Fifty-nine noted personalities have signed a statement calling for releasing Nagorik Oikya Convener Mahmudur Rahman Manna from prison and giving him a chance to defend himself in a trial.

A press release, issued by Nagorik Oikya yesterday with the photocopy of the signatures, read that Manna, a former student leader and politician, had been in jail for the last nine months without a trial. Former caretaker govern-

ment adviser Hafizuddin Khan, Communist Party of Bangladesh President Mujahidul Islam Selim, human rights activist Nur Khan Liton, Gonoshasthaya Kendra Trustee Dr Zafrullah Chowdhury were among the signatories.

Manna was arrested on February 24, a day after his telephone conversation with BNP leader Sadeque Hossain Khoka about strengthening the anti-government movement, among many other issues, was leaked. A sedition case was filed against the two on March 5.

Student convention seeks recognition for Adivasis

Recalls their sacrifices in Liberation War

The indigenous people fought by the side of Bangalees for the country's independence in 1971 but the constitution has not recognised them as Adivasis and their right to land yet, a convention of indigenous students was told yesterday.

Although the ruling party had pledged to give the recognition, it has taken a controversial role now, speakers said at the gathering of over 150 indigenous students of Rajshahi University on the campus. Vice Chancellor Prof Muhammad Mizanuddin inaugurated the programme.

The speakers placed a 12-point demand including creation of a separate land commission for plain land Adivasis in order to reclaim their land and solve land disputes.

Other points include giving primary education in their mother languages, preserving a 5 percent quota for indigenous students in all public educational institu-

tions, including their cultures and lifestyle in textbooks, and providing scholarships to indigenous students.

Addressing the convention as special guest, RU Pro-VC Prof Chowdhury Sarwar Jahan expressed solidarity with the

Students should come forward to ensure the rights of the communities, he said. "Only education can protect the rights of indigenous people," he added.

Bishuram Murmu, vice president of Indigenous Students' Council, presided over the convention, while Rabindranath Soren, president of National Indigenous Council, was present as chief guest.

Among others, RU students' adviser Prof Sadekul Arefin, presidium member o National Indigenous Council Anil Marandi, lawyer Babul Robi Das, and Associate Professor of RU's mass communication and journalism department Dulal Chandra Biswas spoke.

All a 15-year-old boy wanted was a place in Karwan Bazar in the capital where he could have some warmth at night.

Md Naim made this request when he was asked to say something at an opinionsharing meeting on rehabilitation of street children yesterday.

His job is to load and unload papaya from trucks from 9:00pm till 6:00am three nights a week. During the day, he stays at Aparajeya Bangladesh's drop-in centre in Karwan Bazar. Street children can eat, sleep, shower, study or just relax at the centre. The centre is closed at night.

"We sleep on the ground floor of a red building. Sometimes we sleep on top of empty delivery trucks. There

are about 40 of us who do not have a place wards of Dhaka North this October and to sleep at night," he said, adding, "Many of us are small children and it becomes difficult to sleep under one blanket in winter."

At the meeting in the Family Planning Directorate office in the capital, State Minister for Women and Children Affairs Ministry Meher Afroze Chumki said, "Let us

out in the open at night in 2016."

Multi-Sectoral Programme on Violence against Women of the ministry and the social welfare ministry organised the programme to discuss rehabilitation strategies with NGOs and development partners.

Nasima Begum, secretary to the women and children affairs ministry, said after the prime minister's "We don't want to

announcement in October that no child should live on the streets, two committees under the two Dhaka city corporations were formed to rehabilitate street children of two wards.

Project director of the programme on violence against women, Abul Hossain, also head of the committee under Dhaka North, presented results of a survey carried out in 36

November.

A total of 317 children -- 232 boys and 85 girls -- were interviewed. About 70 percent of the respondents were between six and 10 years, 13.56 between 11 and 15, 12.93 under five and 3.16 percent were between 16 and 18 years. About 70 percent said they want rehabilitation and the rest fear shelters as


