Govt advises Bangladeshis not to visit Libya

The government yesterday advised Bangladesh nationals not to visit Libya until further notice. "Bangladesh nationals,

including migrant workers, are again strongly advised not to undertake any visit to Libya in view of the ongoing fighting and deteriorating security situation," said a press statement of the finance ministry yesterday.

The ministry said it is monitoring the situation. "Unless unavoidable,

visiting Bangladesh nationals from Libya are also advised to refrain from travelling back to Libya for the time being," the press release added.

The government in July this year suspended its mission in Libya and relocated its embassy to Tunisia.

"We decided to conduct Friday's admission tests after a request from the academic council and considering the anxiety of the admission seekers and their parents," JnU Teachers' Association President Prof Ali Noor told The Daily Star.

But the decision of not holding the tests slated for October 16 and 30 will remain in effect, he added.

On Wednesday, the JnU Teachers'

Egg consumption not related to heart diseases

Say experts at roundtable marking World Egg Day today

Consumption of eggs has no significant link with heart diseases, said livestock scientists and nutritionists yesterday.

Referring to a recent study by the Harvard School of Public Health, they said negative perception that regular egg consumption leads to heart diseases has been proved incorrect, and suggested regular intake of eggs, especially by pregnant women and growing children.

The recommendations came at a roundtable at The Daily Star Centre on the eve of World Egg Day today. The United Nation's Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) organised the programme "Egg The Good Food" in association with the Bangladesh Animal Agriculture

Society (BAAS).

"Instead of worrying about eggs, focus on eating an overall healthy diet and getting regular exercise. An average of one egg a day can be part of that lifestyle," according to the Harvard Health Publications dated January 1 this year.

It said eggs are relatively low in calories and saturated fat and rich in protein, vitamins, minerals, and other healthy nutrients, which are good for the eyes, and choline, which is needed by nerves and the brain.

"Most of the cholesterol that circulates in our bodies is not from cholesterol in foods, but rather from our liver making cholesterol in response to high intake of saturated SEE PAGE 5 COL 2

Earlier on October 5, the same court sent Shahadat to jail after he surrendered before it seeking bail.

The court on that day rejected Shahadat's bail petition considering the seriousness of the allegations brought against him in the
