

Victorians end Bulls' streak

A brilliant bowling performance on a slow Mirpur track led Mashrafe Bin Mortaza's Comilla Victorians to their second consecutive win of the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL).

While Mahmudullah Riyad's Barisal Bulls did defend a 108 the day before, they failed to repeat the magic after being bundled out for just 89 runs yesterday. The total set by the Bulls was the lowest score by a team batting first in current BPL.

It therefore was no surprise when the Victorians ambled their way to an eight-wicket victory.

The damage initially began with Sri Lanka pacer Nuwan Kulasekara taking two scalps in as early as the second over. He got both Shahriar Nafees and Brendon Taylor caught behind. Skipper Mahmudullah was the next batsman to follow as he was undone by a full-length delivery from 19-year-old left-arm pacer Abu Hider. Two overs later, Hider hit the stumps again; this time to remove Rony Talukdar.

At 36 for 4, the Bulls were under pressure and the runs almost dried up. They did still have hope with the hard-hitting Sabbir Rahman and the experienced Nadif Chowdhury at the crease.

However, that's when Mashrafe introduced slow left-arm Ashar Zaidi into the attack. The Pakistani bowler knew the conditions in Mirpur well for he used to be a regular in the domestic circuit here and he made full use of the experience.

He removed both Sabbir and Seekkuge Prasanna in consecutive deliveries of the 12th over and then came back in the 14th to bowl out Nadif Chowdhury.

Kevon Cooper came in next and provided a slight amount of resistance. He scored a 21-ball 22 before becoming Kulasekara's third victim.

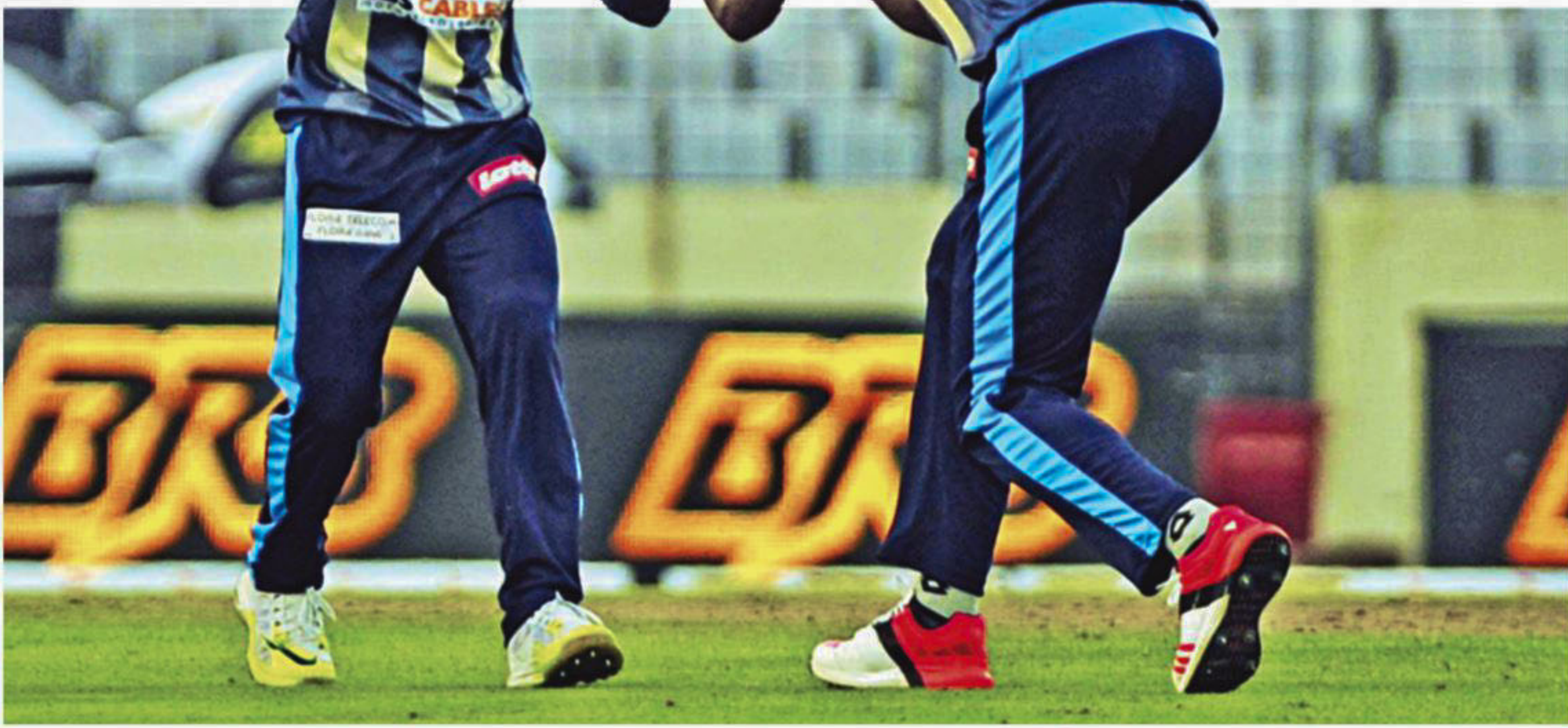
Sunil Narine then mopped up the tail.

