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HUMAN TRAFFICKING BY SEA

Dons stay out of law's reach

250 cases filed, 400 alleged middlemen and local agents caught; victims see little hope as world observes International Migrants Day today

Law enforcers have so far failed to arrest any of the masterminds behind the trafficking of over 3,000 Bangladeshis through the Bay of Bengal this year.

They have been carrying out drives to track down human traffickers and their ring leaders since the trafficking victims were rescued mostly from Thailand and Malaysia in May and June. In the last six months,

law enforcers could only arrest around 400 alleged middlemen and local agents of human-trafficking networks, not any of the ring

At the same time, the government has also failed to speed up investigation and trial of around 250 cases filed in June and

July against around a thousand alleged human traffickers.

In July, Law Minister Anisul Huq said the cases filed over human trafficking would be tried in special tribunals.

But no such tribunal has been set up yet.

> All of this adds to the gloomy picture of Bangladesh's fight against human trafficking, as the country like all other nations around the globe observes International Migrants Day today. Though Bangladeshi

investigators could not identify any of the masterminds behind the trafficking, the Thai government tracked down and arrested some leaders of human-trafficking networks, including a senior Thai army official.

They're making Efforts to deal with migrant crisis at 'a breaking point'

Says UN; EU holds summit to debate over new border plan

· Humanitarian organisations attempting to help the soaring numbers of people fleeing conflicts and natural disasters around the world are at "a breaking point," UN refugee · chief Antonio Guterres warned on Wednesday.

"In the last few years, we have seen a staggering escalation displacement caused both by conflict and by natural hazards," Guterres told a conference in Geneva on the root · causes of displacement. "The fact that we are seeing so many new crises breaking

out without any of the old ones getting resolved, clearly illustrates the lack of capacity and political will to end The ILO report came just : conflict, let alone prevent it," Guterres said, pointing out · that the number of people forced to flee daily due to conflict International Migrants Day, : and persecution nearly quadrupled between 2010 and 2014.

Mayhem on Mirpur Road as students, traders clash

At least 30 hurt, 4 motorcycles burnt, shops vandalised in two-hour violence

Students of Dhaka College yesterday clashed with traders on the stretch of Mirpur Road between New Market and Science Laboratory intersections, paralysing the city's busiest shopping hub for hours.

Traffic on the busy road came to an abrupt halt as the students and shopkeepers of Dhanmondi Hawkers' Market fought pitched battles for about two hours from 3:30pm.

At least 30 people, including pedestrians and shoppers, were injured, over two dozen shops vandalised and "looted", four motorbikes set on fire and a number of vehicles damaged before police managed to bring the situation under control around 5:30pm.

"You cannot even imagine the situation we had to deal with. Brickbats were raining onto the streets," said Jasim Uddin, additional deputy commissioner (Ramna

Division) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police. "We fired rubber bullets, sound grenades and 50 tear gas shells to contain the situation."

Even when this correspondent visited the area at 6:00pm, about 70 yards of both lanes of the road was covered with brick chunks and sticks used during the violence.

All these stemmed from an altercation over the pricing of clothes at a store in the market. An argument broke out between two

students at a sari store -- Sari Mela, said Habibur Rahman, owner of the shop. "They chose three saris worth about Tk

60,000. But they wanted them for free.

"When we refused to comply, the [students] said, 'We control the Dhaka Metropolitan Area'," he said, adding that the students had a woman and a child with them. At one stage of the brawl, the students left

Cops, ulema decide to collect

"fatwa" that Islam and its followers have no connection with militancy. A view-exchange meeting between alem-ulema and

police over tackling militancy in Bangladesh came up with the idea that signatures of one lakh alem-ulema would be collected to issue the religious edict.

Bangladesh Jamiatul Ulema Parishad Chairman Maulana Fariduddin Masud will form a committee to work on the plan while police agreed to help launch a campaign for building awareness of militancy.

Bangladesh Police arranged the discussion on "Role of Islam in eradicating militancy: Bangladesh perspective" at the headquarters in the capital.

There are some 3 lakh imams and 6 lakh muezzins across the country and so it will not be impossible to collect 1 lakh signatures, said Fariduddin, a noted Islamist thinker.

He added that the fatwa could also be circulated abroad.

Winter sets in, finally Met forecasts cold wave for month-end

STAR REPORT It showed up late but win-

ter has finally arrived.

A mild cold wave is sweeping over Rajshahi division and regions of Tangail, Mymensingh, Gopalganj, Sreemangal, Rangpur, Dinajpur, Jessore and Chuadanga, says the met office.

Yesterday, country's lowest temperature was recorded in Sreemangal at 8.4 degrees Celsius. As the mercury has

dropped suddenly, the people in the capital are also feeling a chill in the air. However, a Dhaka met

official says the temperature at night may rise by one or two degrees in a couple of days before a cold wave strikes the country in the last week of this month.

"We have forecast one cold wave for the last week of December and at least two others for January," said meteorologist Arif Hossain, adding that the duration of this winter would be shorter than usual.
