going on a journey of over 250 kilometres. And quite naturally we are worried," Nazrul Islam, who works in a private firm, said before getting into a Rajshahi-bound bus at Kalyanpur around noon.

Passengers got stuck at different exit points of the capital like Gabtoli and Abdullahpur of Uttara due to huge traffic congestion and haphazard vehicular movements.

"Our bus left Mohakhali around 9:00am and it took more than two hours to cross Uttara," said Kalimullah, a businessman travelling to Naogaon.

Even Road Transport and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader said Gabtoli and Abdullahpur points were two major sources of sufferings for the home-goers after the minister himself remained stuck there for about half an hour on Thursday and Friday, despite having police protocol.

"I have ordered the authorities to take steps for dealing with the chaotic situation at Gabtoli and Abdullahpur," he told The Daily Star over the phone.

The minister will visit Gabtoli today to observe the situation and will give directives to the police authorities and others concerned for taking necessary measures to smoothen vehicular movement through this point, says a ministry press release.

The Eid holidaymakers, who travdistricts in Chittagong division, had to spend hours in tailbacks on Dhaka-Tangail and Dhaka-Chittagong high-

ways yesterday. Passengers there had similar experiences in the last two days.

From 6:00am to 10:00am yesterday, hundreds of vehicles remained stranded on both sides of the Dhaka-Tangail highway from Chandra Intersection of Gazipur to Mirzapur in Tangail.

"I started from Dhaka's Mohakhali around 9:00am. It took six hours to reach Tangail town as my bus got stuck at many points," said Shiblee Ahmed, a passenger.

Hundreds of vehicles were stuck on either side of Dhaka-Chittagong highway in Daudkandi of Comilla in the early hours of yesterday. Drivers blamed the tailback there on cratered highway.

Highway police said torrential rain, huge traffic flow ahead of the Eid and haphazard movement of cattle-laden vehicles were the reasons behind the gridlocks.

Commuter Mohammad Asaduzzaman along with his brother and uncle had to wait for more than two hours at Patuaria launch ghat in Manikganj.

"I went to the ghat around 9:00am and could not board a ferry before 11:00am. Had there been no rain, life could be much easier," he told The Daily Star later.

# Austria sees fresh

FROM PAGE 16 Within days of the border closure, Croatia said it could not cope with the influx of arrivals and began to redirect the migrants back towards Hungary or towards Slovenia, sparking angry reactions from both countries.

Many of the migrants are fleeing the war in Syria, with the European Union receiving almost a quarter of a million asylum requests from April through June. Germany alone expects up to a

million asylum seekers this year.

At the Austrian town of Nickelsdorf on the Hungarian border, some 7,000 refugees and migrants were stuck waiting for onwards transport to elsewhere in Europe -- some of them in a long snaking line for buses, others hoping for taxis to take them to Vienna.

"Once you get to Austria, you've arrived," said Saeed, a 23-year-old from Damascus who is hoping his odyssey will end in Germany.

"As we approach the Europe that we want, people are getting nicer and nicer."

There were more bottlenecks elsewhere along the long migrant trail up from Greece through the Balkans, as authorities in a string of countries struggle to cope with the inflow.

At Tovarnik in Croatia, on the border with Serbia, the interior ministry said nearly 4,000 people were waiting for transport towards Hungary.

The number of public buses should be increased to ease traffic congestion, said architect Iqbal Habib, requesting the mayors to set up bus stops and passenger sheds.

Shamim Uz-Zaman Basunia, president of the Institution of Engineers Bangladesh, criticised VIPs, army personnel and lawmakers, saying they often take the wrong side of the roads causing traffic jam.

While giving a presentation, Prof Md Shamsul Hoque said grid pattern of roads facilitates smooth traffic movement but in case of Dhaka, it is not possible.

"Gradual shifting of the capital has become inevitable."

Additional Commissioner (traffic) Khandaker Golam Faruk and Chairman of Urban Habitat Ltd Architect Tanwir Nawaz also presented papers on traffic congestion and its solutions.

FROM PAGE 1 Dalmiya was appointed the interim president of the BCCI in June 2013, when N Srinivasan stepped down. Srinivasan returned as the president in October 2013. On March 2015, Dalmiya became the president of the BCCI again after a 10-year gap. He was also president of the ICC from 1997 to 2000. His health had been a cause of

concern for a long time but he was said to be recuperating well in Kolkata. Dalmiya was credited largely with bringing in money into Indian cricket during his initial years with the Board. The BCCI expressed its condolence

after the sudden demise while BCCI Secretary Anurag Thakur called it a personal loss.

"The greatest sports administrator of India has passed away, an era ends. A personal loss to me & Indian cricket. @BCCI #RIPDalmiyaJi," Thakur tweeted.

Dalmiya was also a selfless patron of Bangladesh cricket. It was because of his patronisation that Bangladesh won the Test status in 2000 when he was president of the game's governing body.

Saber Hossain Chowdhury, former president of Bangladesh Cricket Board, said Dalmiya's contribution to Bangladesh cricket was invaluable. "I'm deeply saddened at the loss of

Before submitting the charges, the IO took approval from the home ministry as it is a mandatory provision for bringing sedition charges against any person.

On November 7, the court will decide whether the charge will be accepted or not.

On October 19 last year, advocate Moshiur Rahman Malek, president of Bangabandhu Foundation, lodged the lawsuit with the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court of Dhaka.

After the hearing, the same court asked the police to submit a probe report on the issue after getting the home ministry's approval.

In his case statement, Moshiur alleged that Tarique had called Sheikh Mujibur Rahman "Pakbandhu" at a discussion in London.
