Lewis was drafted in the squad for the Barisal Bulls on Monday against Chittagong Vikings and while he did drive the second delivery for a four, he got out two balls later. An overstatement; many would have thought.

However, after his pyrotechnics yesterday, everybody in the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium and quite a few who desperately tried to shield themselves from those towering sixes knew what Taylor was talking about.

After Kumar Sangakkara scored a hard-fought half-century and helped Dhaka Dynamites post 158, it was, naively so, deemed as a decent total by many. However, after Lewis took charge of the innings, that notion was torn into shreds.

He hammered an unbeaten 101 off

65 balls and sped the Bulls to a ninewicket victory. It was the first century of the competition this year, eighth overall and was easily the most memorable knock in BPL Season 3.

Make no mistake; several sixes and fours hit in the competition till date, however, the sheer power with which Lewis smacked them gave the bowlers real jitters.

While he did reach his half-century in the eleventh over off 39 balls, the highlight of his innings came after that. He clobbered Ryan Ten Doeschate for 26 runs in an over, which witnessed three huge sixes and Lewis let out child-like grins during the two fours.

Thanks to Lewis's innings, Barisal's openers also posted the highest opening stand in the BPL this season, 127, surpassing Soumya Sarkar and Jahurul Islam's 102—scored in the first match of the day.

By the time his partner Rony Talukdar got out in the 14th over, the Bulls required just 32 off 37 balls.

It was the perfect setting for the 23year-old to reach his first ever century in any format of the game. He had understandably slowed down a bit after Talukdar got out.

At 98 he had to fend off over num-

ber 18 against Mustafizur Rahman. While he managed to take single off him early in the over, he seemed a bit nervous while negotiating his cutters.

Soumya's patience pays off

When Soumya Sarkar lofted Shafiul Islam for a boundary over cover in the 16th

over yesterday he reached his first half-century in his last 18 outings. While the left-hander didn't seem to celebrate the fifty, there's no doubt that he would have been relieved.

The last time Soumya posted a 50plus score was back in July when he hammered a fierce 90 against South Africa and led Bangladesh home in the very same ground, the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium.

However, things haven't been too rosy for the left-hander since that match. In between yesterday's game and the South Africa series, Soumya featured in a number of games for Bangladesh A, besides the Bangladesh

Premier League (BPL) matches. His highest score in those 17 knocks was 43, which he posted against Karnataka in September. His innings yesterday seemed a lot

more polished, as the left-hander displayed a more patient approach.

"We had a smaller target, so I tried to stay at the wicket till the very end. I told myself that I wouldn't leave the wicket early today. That's all I tried to do," said Soumya at the post-match press conference.

"I played fewer shots as well. I think the reason behind that was that I couldn't play more than ten balls in any of the last five matches. Today my target was to play as many balls as possible," he added.

According to Soumya, the change in his approach yesterday was his way of deciphering what he had been

doing wrong thus far. "I have been trying to figure out

what I did wrong in the last few matches. I think I was just hurrying a bit too much because I thought I needed to score quick runs in T20 cricket. I think it will be good for me if I can get out of that mindset.

"I think I faced a similar problem earlier when I used to get out for just 20s and 30s in ODI cricket. I just need to spend some more time [at the crease]," said Soumya.

"There was never any pressure on me from the team as such. But I felt a bit of pressure because I wasn't doing well. I am still not satisfied with myself. I think I should have made the most of my starts in the last five matches," added the 22-year-old.

The left-hander further said that the BPL would be a good opportunity for the national players to strike form ahead of the Asia Cup T20 and the ICC World T20.

BANGABANDHU GOLD CUP

Six-team event after SAFF Cup

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) has set a tentative timeslot between January 6 and January 20 next year to host the fourth edition of the Bangabandhu Gold Cup International Football Tournament. The BFF is contemplating hosting the event

edition which was held in January-February this year, said a senior BFF spokesman yesterday. "At the sidelines of the AFC Award Night in New Delhi recently, we approached officials of different federations

with six teams including Bangladesh, just like the previous

and they have assured us that they would be able to send their teams during the January 6 to January 20 timeslot," said BFF general secretary Abu Nayeem Shohag yesterday. "We have got verbal assurances from the football federa-

tions of Bahrain, Singapore, Myanmar, Malaysia, Afghanistan and Sri Lanka. Five out of those six teams will likely play alongside Bangladesh and we will be trying to involve the senior national in this tournament," Shohag added.

The third edition of the tournament was held in Dhaka and Sylhet from January 29 to February 8 this year, involving six teams -- the national teams of Bangladesh and Sri Lanka and the under-22 teams of Malaysia, Thailand, Singapore and Bahrain. The Malaysia under-22 team lifted the trophy after beating the hosts in an entertaining final, which was held at a jam-packed Bangabandhu National Stadium.

Shohag informed that due to the engagements of Singapore and Myanmar during January 20 to 30, the BFF had to choose the slot between January 6 and 20.

The BFF spokesman, who was present in Delhi along with the federation's president Kazi Salahuddin to receive AFC's Aspiring Award 2015, said that the event will likely be hosted at two venues -- Dhaka and either one between Sylhet and Chittagong.

The tentative schedule of the Bangabandhu Gold Cup means Bangladesh national team will be taking part in the prestigious invitational event right after their participation in the SAFF Championship, branded as Suzuki SAFF Cup 2015, which is scheduled to be held in Kerala from December 23, 2015 to January 3, 2016.
