Facilitated rape of two women by Pakistani occupation army; first witness testifies at tribunal

The first prosecution witness yesterday testified how three Habiganj "Razakars" killed two freedom fighters, including his elder brother, on November 11 during the 1971 Liberation War.

Mostor Ali also said 15 days before that, the accused and other Razakars took the Pakistani occupation army to the house of Col MA Rab, an Awami League candidate in the 1970's general

election, and looted it and set it on fire.

The Pakistani army, with the help of the accused, Muhibur Rahman Boromian, his brother Mujibur Rahman Angur Mian and their cousin Abdur Razzak, raped two women, he told the three-member International Crimes Tribunal-1.

The sexagenarian witness said the Pakistani army went to their village Eralia Prokash Khagaura a month after the Liberation War began on March 25, 1971 and appointed Syed Nazrul

Islam, a Nezam-e-Islami candidate during the election, leader of Peace Committee of Habiganj Mahakuma.

Later, Nazrul appointed Muhibur and his elder brother Kolomdhar Mian as leaders of Peace Committee of Khagraura Union, he said.

Question leak protesters to hold solidarity rally again tomorrow

Agitating medical college admission seekers will hold a solidarity rally at the capital's Shahbagh at 4:00pm tomor row, renewing the demand for rerun of the entrance test.

"Though we have been demonstrating for the last 33 days for a fresh exam, the authorities concerned did not respond positively to our logical demand; so we vowed to hold a solidarity rally at Shahbagh once again," said Ayatullah Hasnat Behesti, a representative of the protesters.

He made the announcement at a press briefing at TSC of Dhaka University yesterday.

Protests broke out against the admission test question leak since the exam was held on September 18.

On Tuesday, the agitators met the representatives of Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA) to form a public committee to investigate the leak but they failed to reach a consensus.

Behesti said, "BMA representatives assured us of extending their support by scrutinising the matter if we give them our evidence. But we demanded that they form a probe committee by including some credible persons. Since they rejected our proposal, we did not give them our evidence."

Acknowledging this, BMA's Dhaka city unit Vicepresident Abdur Rauf Sarder said the body had to comprise only BMA members to remain impartial.

Another project launched to boost hilsa production

A project "ECOFISH" was launched in the capital yesterday in order to increase the production of hilsa in the country.

The fisheries department and WorldFish, an international NGO working for conservation of fish resources in Bangladesh, jointly will implement the five-year long ECOFISH (Enhanced Costal Fisheries in Bangladesh) project which is being

funded by USAID. If the project is implemented properly, Bangladesh will be able to export hilsa to foreign countries in a larger scale after fulfilling the demand of the countrymen, said Fisheries and

Livestock Minister Muhammed Sayedul Hoque in the launching ceremony at the capital's Sonargaon ensured.

Under the project, one lakh women and men involved in hilsa fishing and trading will be trained on different skills enabling them to adopt alternative occupations during a ban on hilsa and jatka catching, and 20,000 families will be provided with direct livelihood support.

Besides, discussions will be held with law enforcing agencies, which monitor hilsa and jatka catching during a specific period and the use of mono filament net and other destructive gears, in order to find out and address challenges they face during

their drives. Stakeholders' engagement in resource conservation will also be