While the Bulls were down, they were far from being out. Going by the way they fought back in the last match, the game was far from over.

Al-Amin Hossain and Mohammad Sami once again opened the bowling striving for a repeat. However, this time the match followed a rather different path.

While Al-Amin did get Imrul Kayes out in the fourth over, Marlon Samuels and Mahmudul Hasan ensured there were no worries with a 37-run stand for the second wicket.

By the time Mahmudul was sent back in the in the 13th over, the job was almost done. Samuels and Shuvagata Hom took Comilla home with two overs to spare.

Riders defuse Dynamites

The Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) witnessed its first one-sided contest when the Rangpur Riders decimated the Dhaka Dynamites by 69 runs in Mirpur. The margin of the victory was in fact the fourth highest in a BPL tournament.

Having lost their previous game, Rangpur -- considered the strongest team on paper -- needed to bounce back. And they did that in style as their key performers clicked yesterday.

In the last two matches, neither of Rangpur's openers managed big scores. However, yesterday was different as the West Indies' Lendl Simmons scored a responsible 51 off 39 deliveries. The foundation built by Simmons made things a lot easier for the rest of the batsmen. He smashed three sixes and five fours.

The West Indian took off in the third over

when he smashed Nasir Hossain for a six and four. Abul Hasan was his next victim, getting hit for 15 runs in the sixth over.

In addition to Simmons' innings, brilliant all-round performances from Thisara Perera and Shakib Al Hasan helped the Riders clinch the game with ease. While Thisara scored 27 with the bat and finished with figures 3 for 25, Shakib scored 24 and took a crucial 4 for 16.

After electing to bat first, the Riders posted 176. It was a different line-up compared to the last game as they decided to drop Misbahul Haq. It was a decision that initially came as a surprise considering that the Pakistani had scored a match-winning half-century in the first game.

The decision was taken as Rangpur decided to utilise the all-rounders in their side to the fullest. With Shakib, Perera, Marlon Samuels and Mohammad Al-Amin in the side, they decided to draft in specialist off-spinner Sachitra Sananayake.

The ploy seemed to work for Rangpur, as after the exchange the wicket slowed down a tinge and that provided Rangpur's slower bowlers with a bit more help.

Dhaka's openers, Nasir Jamshed and Shamsur Rahman, were both removed by Shakib in the third over. The next two batsmen, Kumar Sangakkara and Mosaddek Hossain, fell victim to left-arm spin as well, with Arafat Sunny scalping their crucial wickets.

Had it not been for the turnarounds witnessed in the last few matches, many would have considered the game done and dusted by the 11th over when the Dynamites were struggling at 53 for 4.

However, there were no hard hits and no exciting finishes yesterday as Dhaka's lower order batsmen found no avenue for their shots. The intensity was lost in the last five overs and it almost seemed to end in slow motion. The Dynamites were bundled out for 107 in 19.4 overs.

Ctg organisers demand action against Azizul

Sports organisers and fans of Chittagong yesterday staged a protest at the entrance of MA Aziz Stadium, demanding action against Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) franchisee Sylhet Superstars' owner Azizul Islam.

