# Govt to crack down hard on importers of illegal handsets

The government has embarked on a twopronged initiative to enhance cyber security by cracking down on illegally imported mobile handsets and boosting efforts for crime and terror activities," Tarana said. proper SIM registrations.

The move targets unregistered or falselyregistered SIMs and mobile phones imported through unauthorised channels as they are frequently used in criminal activities, said Tarana Halim, the state minister for telecom. Legally imported handsets with

International Mobile Equipment Identity (IMEI) numbers can also help cut theft of the devices, she said. "We are already working on proper SIM

registration in a big way, and will also launch tough action against illegally imported handsets," Tarana said.

Most of the mobile phones used in criminal activities do not have IMEI numbers, which makes it hard to track the handsets.

IMEI is a 15-digit number unique to each legal mobile set, and can be used to track the

phone's movement. Users can find the IMEI number below the battery or at the back or bottom of the device. Dialing \*#06# also reveals the number.

"A combined effort is needed to curb

"We found a good response on the SIM registration issue and hope for the same while ensuring authentic IMEI numbers." Law enforcement agencies have fre-

quently raised concerns over the use of falsely-registered SIMs and IMEI-less mobile phones, Tarana added. The handset industry has been suffering

for the past couple of year because of fake IMEIs, and setting up a central IMEI database could help, said Rezwanul Haque, general secretary of Bangladesh Mobile Phone Importers' Association. "If established, the database will assist

customs officials to calculate duty, and consumers will also be able to authenticate IMEIs before buying handsets. Law enforcers could also find it useful," Haque said.

### Govt aims to treble taxpayers by 2019

STAR BUSINESS REPORT

The government aims to treble the number of regular taxpayers to 40 lakh by 2019, continuing to depend on direct taxes as the biggest source of revenue, Finance Minister AMA Muhith said yesterday.

"The government can work to provide better services to people if we can achieve that target," he said at a programme to honour the top and long-term taxpayers.

The National Board of Revenue organised the event at Sonargaon hotel to encourage people to pay taxes properly and help expand the tax net.

The tax administrator also handed over tax cards to top 10 individuals and 10 companies nationwide for paying the highest amount of tax in fiscal 2014-15.

The state received nearly Tk 750 crore from the top 10 firms and more than Tk 140 crore from the top 10 individuals, according to the NBR.

The tax collector also honoured 387 top and long-time taxpayers at the district and city corporation levels for fiscal 2014-15. The event marked the National Income Tax 22.

Day, which the NBR has been observing since 2008 to create awareness among people. Currently, around 12 lakh people submit

their tax returns out of the 17 lakh people who have taxpayer identification numbers.

The number of people who submit their tax returns regularly is less than 1 percent of the country's total population of 16 crore. "It is a shame for the nation," Muhith said.

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### New five-year plan rests on private sector's shoulders

Some Tk 31,903 billion will be required for implementation of the seventh five-year plan, 90.4 percent of which will come from domestic sources, according to the draft plan.

The plan was placed at yesterday's meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council. The government will invest Tk 7,252 billion and the private sector Tk 24,651 billion, as per the estimate.

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### HC stays VAT on airline charges

The High Court yesterday halted the government's move to collect 15 percent value-added tax or VAT on aeronautical

## Time for feed-in tariff to boost renewable energy

Bangladesh should come up with feed-in tariff as soon as possible to send a positive signal to investors and boost the renewable energy sector, experts said yesterday.

"Our renewable energy sector would have leapfrogged if we had a feed-in tariff scheme in place," said Prof M Tamim, an energy expert. "It would also have been encouraging for the investors."

Under a feed-in tariff, renewable electricity generators are paid a cost-based price for the renewable electricity they supply to the grid. This enables diverse technologies (wind, solar, biogas) to be developed and provides investors a reasonable return.

Advancements in renewable energy would be difficult without a feed-in tariff scheme in place, he said. "Big plants will not be set up if they can't operate commercially."

Tamim, the head of petroleum and mineral resources engineering at Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology, said there has to be an obligation for power utilities to buy power from renewable energy producers.

To start off, Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission (BERC) might make it mandatory for power companies to buy at least 1 percent of

their electricity from the renewable energy

producers, said Tamim.

Siddique Zobair, a member of Sustainable and Renewable Energy Development Authority, also agreed that the regulator should ask the utilities to buy electricity from renewable energy producers.

They spoke at a seminar on feed-in tariff regulations, organised by the Institute of Energy of Dhaka University in collaboration with the Asia Foundation Dhaka at The Daily Star Centre in Dhaka.

Feed-in tariff gives a guarantee to renewable energy producers that the electricity tariff they would receive would be higher than market rates, providing price certainty and long-term contracts that help finance projects.

About 80 countries have introduced feed-in tariff as of 2014, according to Zobair.

The government plans to generate at least 10 percent of the required power from renewable energy by 2020. It now produces 165MW of power from renewable energy sources, which is about 2.2 percent of total electricity produced in Bangladesh.

Taifur Ahmed Chowdhury, head of the electrical and electronic engineering department of BUET, said the approval procedure has to be simple so that people can come and enjoy the

Ijaz Hossain, a professor at the chemical engineering department of BUET, said Bangladesh's energy sector is in a terrible situa-

tion as the country is producing electricity using imported oil, gas reserves are depleting and there is no headway on whether local coal

would be used.

Bangladesh would have to go for renewable energy because if a country depends on external trade for 15 percent of its energy, its energy security comes under threat, he added.

After Bangladesh ruled out the possibility of using domestic coal in the near future, the country would rely on foreign sources for 92 percent of its electricity in 2030, said Tamim.

"It is a scary situation for energy security of any country."

Hasin Jahan, country director of Practical Action Bangladesh, said Bangladesh is not being able to use solar energy at expected levels, although about 40 percent of the population does not have access to the grid power.

"We also need to think about how we bring electricity to the hard-to-reach areas as grid connections can't be taken to many of these areas."

Incentives have to be given to the renewable energy producers, as they will come up with long-term investments, she added.

Emdadul Haq, a former chairman of BERC, said the feed-in tariff issue is being discussed for a long time now, but nothing has been finalised. "We have to introduce it as soon as possible. We are already lagging behind."

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#### Ecnec approves projects of Tk 5,040cr

The government yesterday approved a Tk 420-crore project to set up an economic zone for Chinese investors in Anwara, Chittagong.

Under the project, the government will provide land to Chinese investors on a long-term lease basis and a firm nominated by the Chinese government will set up the economic

zone on the land. The economic zone would span 774 acres of land and is scheduled for completion in June 2016. The Bangladesh Economic Zones Authority will imple-

ment the project. The government is focusing on China and Japan to bring in foreign investment, Planning Minister AHM Mustafa Kamal told reporters after a meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council.

A similar project will also be taken up for Japanese investors, he added.

Also at yesterday's meeting, the Ecnec gave the green light to seven projects with estimated spending of Tk 5,040 crore.

One of the projects involves making the postal department more competitive. Some 118 vehicles, including covered vans, would be purchased.

The project, which would cost Tk 78.33 crore, aims to expedite the delivery system in all 64 districts and 200 upazilas.

The courier services have captured the postal market by using their own vehicles, said the proposal from the planning ministry.

To make up for lost ground, the transportation system of the directorate of postal service need to be modernised and strengthened.

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
