government moves ahead with the execution of the two big war criminals," said an intelligence agency official.

Some police officials said Salauddin's power could be understood by just looking at the influence he has in the BNP, pro-BNP bodies, Jamaat, Islami Chhatra Shibir, and his international connections, including a Middle Eastern country and a South Asian country.

"He will try to do the worst possible things to delay or foil the process of his execution," one of them said.

Law enforcers believe their drives would help minimising the threat.

Talking to The Daily Star, Dhaka Metropolitan Police Commissioner Asaduzzaman Mia said, "Usually we prepare ahead of the implementation of war crimes verdicts. We will try to improve law and order arrangements based on intelligence before the [possible] execution of the verdict and deploy forces based on need."

A senior police official of Chittagong said they have adequate preparation to stop any attempt to disrupt law and order. Salauddin hails from Chittagong.

The official preferring anonymity said they have people under cover and in

uniform for maintaining law and order.

Another senior police official of Tangail said, "We have taken precautionary measures sensing that the government is going to execute the verdicts. Arrests are being made everyday to check any unwanted situation."

Police officials of Kushitia, Khulna and several districts also echoed the same.

Additional Commissioner (crime and operation) Chittagong Metropolitan Police (CMP) Devas Bhattacharya avoided responding to direct questions on threat information.

"It is very difficult to check ambushes but we have all out preparation to stop any untoward incidents in Chittagong," he told The Daily Star.

Biplob Kumar Sarker, deputy commissioner of DMP's Tejgaon zone said, "We have information that attempts will be made to destabilise law and order in the capital centring the [possible] execution of the verdicts."

He said they had taken all necessary measures to thwart any bid to hamper law and order. "We will tackle any chaos with an iron fist," he told The Daily Star.

The Supreme Court is set to hear today two petitions seeking review of its judgments that upheld death penalties for war criminals Mojaheed and

Salauddin.

The pleas have been enlisted in today's hearing list of a four-member Appellate Division bench headed by Chief Justice Surendra Kumar Sinha, according to the SC website.

The Appellate Division of the SC is set to hear another petition of Salauddin today.

The plea filed on October 19 urged the court to record statements of eight people, including five Pakistanis, during the hearing of his review petition.

Jamaat-e-Islami leader Mojaheed and BNP's Salauddin on October 14 submitted the petitions to the SC, seeking acquittal on all charges brought against them.

In the petitions, the condemned war criminals sought reconsideration of the SC judgments on the grounds that they were sentenced for "offences committed by others".

The SC upheld the capital punishment of the two leaders in June and July after hearing their appeals against the verdicts issued by the war crimes tribunal.

The tribunal issued the death warrants on October 1, a day after the SC released the full verdicts.

First glimpse

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Hole Oceanographic Institution (WHOI), said in a news release: "Over the years, there have been a small handful of possible sightings of Omura's whales, but nothing that was confirmed."

"They appear to occur in remote regions and are difficult to find at sea, because they are small—they range in length from approximately 33 to 38 feet—and do not put up a prominent blow."

"What little we knew about these whales previously came primarily from eight specimens of Omura's whales taken in Japanese scientific whaling off the Solomon and Keeling Islands and a couple strandings of dead animals in Japan," Cerchio said.

"This is the first definitive evidence and detailed descriptions of Omura's whales in the wild and part of what makes this work particularly exciting."

In a paper published this week in the Royal Society Open Science, the researchers described the whales 'foraging and vocal behaviours, and habitat preferences in the shallow waters of coastal Madagascar.'

Being substantially smaller than many other blue whale species, the Omura's whale had historically been misidentified as Bryde's whales. However, the animal has unique asymmetrical pigmentation on their head.

Along with the video footage, Cerchio's team has catalogued approximately 25 individual Omura's whales.

True to his words

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"I have no faith in cases," he said, without elaborating.

"Hanging or imprisoning some people will not bring any result unless good sense prevails among us," the bereaved father told this correspondent at his Paribagh residence yesterday.

"Creating a democratic environment in the country is necessary and we all should make efforts to this end."

No cases were filed as of 10:00 last night in connection with Dipan's killing.

Inspector (Investigation) Zafar Ali Biswas of Shahbagh Police Station said Dipan's father had agreed to file a case and he would come to the police station this morning.

However, Prof Fazlul Huq disagreed with the claim.

"I told them that I would submit a statement to the Dhaka University proctor at 10:00am tomorrow [today], giving my account of my son's murder. I will urge the university authorities to take necessary measures to this end," he said.

Dipan, owner of Jagriti Prokashani, was hacked to death inside his office at Shahbagh in the capital on Saturday.

