Prepoins for Eid

Even though you have brought all of your furniture and set them in your new place, the house does not feel cosy until all of your little decorations are brought out (which in my case are a wooden woodpecker and a jute owl) and put to their honourable posts.

These little things are what give your house an identity that speaks of you (a.k.a. screams out that you are one of those odd people who like owls). So, a little twist and turn in the small adornments will change the mood of your house from glum weekdays to upbeat festivities. We are here with an array of such adjustments that you can try this Eid for a household makeover.

BRING OUT THE CURTAINS

It is a thing that our mums have been doing for years. The fancy curtains are all hidden in some brilliant place all year and show up only the night before Eid, all gorgeous and ready to bedazzle the guests. Add a little extra to your regular fancy curtains. This can be a piece of the ancient Banarasi sari dominating the living room window in red or a hand woven piece with hand stitched designs. You can get the hand woven curtain at Aarong for Tk600 or so and for the sari, Grandmas' closet is the best place to go.

PLANT IT UP

We love plants here at LS and even more so on the Eid days. A small plant as a centre-piece of any sitting area never fails to lift up the spirit. While bringing a small plant indoors, make sure that it does not need much maintenance or does not die on you for the slightest of inconvenience.

Cacti, Bonsais, Spider Plants, Snake
Plants, and English Ivies are good choices in
this case. Put your plant in a personalised
pot for that festive look. You can buy clay
pots from any nursery or roadside vendor.
Have a look at Clay Image for colourful
ceramic pots. Go with white ceramic if you
are looking for the sense of peace and
relaxation.

THROW PILLOWS EVERYWHERE

Throw pillows instantly give the idea of fun, comfortable reclining and you know you will need a lot of that in between the preparing, cooking, and eating of meaty delicacies in these holidays. 18*18 cushions will cost you less than Tk200 and if paired with colourful and bedazzled cushions, they alone will bring Eid to your home.

MAKE YOUR HOME RUGGED

Yes, it's a bad pun but seriously, a rug placed right in your home is, sometimes, all you



need to make up your place. Put an emphasis on jute rugs because that is what we make best. If you only require a rug, go to Satranji, the store dedicated to rugs and carpets, and if you are around Aarong, their collection of jute rugs is also worth checking out.

SPRINKLE WITH FLOWER

Artificial perfumed sprays are okay if it's a normal day and we are exhausted from

work but Eid calls for something different and exciting. Aromatise your home with natural fragrances. Lilies of all kinds are famous for their sweet smell. Bring in our own Butterfly Lily (Dolon Chapa) for long lasting serenity.

Butterfly lilies are sold on the streets throughout monsoon. You can go to Shahbag for more choices of flowers. There are also specialised flower shops in Gulshan and Banani area who sell flowers that are very good for the eyes. Choose a flower vase that goes with the length of your flower stem (a longer one for butterfly lilies). Opt for interesting shapes and colours of the vase rather than mirrors, beads or other jewels that overpower your flower.

We started with small decoration pieces that you can buy to make your home more festive and we are going to end with that. There are a lot of small shops such as Idea Crafts that are filled with trinkets and knick-knacks. Go and buy the trinket that's your favourite. Try not to go overboard with them. A little change here and there such as a red skillet hanging in the kitchen and wood parrot swinging by the balcony door (found at Aarong) should be just perfect for your Eid.
