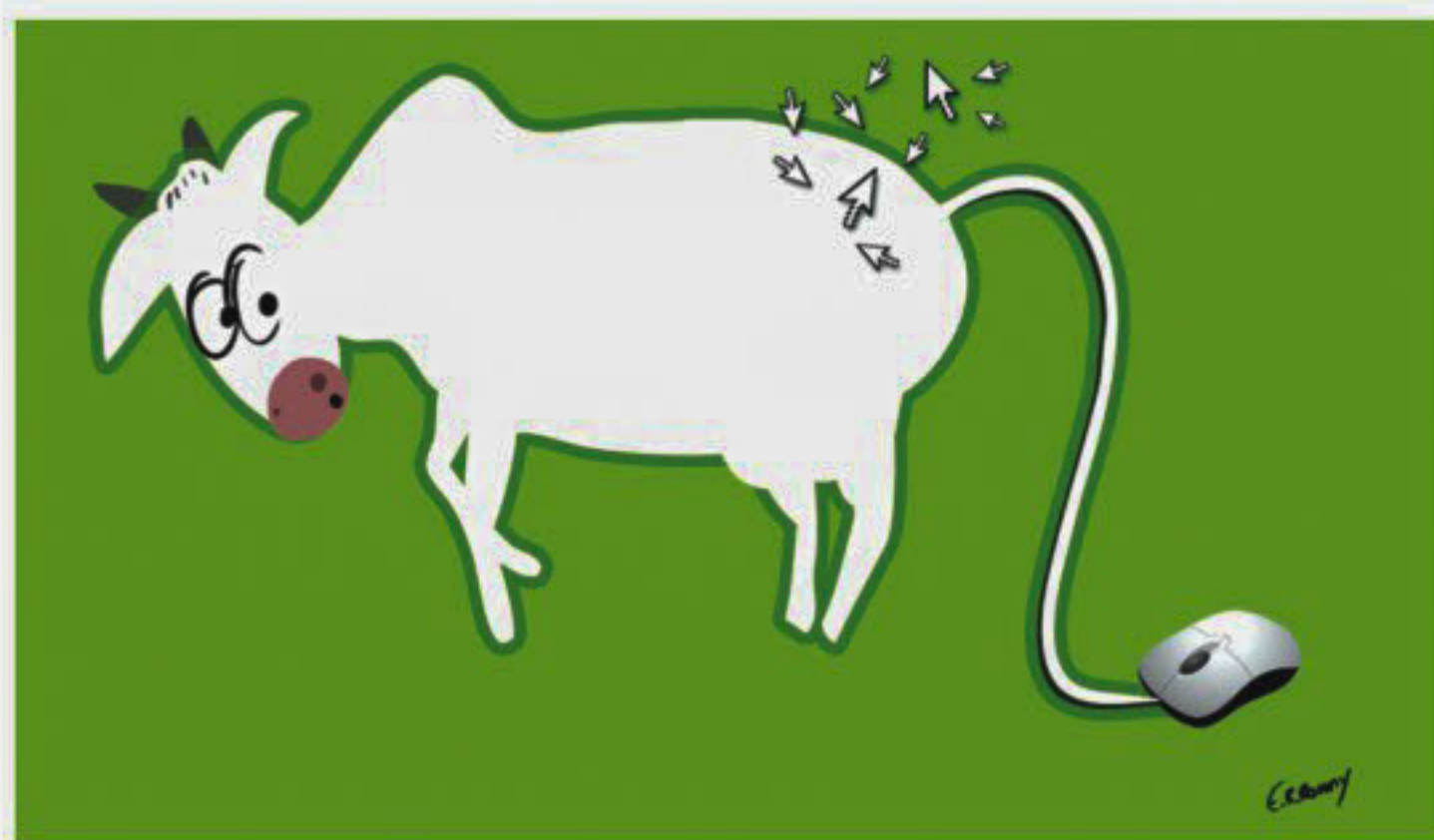

1. Bikroy.com
Like always Bikroy.com, one of the most popular online platforms, is back this eid season with tons of cattle. Last year this site had the largest listing of cows so you keep your eyes open; even you might find your perfect one here. Since it is classifieds site, so be wary of what you purchase because the site is not liable for any bad deals.

