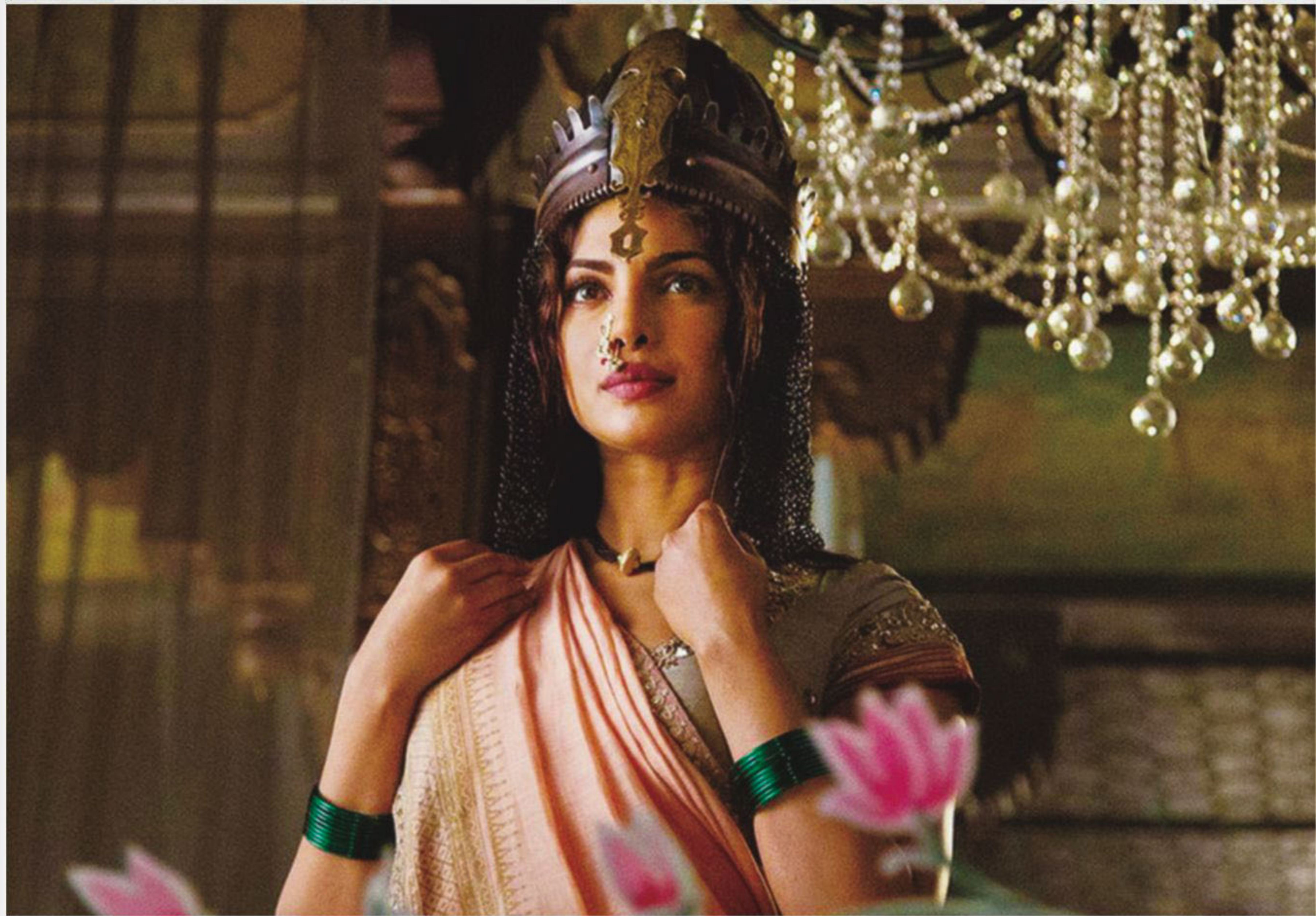


I'm single, ready to mingle: TANISHAA MUKERJI