Soon after the murder, Fazlul Huq told reporters: "I don't want justice. I want good sense to prevail."

Following the brutal murder and a similar attack on another publisher and two writers in Lalmatia the same day, politicians engaged in mudslinging.

Leaders of the ruling Awami League and its allies are blaming communal and anti-liberation forces in the BNP-led alliance for the killing.

AL Joint Secretary General Mahubul Alam Hanif even went as far as accusing Dipan's father of sharing the killers' ideology.

"The professor father who has lost his son perhaps believes in the political ideology of those who carried out the killing. He's made such remarks [that he does not want justice of his son's killers] because he doesn't want the people of his party to stand trial," he told newsmen yesterday.

However, Hanif apologised for his

comments when he was contacted last night.

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, meanwhile, took the opportunity to blame the government for its failure to ensure safety and security of the people.

In a statement on Saturday night, she claimed Dipan was a vice-president of Zia Memorial Library, and a BNP man.

'WE ALL ARE RESPONSIBLE'

BNP Vice-Chairman Hafiz Uddin Ahmed yesterday visited Fazlul Huq's residence to console him.

There, Hafiz said the government has totally failed to ensure people's security because it was concentrating only on clinging to power.

Fazlul Huq then stopped him short and said, "You are also responsible for this situation. If you [the BNP] could bring any positive change in your party, it would have an impact on other political parties."

"We all are responsible for today's situation," he said at one stage of the conversation with the BNP-delegation.

'AVIJIT THE ONLY REASON'

"Dipan was respectful to every religion and was never involved in blogging. It would be a sheer lie if anyone says he was a blogger," Fazlul Huq told The Daily Star.

Dipan never wrote or said anything on religion, he said.

"Dipan believed that followers of every religion will practise the ideals of their respective faiths. He never supported fighting, killing and spreading false propaganda in the name of religion."

"He kept himself away from any discussion on religion very cautiously," he said.

Publishing Avijit Roy's books is the only reason behind Dipan's murder, Fazlul Huq claimed.

"My son came to know about Avijit Roy when they were students of Udayan School. Dipan published two books of Avijit, who was murdered by the same people that killed my son."

The government is yet to come up with anything significant about the killing of Avijit, who was a brilliant student, said the frustrated academic.

Trial? I don't want it either

Faisal Arefin Dipan said he wouldn't seek trial of his son's killers, Rafida Ahmed Bonya, wife of murdered blogger Avijit Roy, echoed his words yesterday.

Hours after the brutal killing of Dipan on Saturday, his father Abul Quasem Fazlul Huq told reporters, "I don't want any trial. I want good sense to prevail. Both sides -- the one that's doing politics using secularism and the other that's doing politics using state religion -- are pushing the country towards destruction. Let good sense prevail on both sides."

Venting out her anger, Bonya yesterday wrote on her Facebook page that she too didn't seek trial of her husband's murderers.

Unidentified assailants hacked to death her husband Avijit and injured her seriously on the Dhaka University campus after the couple came out of the Ekushey Bô Mela on February 26. Even eight months after the brutal killing, investigators are yet to submit charge sheet in the Avijit murder case.

The following is a translation of her yesterday's Facebook post:

"Like Dipan's father, I also don't want trial [of Avijit's killers]. I am certain that the wives of Tutul and Dipan, sister of Ananta, and the friends of Rajib, Babu and Niloy also don't want trial. When I call father [Dr Ajoy Roy], he speaks of hope; he tells me that life goes on; it inspires me so that I don't give up; tells me to start afresh."

I get stunned by the words of the 80-year-old father who lost his son. I tell myself that they could start a fight in 1971 because there were people like him. But we could not, our generation

could not, they [fundamentalists] are growing in number the way weeds grow in empty fields. Our failure allows them to grow like weeds.

"We don't even expect anything from the government; the only request to them is -- please don't waste your energy by propagating day and night 'we are secular'."

Please remain silent until your objective is achieved. Avijit, Ananta, Rajib, Niloy, Babu and Dipan -- each of them is a scorecard for you. You keep on saying that everything is a 'political game', everything is a 'perception'."

"Keep on oiling the machetes of fundamentalists silently, otherwise you might lose votes. You know very well that your silence is helping them sharpen their weapons. May be, during the day we mistakenly think it as your silence. Who knows, you probably become articulate at night and join them in the game of vote sharing. Please remain silent until your vote box is filled; we will never approach you to seek trial."

Those who died are gone forever. We will never get them back. They will never return no matter what we do.

