## Another stroll for BD women

Bangladesh women's cricket team took another step towards qualifying for the ICC World T20 finals when they thrashed their Scottish counterparts by eight wickets in Bangkok yesterday.

Batting first, Scotland were bundled out for just 53 in 19.1 overs. Rumana Ahmed finished with figures of 3 for 9 while Khadija Tul Kubra took 2 for 13.

After the exchange Bangladesh raced home in 12.4 overs. There was a chance for Bangladesh to win the match by ten wickets as the opening stand between Ayasha Rahman and Sharmin Akter had put on 53 runs on board. However, both the batters were dismissed just when they required one run to win.

Ayasha scored 24, while Sharmin posted 26.

Placed in Group A, Bangladesh will play PNG in their final group game today. They will need to reach the final of the tournament to confirm a spot in the World Cup in India next year.

## All eyes on wicket

## BPL's Chittagong leg starts today

As the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) enters its second leg in Chittagong today, the teams and spectators will hope that the batsmen can get a fair wicket to express themselves.

The Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium in Chittagong has traditionally been a batsman's paradise and almost all the players of the tournament, even some of the bowlers, hope that the wickets at the ZACS stay true to its billing.

The reason behind that of course has been the dull pitches on which the tournament was played on in Dhaka. While the first few games did witness a few high-scoring encounters, towards the end, scores of 120 and lower were chased with immense difficulty.

This is the one aspect that a number of players spoke about during their respective training sessions in Chittagong yesterday.

"I am hopeful that the wickets in Chittagong will have more runs in them. A team should ideally be able to score around 160 to 170 here even if not 180 or 190. We can know a lot better

after the first match," Chittagong Vikings skipper Tamim Iqbal told reporters yesterday.

The skipper also expects his team to do a lot better at their home venue.

"The first phase did not go too well for us. We lost close matches, which we ideally should have won. However, what has happened has happened. We have to focus on these four games here. We hope to get the kind of support that Dhaka got in the capital," said Tamim. He also hoped that bowlers like Shafiqul Islam and Taskin Ahmed get encouraged from the likes of Mohammad Amir to do well in the new phase.

Umar Akmal, who wasn't present in Dhaka, will be available in their squad for the Chittagong-leg.

Chittagong's opponents today, the Barisal Bulls have a similar focus. Their keeper Brendon Taylor hopes for a better batting performance and also hinted in the inclusion of West Indian hard-hitter Evin Lewis in the side for today's game.

"I know the wicket will be very good. The wickets in Dhaka weren't up to scratch. A year ago, we played some Test matches and ODIs here. I think it will be an excellent wicket," said Taylor.

While Barisal play Chittagong, Comilla Victorians will face the Sylhet Superstars in the

evening. The latter battle is expected to be a lot more exciting. Comilla are sitting at the top with six points while Sylhet are winless at the bottom. However, today could well be Sylhet's chance to pull off a win.

And the reason behind that is that Comilla will be without Marlon Samuels and Sunil Narine. Both the players, especially Samuels contributed quite a bit for the Victorians in Dhaka. They will hope Ahmed Shahzad and Shoib Malik, who are expected to come on December 1, can fill that gap.

Sylhet on the other hand have roped in Shehan Jayasuriya and will be waiting for Shahid Afridi and Sohail Tanvir, who are expected to join them during the Chittagong-leg of the tournament if not today.


Mushfiqur Rahim's Sylhet might receive a further boost if Rubel Hossain, who told reporters yesterday that he was fit to play, is included in the team today.

Rangpur Riders and Dhaka Dynamites will not feature today, but when they do they will be able to include two crucial players in their respective sides.

## Bangladesh Open excites shuttlers

Country's shuttlers preparing for the South Asian Games will get an opportunity to rub their shoulders against some top players when they take part in the Bangladesh Open International Badminton Challenge, starting tomorrow at the Shaheed Tajuddin Ahmed Indoor Stadium in Mirpur.

Some 130 players including 50 women from 12 countries -- India, Malaysia, Thailand, Russia, Nepal, Vietnam, Singapore, Uzbekistan, Pakistan, United States, Sri Lanka and hosts Bangladesh -- will be vying in five events -- men's singles and doubles, women's singles and doubles and mixed doubles -- of the Bangladesh Open, which is also a world ranking tournament.

The Bangladeshi players have been in the SA Games training camp for nearly three months and top shuttlers like Enamul Haque, Ahsan Habib Parash and Rais Uddin will get the opportunity to evaluate their strength against world's 33rd ranked Sai Praneeth of India and others in the men's singles while national champion Elina Sultana and runner-up Shapla Akter will have opponents like Irish Wang of the United States, a 30th world ranking shuttler, in the women's singles.

The event will also unfold a real competition for the local players, who have been starved of any domestic tournaments for the last one year. Besides, the excited players feel that the Bangladesh Open would be a perfect launching pad in their ambitions to do something good in next year's SA Games.

"This will be a very good tournament for us who get hardly any opportunity to play in domestic circuit. We have been in training for the SA Games for a couple of months and we are hoping to do something better in this meet," former national champion Ahsan Habib Parash told reporters after the official press conference at the Bangladesh Olympic Association Auditorium.

Former women's champion Shapla Akter also echoed Parash's sentiment and vowed to put her best.

"There was no domestic competition for last one year and we also don't get the chances to play outside the country, so this is an opportunity to evaluate our performance in the tournament," said runner-up Shapla.

National women's champion Elina Sultana is also excited.

"There are many strong competitors in the tournament but I want to put my level best and at least make it to the women's singles semifinals," said Elina.

## Aussies seal series 2-0

## Claim 3-wicket win in historic D/N Test

Australia claimed a thrilling three-wicket victory inside three days over New Zealand at the Adelaide Oval on Sunday in the first-ever day-night Test.

Shaun Marsh took Australia to the cusp of victory before losing his wicket on 49 and the fighting Kiwis set up a tense finish under the floodlights by also dismissing Peter Nevill to leave the home side seven wickets down.

Peter Siddle hit the winning runs, much to the relief of the crowd, to clinch a 2-0 series win over the gallant Black Caps.

Australia won the first Brisbane Test by 208 runs and the second Perth Test was drawn.

The match was redemption for Marsh, who has struggled to hold down a place in the Australian team with inconsistent batting performances over his four years at Test level.

The pink ball developed for day-night Tests triumphed over the bat in a fast-paced Test which attracted a total attendance of 123,736. The aim of the experiment is to bring the

crowds back to the long form of the game.

"The bowlers have dominated this game and it's great for cricket," said Australian skipper Steve Smith.

"It has certainly brought the bowlers into the game, particularly under the lights."

It was the first three-day Test match at the Adelaide Oval in 64 years -- since the West Indies beat Australia by six wickets.

"It was an outstanding game of cricket. Obviously completely contrasting to what we have seen in the series," said Kiwi captain Brendon McCullum.