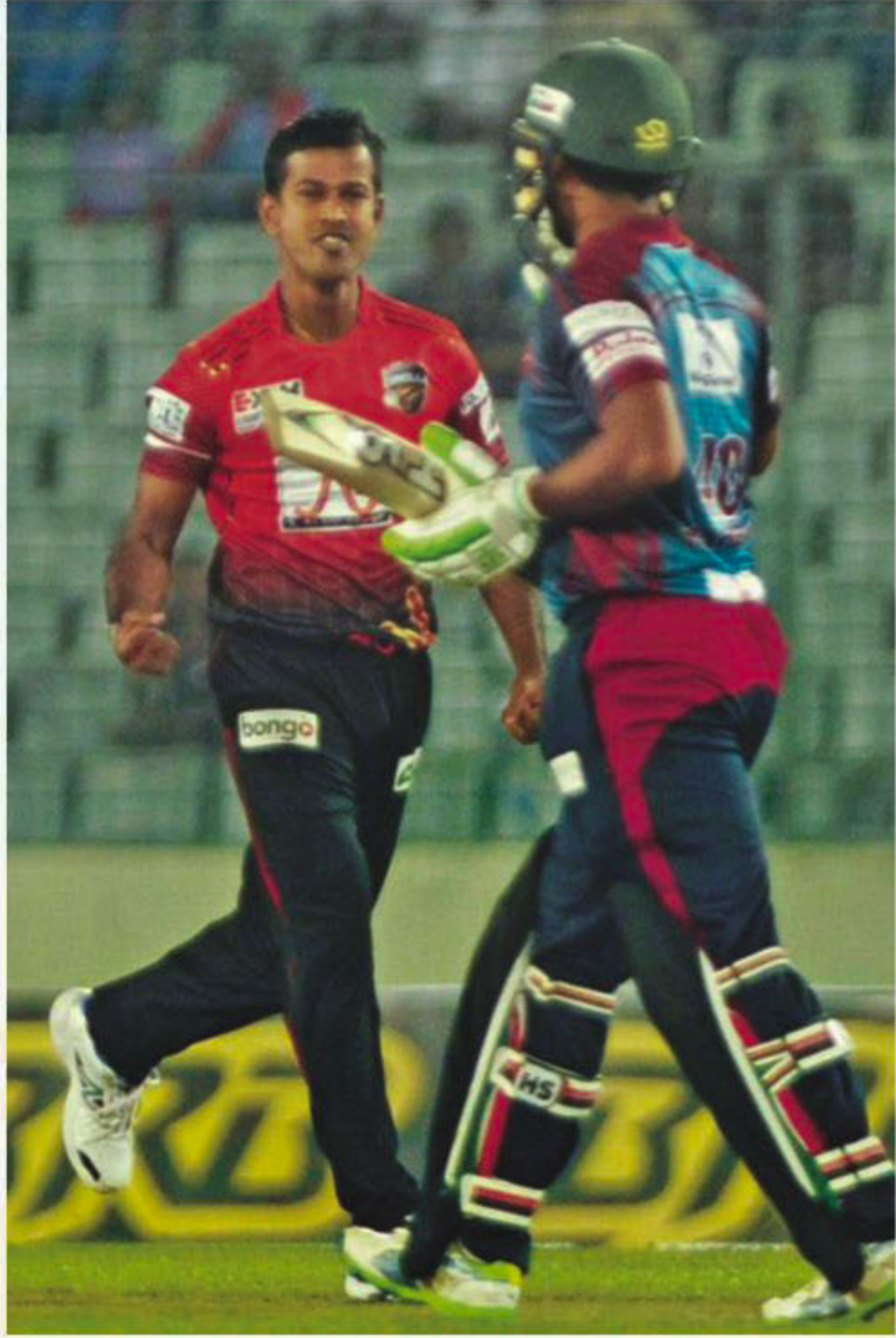
National team's opener and Chittagong Vikings skipper Tamim Iqbal recently alleged that Azizul had abused him prior to the start of the two teams' fixture on November 23.

The protest was attended, among others, by the Chittagong Divisional Sports Association's general secretary Sirazuddin Mohammed Alamgir and its vice-president Ali Abbas. Both the organisers said that the Sylhet team's owner committed a serious offence, and demanded punitive action against him by the authorities within November 29. They further threatened to declare Azizul as persona non grata in all the BPL matches at the Chittagong venue unless any action is taken against him.

They also said that they would submit a memorandum to the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Nazmul Hassan Papon and its vice president AJM Nasir Uddin in this regard.

The BCB has already started a probe into the incident, and Papon has said that the alleged incident shouldn't have taken place in the first place as the owner shouldn't have been anywhere near the players. He said that if the probe finds the allegations to be correct, appropriate measures will be taken against that individual.

