# GILBY CLARKE IN DHAKA

#### We need rock music back alive and well

Gilby Clarke, a former guitarist of legendary band Guns N' Roses, along with his band members E.J. Curse and Troy Patrick Ferrell, was in Dhaka to present rock 'n' roll during their maiden tour of Bangladesh. A day before their performance on Friday evening at the Bangabandhu International Conference Centre, The Daily Star caught up with the internationally acclaimed guitarist and his band for an exclusive interview. Excerpts: How does it feel to be performing in Dhaka?

Gilby: So far, so good. It's been only a few hours since we're here. What's really special about Bangladesh is its people. Everybody is so kind and they are hospitable. We can feel the warmth.

What are the things that inspire you to do music?

Gilby: What inspired me when I was younger is different from what inspires me now. When I was younger it was all about dream. Led Zeppelin, Kiss, Alice Cooper, Aerosmith those were the bands I was listening to when I was young. And I was attracted to the guitar. I wanted to be a guitar player. I knew what I wanted to do, and I kept starting new bands, and working with many people.

Nowadays it's a little bit easier and a little bit harder. It's easier because we are a lot more focused and we know what we are doing, but the world is different. It's harder to do what we want to do now, as you don't have the control anymore.

You've been a part of GN'R back in 1991; how was the journey with them? Gilby: GN'R was very popular, and things were great at that time. We were playing at stadiums and the records were selling out. That was a great time for rock 'n' roll. When we brought out "The Spaghetti Incident", the band was really clicking; we had just finished a two-and-half-year tour. Everybody knew their place; Slash and I knew what we needed to do on guitars.

Everybody knew what songs we were playing and we knew how to get a good performance. I love that time. How would you compare your solo career with the career you had with GN'R?

Gilby: There's no comparison actually. GN'R is a little bit more successful; just a little bit more. Artistes move on to solo careers, because there's something they cannot do with a band. My solo albums are an extension of music I like. When you work solo you have more control over what you're doing and you get to work with a lot of people.

You've collaborated with many musicians; which have been the most special experiences?

Gilby: I played guitar for the band Heart. Ann Wilson from Heart is an incredible singer. She sings great every single night. Slash is great. One of the things that I admire about Slash is that he really is keeping the rock 'n' roll flag flying right now. There must be a lot of guitars in your collection; which one is your favourite? Gilby: My favorite guitar is Zemaitis. I honestly don't know how many guitars I have, but I guess I own around 70 guitars. Which band has the greatest influence on you?

Gilby: It's hard to say, but I would say the Rolling Stones.

Would you consider collaborating with a Bangladeshi singer/band?

Gilby: Absolutely. I've collaborated with Pakistani singer Atif Aslam on stage. As musicians we like to collaborate with other musicians. A good song is a good song; it doesn't matter where it comes from. Do you have any message for your fans in

Gilby: Of course! Keep rock 'n' roll alive. We need rock music back alive and well. And that's why we are doing these tours





Bengal Foundation instituted the annual Subir Choudhury Practice Grant to commemorate late Trustee of Bengal Foundation Subir Choudhury's lifelong contribution to develop a support structure for artists from Bangladesh. The recipients of the 2015/2016 Subir Choudhury Practice Grant were announced on October 16 at a programme held at Bengal Shilpalaya, Dhanmondi.

Mahfuz Anam, Editor and Publisher of The Daily Star, gracing the occasion as chief guest, handed the grant to Abir Shome and Eshita Mitra Tonny who received Taka 2 lakhs each as grant money. Luva Nahid Choudhury, Director General of Bengal Foundation, elaborated on the Subir Choudhury Practice Grant, its purpose and the painstaking process of selecting the worthiest recipients.

"Artists have to think of bringing about changes for the people, society and country through their artistic efforts. Artists have outstanding abilities to express themselves. They have to speak for humanity and people outside the art arena should attempt to search and revive the inner artistic self and conscience," said Mahfuz Anam.

"I am indebted to my family for my being an artist. I am grateful to my friend Rafiqul Islam Shubho who taught and inspired me to pursue art. I will try to fulfill my commitment to Bengal Foundation that I expressed through a written statement," said Abir Shome.

"I am very happy to learn that I have been selected finally as I never thought of getting this honour. I thought I could not work anymore due to lack of inspiration and motivation. But, this grant has ignited my passion and I'll practice my art wholeheartedly," said Eshita Mitra Tonny.

Luva Nahid Choudhury also declared Munem Wasif, as a regular art grand awardee of Bengal Foundation.

Noted artist Dilara Begum Jolly spoke at the event on behalf of the advisory council for Subir Choudhury Practice Grant. Two other members for the council included eminent artist Syed Jahangir and artist Mahbub Jamal

Shamim. Chairman of Bengal Foundation Abul Khair along with eminent artists --Monirul Islam, Hashem Khan and Kalidas Karmakar attended the event.

The 10 selected artists who applied digitally for the Subir Choudhury Practice Grant 2015-16 were -- Abir Shome (Digital Collage, Printmaking, Drawing, Painting and Video); Afsana Sharmin (Sculpture, Drawing and Performance); Bishwajit Goswami (Painting and Installation); Eshita Mitra Tonny (Sculpture, Printmaking and Video), Md. Pervaj Hasan (Painting); Muhammad Rafiqul Islam (Video, Photography, Digital Collage, Drawing and Painting); Munem Wasif (Photography and Video); Palash Bhattacharjee (Installation, Video and Performance); Sanad Kumar Biswas (Sculpture, Performance, Painting and Drawing) and Shimul Shaha (Installation, Printmaking and Photography).

They all received recognition certificates from Bengal Foundation. Later, a short documentary on Subir Choudhury Practice Grant 2015/16 was screened at the venue.

## Leonardo DiCaprio to visit the Indian capital