"I studied at Dhaka Medical [College] for two years towards the end of the 80s. I remember we used to say that Jamaat-Shibir would never dare to enter the Dhaka University campus. We couldn't even think of terrorist groups like Ansarullah at that time."

Today, they have not only entered the campus, but have carried out savage killings one after another. And we feel helpless and shocked to see this 'dance of destruction'. Dipan's father and Avijit's father had to see their children being hacked by machete-wielding

militants at the very university where they had once taught.

Today they [militants] are very bold. Now, they don't even need to carry out attacks secretly in the dead of night. They hack people with machetes on streets in front of thousands of people and police.

"I stood on a street with four stab wounds in my head and a severed finger, begging for help from hundreds of people. Did any of them come forward? They played the role of spectators standing in a circle. Even some policemen were in the crowd. It was Jibon who came forward to help. People like him are now hard to find."

Our grief doesn't turn into outrage any more. We can no longer create what we did in '52, '69 or '71. This state mechanism of torture has been so successful in silencing us that we have become numb in fear.

We look at this country stained with blood the way a herd of deer stare at light. I have heard from many that nowadays those who come forward to help are harassed by police. So, nobody comes forward to help any more. That is why Niloy was killed inside his room; Ananta was hunted down on the street in broad daylight; Tutul, Ranada [Ranadipana Basu] and Tareq were hacked in office in front of many people, and Dipan was killed in a busy place like Aziz Super Market.

The killers know they have nothing to fear any more. They know that their haven is far-stretched. They know they will be received with 'garlands of silence'. And we could be 'implicated under Section 54'.

Univ teachers

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Under the new pay scale that has been approved by the cabinet, public servants will see their salaries rise on a 5 per cent incremental basis every year.

The criteria of time scale and selection grade under the existing pay scale were dropped.

The suggestions made in yesterday's meeting will be added to the pay scale; the finance ministry will prepare the draft criteria.

Then after approval by the highest level of the government, an order regarding the new pay scale may be issued.

The finance minister said they will bring together the directives in the next one week and send the draft notification to the law ministry for vetting.

After that, approvals from the prime minister and the cabinet will be required.

The University Teachers' Association and the BCS Teachers' Association raised objection after the new pay scale was passed in the cabinet.

"All present at the meeting asked for positive solution to the complaints raised," Muhith said, adding that seven ministers and five secretaries attended the discussion held at his secretariat office.

He said scope will be provided such that staff in all cadres can reach grade one.

The university and BCS teachers feel that after the new pay scale come into effect many of their existing facilities will be curtailed, Muhith said.

"It is not correct," he said, citing the suggestion of automatic grade change as a case in point.

"That is the best way to create opportunity for all."

Meanwhile, the Federation of Bangladesh University Teachers' Association yesterday said if the authorities tried to solve the issue of removing discrepancy in their salaries and status through jugglery of words or in a fragmented way, it will not be accepted.

Since a cabinet committee was holding a meeting on the issue of their demands, the association has decided to suspend their agitation programme until November 21, it said in the statement.

If their demands are not met by this deadline, it will announce a non-stop programme from November 22.

Remarks on JS grounded

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"That there is no genuine opposition party" has not taken any specific steps to overcome the identity crisis it has created for itself by being in the opposition bench and holding cabinet positions at the same time, it said.

Their role in the study period reflected this mutually opposing identity and at the same time found them wanting in independent and assertive stance befitting a genuine opposition party. Specific detailed information is available in the report published on TIB's website.

Besides, the "opposition party" leader remains a special adviser to the prime minister, said the press release that came up as a response to the sharp reactions of the ruling party MPs and leaders following the TIB report.

TIB said its Executive Director Dr Iftekharuzzaman made the comment during a question-answer session while unveiling the parliament watch report based on the parliament's second to sixth session from June 2014 to July this year.

Jatiya Sangsad Chief Whip ASM Feroz the day after the report was made public alleged that the TIB was working as a paid agent of the BNP to disgrace parliament and the constitution.

Awami League Joint Secretary General Mahubul Alam Hanif said, "TIB was hatching conspiracy against the government."

Deputy Speaker Fazle Rabbi Miah in Nature on October 31 termed the TIB boss's comment "audacious".

He also suggested launching an investigation into TIB's funding.

Yesterday's statement said some highly placed respected individuals have raised questions about the source of funding of TIB, have alluded to links of TIB with militant organisations, including IS, accused TIB of showing disrespect to parliament, and working against national interest with political motivation.

"Such deficits in the highest institution of public representation also resulted in a kind of lack of confidence, hesitation and double-mindedness that has been viewed by the TIB executive director as one akin to that of a puppet that has no control in the role it plays," said the press release.