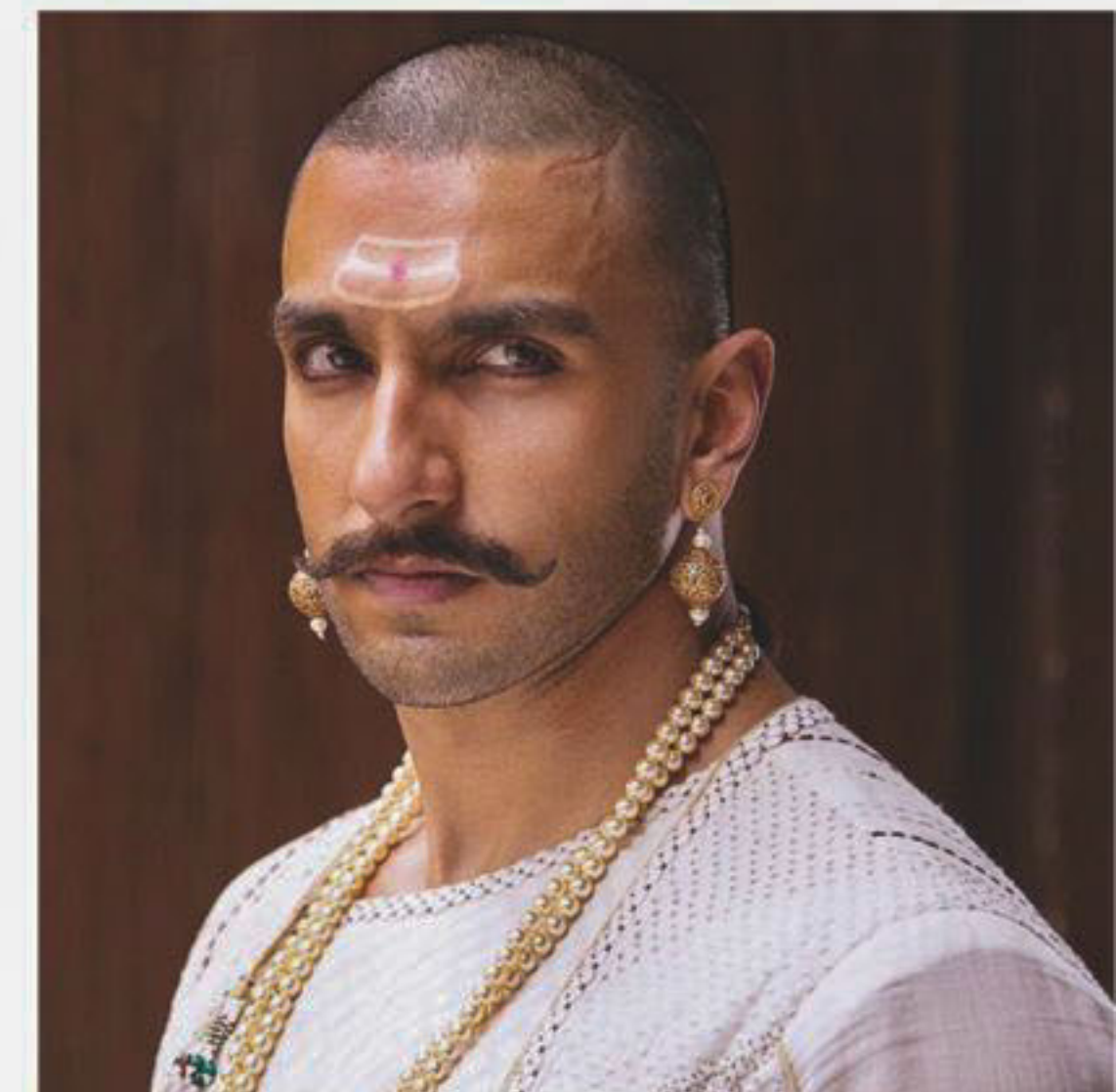

Don't return awards, fight for your cause: Shekhar Kapur
