## 114 Bangladeshis brought back

One hundred and fourteen more Bangladeshi trafficking victims, who were rescued by the Malaysian authorities from the Andaman Sea in May, returned home from Kuala Lumpur yesterday.

They landed in Dhaka in a Biman Bangladesh Airlines flight around 5:30am.

Begum Shahida Sultana, first secretary (labour wing) at the Bangladesh High Commission in Kuala Lumpur, told The Daily Star over phone that the returnees hailed from Cox's Bazar, Sirajganj, Narsingdi, Narayanganj, Jessore, Jhenidah, Chuadanga and Joypurhat.

With the 114, a total of 620 Bangladeshis, who were rescued from

the sea, have come back to the country, she said, adding that 96 more would return later. The high commission official also

said Bangladesh government was bearing all the expenses required for repatriation of the Bangladeshis. A total of 716 Bangladeshi migrants were among over 1,051 trafficking

victims rescued from Langkawi island of Malaysia on May 11. The traffickers had abandoned them in the island after holding them captive in a Thai jungle for weeks.

Over 3000 Bangladeshis have been rescued in Malaysia, Indonesia, Thailand and Myanmar in May after the issue of human trafficking through the Bay of Bengal got international media's attention, said

The government wants to launch the satellite on December 16 on the occasion of the 45th anniversary of the country's victory in the Liberation War, she said.

"This will be a great achievement for us and it will lead us to real digitisation," Tarana told The Daily Star over the phone after the approval.

According to a BTRC feasibility study, the satellite will narrow the digital divide, as it will take broadcasting and telecommunication services to rural areas and introduce profitable services, including directto-home services, across the country.

Industry experts said the satellite will help facilitate new services and create jobs.

ATM Monirul Alam, convener of the proposal evaluation committee, said they would need a couple of days to award the work order, as some formalities were still to be completed.

The project documents will be placed before Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina for approval. Since it is a high-priority project, the approval is likely to come without any delay, said Monirul, commissioner for spectrum management at the BTRC.

He said they will give Thales Alenia Space 24 months to launch the satellite. The company will, however, get an additional period of

### Single authority needed to deal with traffic problem

Says outgoing WB country director

Johannes Zutt, outgoing country director of the World Bank, yesterday came up with his own idea on how to resolve the nagging traffic congestion in Dhaka city.

"This [traffic congestion] is a metropolitan problem and it will not be solved until a single institution is empowered to deal with the issue," Johannes told reporters at the launch of the Bangladesh Development Update at the WB's Dhaka office.

Lots of institutions, including Dhaka city corporations, Rajuk, roads and highways and BRTA, deal with transport issues. But there is no single institution that is empowered to tackle the problem, he said.

"You have to convince every single institution to adopt essentially the same plan and we all know how difficult it is to deal with six, seven or eight institutions," he said.

Traffic congestion on Dhaka roads eats up much of people's productivity, time and energy. Everyone in the capital -from ministers to ordinary citizens -- has been facing this problem.

The WB boss in Dhaka said Bangladesh needs to increase competency of its institutions to become a middle income country. It should not be complacent with 6.5 percent growth rate, as many economies grew by 8-10 percent annually for years.

Johannes Zutt, a Dutch national who became WB country director for Bangladesh and Nepal in May 2013, has been transferred to Turkey as country director of the global lender.
