

Abu Sayeed murder case verdict today

Sylhet Women and Children
Repression Prevention
Tribunal will deliver verdict in
the nine-year-old Abu
Sayeed killing case today.

On November 19, the
court started the trial and
completed it yesterday.

According to the charge
sheet, Ebadur Rahman,
constable of Airport Police
Station, Mahib Hossain
Masum, publicity secretary
of Olama League Sylhet
district unit, Abdur Rakib,
general secretary of Olama
League district unit, and
Ataur Rahman Geda, a
police informant, abducted
Abu Sayeed, son of
Andul Matin, for a ransom
of Tk 5 lakh and later
killed him.

Ebadur on March 12
confessed before a magistrate
to the crime and two
days later police recovered
Sayeed's body from the
attic of the building where
both Ebadur and Sayeed
resided.

He was a Liberation
War organiser, also a
former chairman of
Khulna Divisional Press
Club Federation. The
Newspaper Owners'
Association of
Bangladesh issued a
condolence statement,
and the daily's office
will remain closed
tomorrow in mourning.

HC seeks list of structures named after Khan A Sabur Orders KCC mayor to submit it in 15 days

The High Court yesterday ordered Khulna City Corporation's (KCC) mayor to submit in 15 days a list of structures under KCC named after Khan A Sabur, a collaborator of anti-liberation forces.

The bench of Justice Quazi Reza-Ul Hoque and Justice Abu Taher Md Saifur Rahman passed the order while hearing a writ petition seeking necessary orders upon the government to change names of structures named after collaborators.

The court also fixed December 14 for passing further orders, AKM Rashedul Huq,

representing the petitioners, historian Prof Muntassir Mamun and war crimes researcher Shahriar Kabir, told The Daily Star.

He said KCC's chief executive officer submitted a report to the HC saying the authorities changed the name of Khan A Sabur Road into its previous name, Jessore Road, as per its earlier order.

In May 2012, following the writ petition, the HC asked the government to explain why structures named after collaborators of Pakistanis should not be renamed and why they should not be directed to name those after freedom fighters.

and shot him from behind before kicking him down under the bridge, she said, adding she and others recovered and buried the body the next day. "I want justice..." said Hafiza.

In her detailed testimony, Bashona Rani Chowdhury of Sreerampur village under Gouripur upazila in Mymensingh said she was 10 years old and living with her father in their Ramnagar residence when her brother was killed.

Around 10:00am on a day in the last part of the Bangla month of Bhadra,

Paresh Chandra Sarker was working on a field near their home, from where Bashona saw that some Razakars had gathered near him, she said.

One Razakar shot Paresh and they left, said Bashona, adding that before breathing his last after being taken home, Paresh told them that Shamsuddin had shot him.

Earlier, Paresh's friend Shah Alam, the 10th witness, gave a similar description. Defence counsels completed cross-examining Hafiza and Bashona before the tribunal adjourned proceedings until today. Gazi Abdul Mannan is the fifth accused.

father. Finally, he got the pharmacy of Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH) open and bought the medicine after waiting in the queue for one and a half hours.

Belyat, who has a patient admitted in the ICU of CMCH, waiting in the queue at the CMCH pharmacy for an hour, said, "Doctors told me to bring medicine as early as possible as my patient's condition is critical. I have no choice other than waiting for my turn as all other pharmacies in the area are closed."

Another attendant, Shawkat, said, "Doctors are waiting for medicines and some surgical instruments needed for my aunt's surgery in the dental unit. Moreover, all medicines especially the instruments are

not always available here. I do not know what to do now."

Samir Kanti Sikder, president of the druggist association's district unit, said in the city some 3,000 pharmacies were closed and they had to do this as the administration did not pay any heed to their previous ultimatum and he also threatened to wage tougher movement if the case is not withdrawn.

According to Samir, their members did not attack the mobile court on that day, they only demonstrated on the street as the law enforcers "tried to seize legal medicines".

Apologising for the public's sufferings, Samir said, "We remain awake round the clock to serve the public but instead of appreciating our contribution, a section of the government officials always harass us."
