Justice Manik 'extremely wrongheaded'

Claims BNP, terms his letter seeking CJ's impeachment unprecedented, bad example for judiciary

Terming outgoing Justice AHM Shamsuddin Choudhury Manik an extremely wrongheaded person", BNP yesterday said his letter to President Abdul Hamid seeking impeachment of the chief justice was unprecedented and set a bad example in the country's judiciary. "Motive of his letter...was to ruin the chief justice's image. This letter might give a wrong signal to justice seekers about the chief justice," BNP Spokesperson Asaduzzaman Ripon told a press conference at the party's Naya Paltan central office.

He said Justice Shamsuddin's audacity and impolite attitude reached such a level that he did not give a hoot to anyone. "He has embarrassed the

country's respected dignitaries keeping them standing in the court room. Although he was a justice, he made political remarks, said Ripon. In the letter, sent on

September 13, Justice Shamsuddin, who retires on October 1, alleged that Chief Justice Surendra Kumar Sinha removed him from a Supreme Court bench "out of his personal grudge" and did not allow him to take part in the bench's activities since September 9.

Ripon, also an international affairs secretary of BNP, said the past BNP government did not regularise Justice Shamsuddin's job at the High Court for knowing very well that he was "an extremely wrongheaded person".

Demand for VC's removal keeps ringing at Sust

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Opponent teachers observe work abstention, continue demonstration, also demand probe into BCL's recent attack on them

The demonstrating teachers of the Shahjalal University of Science and Technology (Sust) yesterday observed work stoppage as they continued to press home their demand of removal of Vice Chancellor Prof Aminul Haque Bhuiyan.

The teachers, under the banner "Mohan Muktijuddher Chetonay Udbuddho Shikkhak Brindo", also organised a rally on the campus.

Besides, they stormed the registrar's office demanding that the authorities concerned accept resignation letters submitted by them earlier this year. The teachers left after Isfaqul Hosain, the registrar, told them that the vice chancellor did not take any decision in this regard as he has been ill.

Speakers at the rally alleged that the vice chancellor has influenced Bangladesh Chhatra League activists to turn against them in a bid to cling to his post.

Prof Syed Shamsul Alam, convener of the teachers' platform, said BCL men assaulted several teachers when the activists swooped on their pre-scheduled demonstration to stop VC Aminul Haque Bhuiyan from entering his office on SEE PAGE 5 COL 4

One person dies every seven seconds from the disease globally, reveals a workshop stressing the need for regular diabetic retinopathy screening

Bangladesh is currently home to 8.4 million diabetics, half of who do not even know the status of their disease, said experts at a workshop yesterday.

Diabetes caused deaths of 4.9 million people in 2014 across the world, meaning the disease kills one person every seven seconds.

The workshop on diabetic retinopathy was organised jointly by Helen Keller International-Bangladesh and National Institute of Ophthalmology & Hospital (NIOH) in the capital's Krishibid Institute, said

informed that at present, there are 387 million people (one in 12 people) living with diabetes across the world. This number is estimated to increase to 592 million by 2035.

Diabetes is rapidly spreading in South Asia, and 77 percent of people with diabetes live in low and middle income countries, experts observed.

If diabetes is poorly controlled, diabetic retinopathy, which leads to blindness, can occur. At present, 1.8 million people in Bangladesh have some form of diabetic retinopathy (27

percent prevalence among diabetics).

The workshop also focused on the importance of diabetic retinopathy screening at the national and subnational level and developing a strategy to fight it.

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

Addressing a press conference in the capital's Pan Pacific Sonargaon Hotel, Zarif explained the reason for his visit, saying Iran considered Bangladesh extremely important as the latter stood for it in international forums. "Bangladesh supported us in the course of our struggle," he added. Javad Zarif said the two countries were discussing inking deals, including for avoiding double taxation and customs cooperation, for easing visas for officials and for cooperation in the energy sector once the sanctions were lifted.
