Jail Killing Day observed

The nation yesterday somberly commemorated the 40th anniversary of gunning down four national leaders inside Dhaka Central Jail, ever since known as the Jail Killing Day.

On this day in 1975, four Liberation War heroes -- Syed Nazrul Islam, acting president of Bangladesh government in exile in 1971, Tajuddin Ahmad, prime minister of the same government, Capt M Mansur Ali, finance minister, and AHM Quamaruzzaman, minister for home affairs, relief and rehabilitation -- were killed in captivity by some army officers.

Marking the day, the ruling Awami League, its front organisations and like-minded organisations and parties wore black badges and placed wreaths at the portrait of Bangabandhu Sheikh

WAR CRIMES IN JESSORE

Six suspects face trial in absentia

Hearing on charges Nov 17

The International Crimes Tribunal-1 yesterday said the trial of six fugitive war crimes accused of Jessore, who did not show up within stipulated time after publication of newspaper advertisements, could be held in absentia.

The court may try the six men and three other arrestees from the district together since they face the same charges of crimes committed in Jessore's Keshabpur upazila during the Liberation War of 1971.

The court also appointed two state counsels -- Abdus Shukur Khan and Qutubuddin Ahmed -- to defend the six fugitives and fixed November 17 for hearing the charges the prosecution filed against them.

All nine were alleged members of the anti-liberation Razakar force.

The fugitives are Ibrahim Hossain, Sheikh Md Mujibur Rahman, Kazi Ohidul Islam, Aziz Sardar, Aziz Sardar (2), and Abdul Khaleq Morol, while former BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami lawmaker Shakhawat Hossain, Lutfar Morol, and Billal Hossain are in jail.

On July 27, the prosecution pressed five charges against the six fugitives and six others, including Shakhawat Hossain, but the tribunal later discharged three men -- Moshir Rahman, Ajihar Morol, and Akram Hossain.

Meanwhile, defence counsels of Billal Hossain and Lutfar Morol filed bail petitions citing the poor conditions of their health, and the tribunal fixed November 17 to pass an order in this regard.

HC asks again to erase name of collaborator from Khulna road

The High Court yesterday again directed the Khulna City Corporation to immediately change the name of Khan A Sabur Road into its previous name, Jessore Road, because Sabur was a collaborator of the anti-liberation force.

During hearing a writ petition, the court ordered the mayor to submit a report on compliance in seven days.

Most drivers unwilling to go to desired destinations

Bangladesh Passengers' Welfare Assoc says in report after talking to CNG-run auto-rickshaw drivers, commuters

Most of the drivers of CNG-run auto-rickshaws in the capital refuse to go to desired destinations of passengers, although as per rule the vehicles are bound to take passengers wherever they want to go, according to a report of Bangladesh Passengers' Welfare Association.

Moreover, owners of the vehicles charge the drivers more than the government set rate of Tk 900 daily, it added.

The association prepared the report after interviewing 225 drivers and 247 passengers at different spots in the capital, including Motijheel, Jatra Bari, Uttara, Mirpur, Kamalapur and Sadarghat on Sunday and Monday.

About 92 percent of the passengers said CNG-run auto-rickshaw drivers refused to take them where they wanted to go.

Debashis Nag, executive magistrate of Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA), said drivers are supposed to take passengers wherever they wanted to go and charge as per the metre.

Although the government made it mandatory for the vehicles to charge passengers on metre-basis fare, 10 auto-rickshaws were found without metres, the report claimed.

Talking to The Daily Star, Hanif Khokon, convener of Dhaka Mohanagar CNG-Auto Rickshaw Malik Sramik Oikya Parishad, said they are maintaining strict vigilance so that owners and drivers of the vehicles follow the rules.

Debashis Nag said they have been launching mobile court drives against rule-breakers.

Businessman Tajul dies in road crash

Former Westman Power Plant chairman Tajul Islam Faruk died as an oncoming truck rammed his car on the Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Nachharatpur of Sadar upazila in Habiganj yesterday.

Tajul came to the countrymen's attention through lodging an extortion case against Awami League President Sheikh Hasina during the 2007 military-backed caretaker government. However, the High Court dismissed the lawsuit on May 30, 2010.

No 'big' IS presence in Bangladesh

Indian security expert tells BIIS lecture

Amid a debate on whether Islamic State (IS) exists in the country, an Indian security expert yesterday said there was no big presence of the global terror organisation in Bangladesh.

"I don't want to say that IS has presence in Bangladesh in a big way, not even in India; I would say, not even in Pakistan in a big way," Lt Gen (ret) Syed Ata Hasnain said, replying to a question about the presence of the terror outfit in Bangladesh.

The former Indian army officer yesterday gave a lecture on "Counter Terrorism Challenges in South Asia", organised by the Bangladesh Institute of International Strategic Studies (BIIS) in its auditorium.

Speaking about terrorism aspects in Bangladesh, Afghanistan, Bhutan, India, the Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka, he said Bangladesh was one of the least vulnerable countries as it was an integrated country.

Khoka, Gayeshwar, Salauddin face arrest

A Dhaka court yesterday issued arrest warrants against BNP leaders Gayeshwar Chandra Roy, Sadeque Hossain Khoka, Salauddin Ahmed and 32 others in an arson case filed in December 2013.

Salauddin was earlier arrested in India for illegal trespass and is now in jail.

Judge Kamrul Hossain Mollah of the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court of Dhaka gave the order after the investigation officer showed them fugitives and prayed for issuance of arrest warrants.

The court also asked the officer-in-charge of Rampura Police Station to submit report by January 27, 2016 on execution of the warrants.

Fourteen others including Aman Ullah Aman and Mirza Abbas were earlier granted bail in the case.

Police in March this year, pressed charges against 49 including the BNP leaders in the case filed for torching a vehicle at Malibagh Chowdhury Para on December 29, 2013.

On the day, law enforcers went on the action after BNP-led 18-party alliance (now 20-party alliance) brought out a procession in support of BNP's March for Democracy which was set for that day.