Chittagong will host eight matches of this edition of BPL from November 30 to December 3.

Wickets a concern

The one thing that has been absolutely obvious in the third season of the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) is that the wicket at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur tends to wear down a bit during the evening matches.

The difference in statistics of matches played in the day compared to those played in the evening -- both of which are played on the same wicket -- have been evident.

We have seen matches where totals like 187 and 176 have been chased down with ease during the day, whereas the day before yesterday Barisal Bulls successfully defended 108 in the evening.

According to ace all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan, there is a chance for scores to further decrease as the tournament progresses.

"There are two matches everyday and the curators are probably not getting enough time to prepare the wickets. So day-by-day the wicket is getting worn down. The wicket is getting slower and lower," said Shakib after his side's thumping 69-run win over Dhaka Dynamites.

"In the afternoon it's a fresh wicket so the ball comes to the bat well. As time passes, the wicket gets slower, so it becomes a little difficult to bat in the

later games," he added.

When asked if he expects the wicket to get more difficult towards the end of the tournament, Shakib said, "I think so. But we just have to adjust to this and make our team combination accordingly. Like today we had around 8 to 9 proper batsmen in the side."

Dhaka Dynamites opener Shamsur Rahman echoed Shakib's sentiments.

"The wicket was a bit slow. I think it was dangerous to bat against the spinners," said Shamsur.

'I HAVE NO ENERGY IN MY BODY' Shakib hasn't had the best of games since his return from America. While he did scalp a four-wicket haul in the game yesterday, he still seems a bit on edge with the bat. Shakib admitted that he was struggling but was confident of a comeback.

"Actually I have no energy in my body. I played 15-16 balls yesterday and out of them three to four deliveries should have been hit for sixes. After coming here I still have a bit of jetlag. I am also a bit sick as I am suffering from dysentery and flu.

"You can't do many things when you don't have energy and that's why I am struggling. I may have scored 25, but I didn't bat well. It's going to take some time. That I am not able to practice in between the matches doesn't help much, but it will eventually come. Thankfully though my bowling is going

BCB to get \$10m from ICC

The International Cricket Council (ICC) will pay seven full-member boards including the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) USD 10 million each over the next eight years as part of the Test Cricket Fund announced last year when the Big Three -- Board of Control for Cricket in India, England and Wales Cricket Board and Cricket Australia -- had gained control over ICC.

Seven full-member boards will receive USD 1.25 million each annually, which is less than the figure of 1.6 million dollars announced by ECB president and ICC executive committee member Giles Clarke in February 2014.

The Test fund is aimed to "encourage and support Test match cricket" outside the Big Three nations.

The first payment of USD 600,000 will be disbursed in early January.

India 215; Proteas 11 for 2

Morne Morkel and Simon Harmer bamboozled India with pace and spin on a tricky wicket but South Africa also suffered early blows in the third Test in Nagpur on Wednesday.

Off-spinner Harmer claimed four wickets for 78 and fast bowler Morkel took three for 35 as the Proteas bowled India out for 215 in the post-tea session of the first day's play.

South Africa, seeking a series-leveilling win, had plodded to 11 for two by stumps, setting the stage for an exciting battle ahead on a dusty and dry pitch at the VCA stadium.

Off-spinner Ravichandran Ashwin had opener Stiaan van Zyl

caught in the slips for a duck before nightwatchman Imran Tahir was bowled by Ravindra Jadeja for four.

At stumps Dean Elgar was unbeaten on seven and skipper Hashim Amla had yet to score.

India were reduced to 125-6 after winning the toss, before the last four wickets added 90 runs that included a 48-run stand for the seventh wicket between Jadeja (34) and wicketkeeper Wriddhiman Saha (32).

Opener Murali Vijay top-scored with 40, but none of the other five specialist batsmen crossed 22 on a first-day pitch that already shows cracks and continues to deteriorate fast.

Morkel made up for the absence of his unfit speed partner Dale Steyn to negate India's initial advantage of batting first, but then himself limped off the field while

bowling his 17th over in the final session.

- Test won't last five days' -

Harmer said he was happy to bowl on a pitch that helps slow bowlers and predicted the Test would be over before the fifth day.

"This wicket is not prepared to last five days, there is bound to be a result," the off-spinner said.

"In South Africa we prepare pitches that suit our type of cricket. So this does not surprise us at all. But being a spinner, I like bowling on such wickets."
