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Cops go tough on medical entry protests

7 demonstrators hurt in baton charge, 'pepper spray'

Police yesterday baton-charged and dispersed the agitating medical admission seekers at the capital's Karwan Bazar as the students were marching towards the health directorate to submit "evidence of question paper leak."

Protesters alleged law enforcers beat them up and fired pepper spray at them, injuring at least seven of them.

Police, however, denied the allegation.

From Karwan Bazar, the admission seekers returned to the Central Shaheed Minar where they had started their programme in the morning, and declared a sit-in there for

Khaled Saifullah, a spokesperson for the agitating students, said, "We only wanted to submit some evidence of question paper leak but came under police attack."

"We will go on with our movement until our demands are met," he said.

The agitators want to press home their demands including cancellation of the results of this year's MBBS and Bachelor of Dental Surgery (BDS) admission tests, alleging the question papers were leaked. Meanwhile, Health Minister Mohammad Nasim yester-

day termed the students' movement "illogical".

Investigators keep mum on probe status

Six days into the killing of Japanese national Kunio Hoshi, investigators are keeping mum about any development in the probe.

Police continued to avoid journalists yesterday, the second day of the two suspects' 10-day remand. Information gleaned from the duo could not be known as Rezaul Karim, officer-incharge of Kaunia Police Station, didn't answer phone calls.

The phone of Mohammad Abdur Razzaq, district superintendent of police, was switched off. His office premises were put offlimits to journalists.

DIG Humayun Kabir of Rangpur police and Mamunur Rashid, subinspector of Kaunia Police Station and also investigating officer of the case, didn't return calls.

Nitor limps with inadequate staff

Patients in need of emergency surgery suffer most

With badly fractured legs, Kawsar was rushed to the capital's National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation (Nitor) around 2:00am on September 15.

It had already been 13 hours since an iron rod-carrying truck run him over at Konabari in Gazipur.

As his injuries were severe, an immediate

surgery was required, but he had to endure an excruciating pain for several hours since the operating theatre dedicated for emergency patients had a long queue of patients.

"They [the medical staffs] were talking about [the patients'] serial numbers. But my son was in extreme pain and was fainting," said Kawsar's mother Majeda Begum.

Doctors amputated his left leg from above the knee around 10:00am, eight SEE PAGE 13 COL 5

Trio wins Nobel Prize in chemistry


Sweden's Tomas Lindahl, Paul Modrich of the United States and Aziz Sancar, a Turkish-American, won the 2015 Nobel Chemistry Prize yesterday for work on how cells repair damaged DNA.

DNA REPAIR WORK

The three opened a dazzling frontier in medicine by unveiling how the body repairs DNA mutations that can cause sickness and contribute to ageing, the Nobel jury said.

"Their systematic work has made a decisive contribution to the understanding of how the living cell functions, as well as providing knowledge about the molecular causes of several hereditary diseases and about mechanisms behind both cancer development and ageing," the panel said.

Russia fires missiles at 'Isis targets' from Caspian Sea

Assad starts ground offensive

Sea in the first major combined assault across the air and ground in Moscow's escalating campaign in the war-torn country.

The missiles were aimed at Isis targets, according to the Kremlin.

They were deployed as Russia's ally, Syrian President Bashar al-Assad, started a ground offensive in rebel-held areas where jihadists from the so-called Islamic State are thought not to have a presence.

The Russian Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu said on Russian television that 26 missile strikes were launched on Wednesday from four warships, destroying all 11 intended targets, in an attack which adds a new level of complexity and violence to the Syrian conflict.