2. Ekhanai.com
Search "Qubarni cow" and you'll get a whole bunch of them at ekhanai.com. Shyendra Nathan, CEO of Ekhanai.com assured us that they have a strict vetting process so that only the authentic seller gets to display their product here. We strictly maintain customer compliance and verify the advertisements before posting them on the website. This is how we are different from others' he said.

3. Akhoni.com
This site comes with a dedicated haat special. The listings here have all the information one might look for before buying their sacrificial animals; after all most of the cows & cattle uploaded here are from some dedicated farms. Akhoni also offers you free home deliveries but we suggest you be sure to tip the people who bring you your cow. After all IT'S EID.

4. Bengalmeat.com
Bengal Meat is the newest player in the online game this season. They not only sell you the cattle but also provide the slaughtering and butchering services. Md. Masumul Haque, AGM of Bengal Meat, informed Bytes that the customers will get their packaged meat and other parts delivered to the door-step on the third-day of Eid. And for these a customer has to pay Tk. 17,000 service charge.

5. Clickbd.com & Kaymu.com
These two are great sites too. Just keep in mind that the sites have little to do if anything goes wrong. So make sure when you haggle with the vendor, you discuss every details (hashil/tax, additional charges etc)

Intel and S-Mobile launch first Intel-based smartphone in Bangladesh



Intel Ltd (Dhaka Liaison office) and S-Mobile recently introduced a new lineup of Android devices, including the first smartphone device designs by S-Mobile, using Intel Atom x3 (SoFIA) processors. The announcement was made at a major event on 9th September 2015 at the capital hosted by senior executives from Intel and S-Mobile. "Intel has become the processor of choice in Android systems," said Zia Manzur, Country Manager, and Intel Bangladesh. Speaking on the occasion, Lin Yin Kun, CEO, S-Mobile said, "These are the first Intel powered smartphones to be launched under the banner of S-Mobile in Bangladesh." The new S-Mobile smartphones are equipped with the Intel Atom x3 processors, and comes in four sleek sku options. Five ways to protect your private photos: Part 1

Remember last year's well-publicized leak, which exposed some celebrities' nude photos? The story not only made some individuals' day (and probably night), it turned to be a very educating precedent. For instance, it made many people realize that their pet's name is not the safest password, and two-factor authentication is not meant exclusively for IT geeks, but for any Swarovski-adorned iPhone owner as well. However, 2FA in iCloud, as well as in Gmail, Facebook and many other web services, is optional. Thus the consequences can be devastating, especially if your work at an Internet company. Here's part 1: Two locks are better

The majority of people think of two-factor authentication as of the system sending one-time passwords in text messages. Well, it's the most prominent method of 2FA for web services, yet it's by far not the only one.

In general, 2FA is like a door with two padlocks. One of them is the traditional login-password combination, and the second could be anything else. Moreover, if two

padlocks are not enough, you might employ as many as you like, but it would make the process of opening the door much longer, so it's good to start with at least two.

Passwords sent via SMS are a comprehensible and relatively reliable way of authenticating, which is not always handy. If you don't have coverage (which is frequently the case when you travel), that means no password for you. You might lose your phone, after all, and being unable to leverage other means of communication in a situation like that is even more frustrating. To cover you in such cases, many web services like Facebook and Google, offer other options. For example, they offer a list of one-time keys which you can preemptively compile, print out and store somewhere safe.

Moreover, 2FA with one-time codes delivered via SMS might be enabled not at all times but only when someone logs in from an unknown device. So, unless you are logging in from a new device every day, SMS-enabled 2FA is not a big deal. Once setup, it works ok.
