno Foundation, RMMRU, Warbe Development Foundation

Households having migrants are faring better than those that do not with the remittance being sent contributing significantly in reducing poverty and creating employment, says a survey of Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU).

"The benefits of international migration are distributed among non-migrant producing areas," RMMRU Founder Chairperson Prof Tasneem Siddiqui told a programme in the capital's Cirdap auditorium yesterday.

The programme on "National Civil Society Consultation on 8th GFMD 2013" was jointly organised by Manusher Jonno Foundation, RMMRU and Warbe Development Foundation. GFMD stands for Global Forum on Migration and Development, scheduled to be held in Turkey next month.

The survey was conducted on 5,084 households in 17 districts under Bangladesh's seven divisions between December 2013 and March 2014. It said each household that had migrants

received on an average of Tk 2.68 lakh as remittance last year.

Only 13 percent of the migrantcontaining families live below the poverty line while it was over 80 percent for the

other, it added. Prof Tasneem said the employment was created in cultivation, poultry and livestock farming and small-scale enterprises.

"Around 30 percent of international migrant households have savings accounts whereas 18 percent of non-migrant households have savings accounts," mentioned the survey.

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Stop illegal parking, use of hydraulic horns in capital
