

Mythology as muse

Ronni Ahmmed's solo exhibition at Bengal Art Lounge

Bengal Art Lounge is holding a solo exhibition of paintings, installations and video by Ronni Ahmmed titled "Gods and Beast". The exhibition addresses many of the great religious and spiritual traditions that have crossed Bengal at one point or the other, in particular Buddhism, Hinduism and Sufism. The viewer is plunged into frenzied depictions of religious scenes often rendered with a colour palette reminiscent of the American comic books of mid-20th century. Far from being an obstacle to accessing the superior meaning of these celebrated scenes, Ahmmed's "cosmic comic" aesthetics lays it bare. His works focus on

the connect between spiritual suffering and

socio-political upheaval, a condition caused by the lack of spiritual enrichment, he says. In "Tears of the Blazing Brain" he depicts how the good and evil of Gods and beasts affects the real world and influences human salvation. This is a criticism of our capitalist culture and greed. There is Jesus Christ in the "The Last Supper" with

an unusual interpretation. There is also a description of the resurrection of Christ. In another work,

Buddha has attained the state of Nirvana and is seen almost disappearing in a mass of yellow. In a work influenced

by Egyptian mythology, a

goddess "Nedia", is seen swallowing the sun, so that the sun is thrown into the daytime and day time begins. In "Hydra", Hercules attacks Hydra with a fleet of UFOs. If you cut one head of the Hydra


another grows in its place. There is multicoloured glitter along with pink, green and yellow. The creature is on marshland and the fleet of UFOs is shown attacking it with laser beams.

The meditating Saraswati has the Hindu goddess of knowledge

and arts with three blue swans. The majority of these are reconstruction of icons. These are windows of spiritual energy, Ronni says.

There is also a depiction of Medusa, a Greek monster who turns everything that she sees into stone. She is deadly as her head sprouts green, red and yellow snakes.

The 28-year-old actress believes most of the problems related to women stem from the fact that "feminine" and "compassion" are treated as inferior qualities.

DURGA PUJA

Rhythmic musical instruments in demand

....... Rhythmic musical instruments are selling well as Durga Puja is on in full swing.

The makers of these instruments are busy trying to meet their orders.

Reazul Karim Aslam, proprietor of Nabab and Co, a prominent musical instrument shop of the town, says that business is better compared to last year.

Suvash Chandra Das, a maker of rhythmic instruments, adds that during the festivals of the Hindus including Durga Puja, business gathers momentum.

Buyers from adjacent districts like Jamalpur, Sherpur, Netrokona, Tangail, Kishoreganj and Gazipur come to Mymensingh town to pick up the musical instruments, says Suvash. Musical instruments in great demand during

Puja and other festivals are Bangla dhol, dhak (big

drum), khol, dholok, dugi, khamok, naal, tabla and khonjori, adds Suvash. As different rhythmic instruments including dhak and dhol are an integral part of Durga and Kali Puja, the demand for these instruments picks

up during the festival, said Shankar Saha, organis-

ing secretary of Mymensingh Puja Celebration Committee. Quality wood, plastic drum, goat skin, cow and buffalo hide, bamboo and jute are used to make such rhythmic instruments, said Gopal Das, a young maker of instruments.

The prices of these instruments are reasonable this year.

Ujjal Chandra Das, another young artiste of the town said, they are swamped with orders from in and outside the district.

The price of materials used to make rhythmic instruments has increased in recent years and the sale price has also increased, opening a new opportunity for artistes who follow their ancestral profession, young artiste Ujjal said.

Rhythmic musical instruments are also in demand in European countries including England and Germany, said Arzu Perves, a tabla maestro and district cultural officer in Mymensingh.
