## Facilities in ruins

Nine weeks into the training camp for the upcoming 12th South Asian Games, the athletes are still facing constraints at different venues as well dormitories, resulting in the athletes not fully concentrating on training.

The high-ups of the different national federations raised those issues at the meeting of the Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) yesterday and requested them to solve those problems immediately so that the athletes could train unhindered.

The federation officials informed BOA officials that some 10 to 12 athletes were accommodated in a single room of the NSC dormitory, the table tennis and badminton teams couldn't practice well on the damaged floor of the Shaheed Tajuddin Ahmed Gymnasium, the swimmers couldn't judge their real performances without electronic timers, the gymnasium and dormitory of Mohammad Ali boxing stadium are in poor condition, the NSC gymnasium lacks sufficient lighting, while there are problems in toilets and bathrooms of the Women's Sports Complex in Dhanmondi and Mirpur Krira Palli.

### FIFA fines **Hong Kong**

FIFA has fined Hong Kong after fans jeered the Chinese national anthem and threw a drink at a rival player during a World Cup qualifier, the city's football authorities said Tuesday.

Fans booed the "March of the Volunteers" -- the anthem they share with China -- at the game against Qatar in Hong Kong last month which the home side lost 3-2.

A carton of lemon tea was also thrown at a Qatari player.

Possible sanctions from world football's governing body could have included playing future matches behind closed doors, but Hong Kong escaped with a fine and a warning.

The Hong Kong Football Association said it had been fined 5,000 Swiss francs (\$5,100) over the "improper conduct among the supporters of its team".

# Uzbeks complete hosts' misery

Bangladesh's flickering hopes of qualifying for the AFC U-19 Championship finals

were put out by a 4-0 defeat at the hands of favourites Uzbekistan at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. The hosts played comparatively better in their last match against the best side of the group, yet their best effort came as no consolation as they conceded two late goals to make the scoreline far more humbling than it should have.

The only consolation for the beleaguered hosts, though, was finishing second in the group and above the two other South Asian sides. Sri Lanka edged Bhutan to the third position after beating the latter 2-0 in the first match of the day.

Having started the campaign with the target of grabbing one of the five best runners-up spots among 10 groups, Bangladesh had made their life difficult with a 1-1 draw against Bhutan

Sunday following a 2-0 win against Sri Lanka, which meant they needed to win against the Uzbeks in order to qualify.

The coaching staff was hoping against hope of a surprise win against the Uzbeks, but once the team conceded the lead in the second minute, any such hopes all but ended. Having rattled the crossbar in the 12th second of the match, the Central Asian side grabbed the lead 64 seconds later when No. 10, Doston Ibragimov, picked the far corner of the net with a powerful shot as Bangladesh defence failed to clear a corner. That goal, according to Bangladesh coach Saiful Bari Titu, put the hosts on the backfoot.

"We thought we would keep them at bay in the first half and try to nick it, if we could, in the second. But once we conceded a goal within two minutes, that plan went out of the window," said the coach at his post-

## Klopp keeps mum over Reds rumour

Jurgen Klopp is staying tight-lipped about rumours linking him to the vacancy at Liverpool with the ex-Borussia Dortmund coach widely tipped as the hot favourite to replace Brendan Rodgers.

Klopp was in Leverkusen on Monday to attend a coaching conference and refused to comment to a reporter from German daily Bild with the British media making the 48-year-old the overwhelming favourite to replace Rodgers, who was sacked on Sunday.

"There's nothing to say, neither this nor that. I'm driving home now," said Klopp, who has been on sabbatical since quitting Dortmund at the end of last season.

Meanwhile, ex-Germany captain Oliver Kahn says Klopp's good level of English makes him an ideal candidate to awaken the sleeping giants, who are 10th in the Premier League table, but the language barrier could still be a problem, especially given the strong Merseyside accent.

"The question is always a bit about the language barrier," said Kahn.

"From the technical side of things, there is nothing to think about.

"I'd absolutely trust him to have no big problem with English, but sometimes, as far as motivating a team goes, there are subtleties in the team language and whether he already has those subtleties remains to be seen."

# Brazil missing Neymar

Much has changed for Brazil's national team since last year's humiliating World Cup exit, but as the 2018 quali-

fying campaign gets underway Thursday one worrying factor stays the same: the absence of superstar Neymar.

More than a year has passed since that extraordinary 7-1 meltdown against Germany in Brazil's own World Cup. Since then there's been the almost

equally embarrassing failure to survive the Copa America, going out to lowly Paraguay on penalties. The coach has been changed and there have been endless post-mortems.

But in all that turmoil, the footballmad nation has remained fixated on national captain and Barcelona star Neymar and the near obsessive fear

Now with two matches still left on that suspension, Neymar will again be absent for Brazil's 2018 opening qualifiers against Chile on Thursday and Venezuela on 13 October. A promise to improve his conduct --

"I mustn't let myself do such stupid things," he said in Barcelona recently -and an appeal for his suspensions to be postponed failed. And Brazil is dreading the consequences.

For pessimists, Neymar isn't just important: the supremely skilled scoring machine is one of the last represen-

tatives of Brazil's fabled "jogo bonito," or beautiful game.

The question many here ask is whether the reliance on Neymar doesn't illustrate the broader failure of a system that focuses on exporting of young talent to clubs abroad, robbing the country of the chance to develop a whole team of Neymars.

Since his debut against the United States on August 10, 2010, Neymar has played 67 games for Brazil, scoring 46 times and missing only four nonfriendlies.

When he has been missing, the yawning hole has been impossible to fill.

Three of the big recent defeats -against Germany in World Cup semis, then a 3-0 loss to Holland in the thirdplace match, and the Copa America loss in June to Paraguay -- took place without Neymar. In his absence the team only won once in a full international.

## Bale voted best of Euro 2016 Welsh player
