On Domestication

or those who have not seen a different places (usually after water buffalo (mohish) upclose, it can be an unsettling experience. My first time was about ten years ago while bicycling through dried up haors. The massive, hairy animals with long, curved horns were blocking my way while happily grazing away. My initial fear, however, receded quickly as they ignored me and I realized they were gentle and docile creatures. The water buffalo loves water. Its

favourite exercise is to roll in the mud and laze in the sun. It has helped farmers with agriculture for centuries. Its rich, aromatic milk is used for making sweets and cheese. Indeed, what could have been a

ferocious animal is rendered harmless - and very useful - because it is domesticated.

On the other hand, I feel less comfortable around elephants. They are not domesticated, but tamed. Most elephants we see in domestic use are obtained from wild herds and trained. While Indian elephants can be tamed, African elephants cannot.

What is the difference between domestication and taming? Domestication requires many generations of breeding emphasizing certain characteristics of the animal. Domestic animals learn to live with humans, do their work, and, most importantly, breed in captivity. On the other hand, taming a wild animal is, essentially, training it for one

generation only. Domesticated animals have played a pivotal role in the course of civilization. Agriculture as we know it would be impossible without the domestication of the cow and its cousins. But historically the most important domestic animal is undoubtedly the horse. That is because the horse has enabled large groups of humans to move and migrate to

conquering them.)

When we look at the history of civilization, we see that the ability of nations to domesticate large mammals has had a strong influence over their success. Thus, for example, the Aryans conquered using horses (using them for chariots, though - horseback soldiers had to wait for the invention of the saddle and the stirrup much later.)

So, why did some nations domesticate animals more successfully? For example, no large mammals were ever domesticated in Africa and South America. Though Africa has no native horse, it has the zebra which is close. But the zebra was never domesticated. There are many other animals that humans attempted to domesticate without success.

The scientist Jared Diamond pondered this question and came up with a list of six characteristics that an animal needs in order for successful domestication. It must eat without too much fuss. It must reach maturity that is, productive and reproductive years - quickly. It must breed in captivity. It must be docile, not confrontational, by nature. It must not flee or panic when startled. And it must be a social animal conforming to a hierarchy, so that it recognizes the human as a leader.

Over the millennia of human civilization, very few animals have fit the bill. For example, the elephant's slow growth rate, the zebra's flighty nature, and the American bison's nasty attitude have precluded us from domesticating them.

So the next time you see a cow, a goat, a horse, or a water buffalo, think how lucky we are to have them as our beasts of burden.

Powerful men behind building illegal structures

The National Memorial was built in Savar, outside the capital, as an embodiment of the sacrifice the martyrs made for the country's independence in 1971. But the beauty of the structure standing tall with dignity is partially lost from view as illegal structures did not spare it either.

Around 1,000 makeshift shops have been set up illegally on the footpath along rial complex and a funny game of evicting those traders twice a year, once on Victory Day (December 16) and the other on Independence Day (March 26), has been on play for the last 10 years.

On Tuesday, the reporter visited the area

and found over 20 makeshift restaurants, 50 fruit shops, and several hundred shops of garment items, shoes, cosmetics and other stuff on Dhaka-Aricha highway. The front of the gate, which should welcome visitors with its beauty, now houses a shop for renting cars.

114 new coaches soon

Says railways secretary; inaugurates Service Week

Bangladesh Railway is set to add 114 new coaches from India and Indonesia to its fleet.

Railways Secretary Firoze Salauddin told this to journalists yesterday after inaugurating "Passenger Service Week-2015" at Kamalapur Railway Station in the capital marking the fifth founding anniversary of the railways ministry. He and other officials greeted passengers with flowers and choco-

The objective of the week is to improve the quality of services, run trains on time, keep trains and railway stations clean and extend all out cooperation to passengers, said Bangladesh Railway Director General

M Amzad Hossain. Last month, the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council decided to purchase 250 new coaches, including the

The purchase was part of an estimated Tk 1,374 crore railways carriage project of which Asian Development Bank is to provide Tk 1,000 crore and the government the rest. Bangladesh Railway is expected to complete the project by June 2019.

The government plans to procure 200 meter gauge coaches and 50 broad gauge coaches, said Planning Minister AHM Mustafa Kamal.

Now Bangladesh Railway has 1,165 meter gauge coaches, but 591 of those are running with various defects and lack passenger amenities.

On the other hand, out of Bangladesh Railway's 324 broad gauge coaches, 78 have already crossed their economic life.

Khulna school for the blind, deaf limping along

Housed in a dilapidated building and functioning with only half its staff, Goalkhali Government School for the Blind and the Deaf in Khulna city is plagued with multipronged problems over the years.

All of its activities are running in the 50-year-old school buildings, which are now in a crumbling state.

Alongside the prolonged teacher shortage, 50 percent posts of the school staff, including that of superintendent, are lying vacant. There are no steps in sight to solve the problems, though especially shortage of skilled teachers is hampering studies beyond description.

The authorities said only government intervention can save the school from further deterioration.

School sources said during inception it offered education up to grade 5, which was later elevated to grade 10.

At present, 120 students are studying in the school against its total capacity of 130. Of them, 44 are blind and 76 are deaf. Three students of the school are prospective Secondary

School Certificate examinees, but there are no teachers to guide them presently. They now have to take lessons in other nearby schools

with regular students. As regular textbooks are not disabled-friendly, these physically challenged students are finding it hard to keep

pace with their regular peers. The school has enough space for accommodation of the students but the buildings have become so old that they are unfit for living in. Also with as less as Tk 2,600 monthly allocation for each student, it is very difficult to maintain their living at the school. Three posts of teachers at the school are currently lying vacant. At present, only four fulltime teachers and

Visually impaired students Saddam and Azizul told the news agency that as long as the school coordinator is here, they feel good but when he is not there, there is no body to look after them.

eight part time teachers teach at the school.

Additional Coordinator Kazi Mohammad Ibrahim said, "Technically I'm not the school coordinator but since there is nobody here, I am performing extra duties of four other posts."
