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# Three hurdles for 8pc growth goal

*Development partners suggest energy sector reform, infrastructure development, more competitiveness to achieve targets*

The government yesterday sought more support from international partners to help attain its ambitious development goals for the next five years and beyond, while donors pointed out three major challenges facing Bangladesh.

Bangladesh has to raise its investment-GDP ratio to accelerate economic growth to 7-8 percent from the average of 6 percent, said Martin Rama, chief economist for South Asia at the World Bank, speaking at the Bangladesh Development Forum 2015.

The two-day high-level forum, which began at Bangabandhu International

Conference Centre yesterday, brought together ministers, top government officials, representatives of development partners and civil society to find the areas of strengthening partnership for the country's development.

Speaking at a panel discussion on the macro-economic management, Rama said the targets in the Seventh Five-Year Plan were ambitious and would not be easy to reach them.

Increasing investment faces challenges from three aspects: energy, infrastructure and competitiveness, he said.

# Dhaka to seek handover of top criminals

Bangladesh would request repatriation of top criminals hiding in India at the home secretary-level meeting between the two countries beginning in Dhaka today.

It was only on November 11 Bangladesh deported Ulfa leader Anup Chetia, and a day after that India handed over prime accused of the sensational seven-murder case of Narayanganj Nur Hossain.

The two events are making Bangladesh hopeful of bringing back some top criminals hiding in India, said a key official of the home ministry.

According to law enforcement agencies, around 40 top criminals are either in Indian jails or are hiding in that country.

*Kalashnikovs found in abandoned car; 7 held in Belgium over Paris carnage*

Belgium issued an international arrest warrant Sunday for one of three brothers linked to the brutal attacks in Paris that killed 129 people, as the probe spread across Europe.

As thousands gathered in central Paris in mourning and solidarity, authorities in at least five European countries scrambled to tie together leads and hunt down possible accomplices.

Security sources said one of the three brothers died in the Bataclan concert hall where the worst of the bloodshed took place, while another had been detained along with six other people in Belgium.

Seven gunmen wearing suicide belts died during the attacks, which have been claimed by the Islamic State group -- either at the Stade de

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# US, France to step up anti-IS campaign

The Paris terror attacks are likely to galvanise a stronger global military response to Islamic State, as a US-led air war that has lasted more than a year has failed to contain a group now proving itself to be a growing worldwide threat.

The defence ministers of France and the US agreed yesterday on "concrete steps" to intensify cooperation against the Islamic State group, said the Pentagon.

US Defence Secretary Ashton Carter and French Defense Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian discussed by telephone the actions they are taking in response to Friday's terrorist attacks in Paris that killed at least 129 people, according to AFP.

The call was made at 4:30pm when he was resting at his home, Haque told this correspondent.

Haque lives with his two daughters in a house at Bihash, a small housing plot owned by university teachers near Rajshahi University.

"The caller asked me if I would change. I asked him back how I would change and what exactly I should change about myself," Hasan continued.

# Tutul won't stop

*Recovering from the trauma of Oct 31 attack, the young publisher vows to continue his pursuit*

Still recuperating, Ahmedur Rashid Tutul, proprietor of Shuddhaswor, remains unflinching in his commitment to publishing. He says he will not compromise his principle to publish books necessary for the "awakening of people".

"May be I'll face tougher challenges when I get back to work, but there is no way I'm going to move away even a little bit from my commitment," he said in an email correspondence with The Daily Star.

"I dream of a modern, democratic and progressive Bangladesh -- a society that is safe for freethinking based on knowledge. Everything I publish is aimed at realising that dream," he continued.

He has been released from Dhaka Medical College Hospital on Tuesday, but he is far from recovering from the trauma of the horrendous attack.

"I still can't get rid of the image of somebody stabbing me while screaming, 'Allahu Akbar'," he said.

Besides, he finds it difficult to talk because of his hearing loss caused by blood seeping into his ear, forming clots.

"But the most difficult task of my life now is to pass the time. I can't wait to go back to my office," said Tutul.

Tutul and two writer-bloggers Ranadipam Basu and Tareque Rahim were brutally attacked at his Lalmatia office on October 31. In another grisly attack on the same day,

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