"His purpose was not to hurt anyone's sentiment but to draw the attention of stakeholders to take measures that could do away with the duality of the role of the 'main opposition party' so as to enhance the prospect of a more effective parliament."

"It may be added, the statement said, that that comment was made by TIB executive director as a personal observation in the capacity of a citizen exercising his constitutional right. It does not necessarily reflect the official position of TIB." The TIB press release further said it has become customary for a section of political leaders to raise questions about the funding source of TIB, to bring allegations of links with political opposition and accusing TIB of defaming the relevant institutions or sectors on which TIB releases its research report.

"It is nothing new nor does it have any logical basis," it said, adding, "We said this before, and we are saying it again, that TIB cannot and does not raise or spend a single penny without the due approval of the relevant government authority." That the allegations of TIB's partisan political linkage and/or with any militant organisation are baseless need no mention, added the press release.

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return the country to calmer waters. The far-right MHP, which rejected a coalition last time, was crushed. And the pro-Kurdish HDP party was hit hard by the AKP's attempts to link it to the PKK.

Critics say the campaign of violence was orchestrated by the AKP, to scare Turks into submission. The party rejects it. But many did finally cast their ballots out of fear.

ANXIETY OVERSHADOWS CAMPAIGN

Since elections in June, a ceasefire between the Turkish army and militants

from the Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK) collapsed after a suicide bombing in July by suspected Islamic State (IS) militants.

The attack near the border with Syria killed more than 30 Kurds.

Turkey then suffered its deadliest attack in its modern history when more than 100 people were killed after a peace rally attended by mainly left-wing demonstrators, including many HDP supporters, was targeted by two suicide bombers.

The government said they were linked to IS.

The HDP scaled back its election campaign after the attack.

Critics have accused Erdogan of renewing violence to curb support for the HDP - something the government denies.

One senior official from the HDP

told Reuters the partial results were "disappointing".

With most votes counted, the HDP has 10.5% of the vote - enough to give it 59 parliamentary seats, 21 fewer than it claimed in June's election.

Clashes were reported in the mainly Kurdish city of Diyarbakir as the results were being counted. Reuters said police fired tear gas at protesters throwing stones.

Last week, the offices of the opposition media group Koza-Ipek were raided by police after the government's seizure of its assets.

The raid is the latest in an operation to crack down on followers of US-based Islamic cleric Fethullah Gulen that has been under way since December 2013, when corruption allegations against allies of Erdogan emerged.

and media workers who have been killed in the line of duty. More than 700 journalists have been killed in the last decade -- one every five days -- simply for bringing news and information to the public."

Many perish while covering conflicts fearlessly but many more have been deliberately silenced for trying to report the truth, he said in a message.

Only seven percent of such cases are resolved while less than 1 out of 10 such crimes is fully investigated, he added.

"Such impunity deepens fear among journalists and enables governments to get away with censorship. We must do more to combat this trend and make sure that journalists can report freely."

The International Day to End Impunity was proclaimed by the UN General Assembly to highlight the urgent need for protection of journalists and to commemorate the assassination of two French journalists in Mali on November 2, 2013.

US finds wreckage believed to be missing freighter El Faro

The US navy has found wreckage it believes to be from the doomed freighter El Faro which sank during Hurricane Joaquin a month ago, the National Transportation Safety Board said Saturday.

El Faro was en route from Florida to Puerto Rico with a cargo of containers and automobiles on October 1 when it was caught in a ferocious storm in the Bahamas.

The entire crew of 33 is believed to have perished.

Crew from the US Navy fleet ocean tug boat, the Apache, found a vessel Saturday "at a depth of about 15,000 feet in the vicinity", an NTSB statement said.

"Sophisticated sonar equipment towed from Apache first detected what are believed to be images of the vessel using Orion, a side-scanning sonar system," it said.

all levels of political and religious leaderships in order to prevent further attacks, he added.

"Like the murders of Niloy Chakrabarti [Chattopadhyay], Washikur [Oyaisiqur] Rahman, Ananta Bijoy Das, and Avijit Roy earlier this year, these heinous acts underscore the importance of our governments' joint efforts to counter violent extremism," the US Embassy in Dhaka said in a statement.

The two incidents were only the latest of several disturbing events, including a bomb attack on a Shia gathering in Old Dhaka and multiple attacks on religious minorities across the country, said the German Embassy in Dhaka in a message of condemnation.

It urged the government to conduct thorough investigations, ensure safety of liberal minds and strengthen freedom of speech of all citizens irrespective of their religious or political beliefs.

Stating that secularism is one of the core values of Bangladesh,
