Net migration to UK

Net migration to Britain has hit a new record high, official data showed yesterday, with a rise in the number of European Union citizens likely to pile pressure on Prime Minister David Cameron ahead of a vote on Britain's membership of the bloc. The Office for National Statistics said net migration to Britain was 336,000 in the year to June, up from 254,000 a year earlier.

'Ideals of constitution  
under attack': Sonia

Rajnath attacks Congress on secularism, says it's the 'most misused' term

With a sharp attack on the Modi government, Congress president Sonia Gandhi led the opposition yesterday in a special discussion on the Constitution as Parliament convened for the winter session.

"There is a threat to the principles of the Constitution these days...What we have seen in the past few months, is total violation of the values of the constitution," said Gandhi, clearly setting the stage for a confrontation. Her party has indicated that its primary agenda in the session will be to attack the BJP-led government over what it calls "rising intolerance".

The Congress chief quoted BR Ambedkar, to whom the two-day discussion pays tribute, saying, "No matter how good the Constitution is, if the people who implement it are bad, then the Constitution will also turn out bad. And no matter how bad the Constitution is, if the people who implement it are good, it will turn out to be good," and smiled at protests from the treasury benches, adding "This is for you and us."

Meanwhile, Union Minister Rajnath Singh sparred with the opposition Congress yesterday over the word "secularism" during a special discussion in Parliament on the Constitution.

"Secularism is the most misused word in the country...This must stop. Because of the rampant misuse of the word, there have been instances of tension in society," Singh said, taking on the Congress, which has come to Parliament this session prepped to attack the government over what it calls "growing intolerance."

Singh contended that BR Ambedkar,

considered the not believe it was necessary to include the words "secular" and "socialist" - added later to the Preamble in the Congress regime of Indira Gandhi - as "these are values core to the Indian ethos."

Singh's argument that the word secular translates in Hindi not to "Dharm Nirpeksh" or non-religious but "Panth Nirpeksh" or non-sectarian, too has drawn counter-attacks from Congress and other opposition leaders.

"Whoever you are and whatever faith you

practice, you are respected by the government of India. Splitting hair on the word secularism is mere wordplay," said Shashi Tharoor of the Congress outside Parliament.

The Left's Sitaram Yechury said, "The Home Minister's

speech shows the real agenda, why this government wanted a Constitution Day. They want a Hindu Rashtra as the RSS never accepted secular."

He pointed out that "all our official parliament bills that are translated in Hindi use the term dharm nirpeksh."

Parliamentary affairs minister Venkaiah Naidu said, "The nation knows who has subverted the Constitution for personal reason or who has amended it by putting people behind bars. It is the history of the Congress. They have no moral right to criticize."

It was clear that battle-lines are firmly drawn for the session when soon after Singh's speech, Congress chief Sonia Gandhi alleged, "we have seen in the past few months, a total violation of the values of the constitution."

Prime Minister Narendra Modi will intervene in the discussion.

DEADLY STRIKE ON MSF HOSPITAL  
Heat grows on US  
for int'l probe

Pressure was growing yesterday for an international inquiry into a catastrophic US strike on an MSF hospital in Afghanistan, after the military detailed "tragic but avoidable" errors but refused to say if there would be an independent investigation.

Doctors Without Borders (MSF) slammed American forces for "gross negligence" Wednesday after the US commander in Afghanistan said the October 3 strike on the charity-run hospital in the northern city of Kunduz was "caused primarily by human error".

The raid killed 30 people and forced the charity to close the trauma centre -- the only one in the region -- while stirring an avalanche of global condemnation.



General John Campbell, speaking at Nato headquarters in Kabul Wednesday, blamed in part the fatigue of US troops who had been battling a Taliban offensive in Kunduz for five days, adding that the mistake was "compounded by process and equipment failures".

The general said during Wednesday's press conference that individuals involved in the attack had been suspended pending "standard military justice", but refused to give details.

"The frightening catalogue of errors outlined today illustrates gross negligence on the part of US forces and violations of the rules of war," MSF general director Christopher Stokes said.

Human Rights Watch demanded an independent investigation, saying "serious questions" remained about "whether the attackers knowingly or recklessly fired on a functioning hospital".

The rights group added: "This warrants a criminal investigation into possible war crimes, but the Pentagon did

North, South  
Korea hold  
rare talks

North and South Korean officials sat down yesterday for rare talks aimed at setting up a sustainable high-level dialogue that has constantly eluded the two rivals.

The meeting at the border truce village of Panmunjom began shortly before 1:00pm and marked the first inter-governmental interaction since August when the two sides met to defuse a crisis that had pushed them to the brink of an armed conflict.

That meeting ended with a joint agreement that included a commitment to resume high-level talks, although no precise timeline was given.

Yesterday's talks in Panmunjom will try to avoid a repetition of that failure by thrashing out an agenda, a venue and such protocol issues as who should attend the full-fledged dialogue.

The start of the talks was delayed by several hours due to a problem with the communication links that allow senior officials in Seoul and Pyongyang to monitor proceedings.

After an initial round lasting about 90 minutes, both sides took a break to confer with their respective capitals, a Unification Ministry official said.

"The mood was sincere, but there were differences," he acknowledged.

New cabinet to include  
ethnic groups, parties

Says Myanmar's Suu Kyi

Myanmar's new cabinet will include members of other political parties and representatives of ethnic minorities, the leader of the National League for Democracy (NLD) Aung San Suu Kyi said yesterday, stressing the need for national reconciliation.

The NLD won a majority in both houses of Myanmar's parliament and also fared better than expected against ethnic political parties in regional legislatures.

But Nobel laureate Suu Kyi has emphasized that the first democratically elected government in more than 50 years will seek to reconcile the country's many disparate political groups.

"Our party has won an overwhelming majority of the seats but we won't take them all," Suu Kyi said, referring to cabinet seats in an interview with Radio Free Asia's Myanmar

language service broadcast yesterday.

"As I said earlier, we will cooperate with others with the spirit of sharing our success with them based on building national reconciliation. Of course the NLD will lead. It is the mandate the people have given to us at our request."

"We will include ethnic representatives who are not NLD members and others who can benefit the country."

The interview did not touch on the persecuted minority Rohingya Muslims who were not allowed to vote in the election and are effectively stateless in their own land.

The NLD captured enough seats in the national-level legislature to have its choice of president, who is elected by members of parliament. The president then selects the cabinet. Suu Kyi has said that regardless of who is appointed president, she will call the

Global land  
mine casualties  
on the rise

Long-term progress in reducing the number of landmine casualties was reversed last year, and rebel groups used the mines in 10 countries, the largest number since 2006, researchers said yesterday.

Non-state groups were still using the deadly devices in the 12 months to October 2015 in Colombia, Libya, Myanmar, Pakistan, Syria and Yemen, and in Afghanistan, where there was a sharp increase in casualties from improvised explosive devices (IEDs).

Landmines were also used by rebels in three countries - Iraq, Tunisia and Ukraine - where they were not used last year, and by three states: Myanmar, Syria and North Korea. "While the world has made great progress, the past year has seen disturbing steps backward in terms of new use of and casualties from landmines," said Jeff Abramson, editor of the study, which was carried out by the International Campaign to Ban Landmines, a lobby group.

A total of 3,678 people were killed or wounded by landmines over the last year, about 10 per day. This is up from 3,308 in 2013 but far lower than in 1999.
