

IMF chief to stand trial over Tapie payout

International Monetary Fund chief Christine Lagarde was ordered yesterday to stand trial over her handling of a massive state payout to French tycoon Bernard Tapie when she was finance minister. when she was finance minister.

Lagarde was placed under formal investigation in 2014 for negligence in a protracted legal drama pitting Tapie against a bank which he accused of defrauding him during his sale of Adidas in the 1990s.

The 59-year-old Frenchwoman was finance minister under former president Nicolas Sarkozy in 2008 when she decided to allow arbitration in the dispute between Tapie and partly state-owned Credit Lyonnais.

The arbitration resulted in Tapie, who had close ties to Sarkozy, being awarded a payout of 403 million euros (\$433 million), which would have to be covered by a state-run body in charge of settling the bank's debts.

French prosecutors in September called for the case against Lagarde to be dropped, however investigating judges decided to send her to trial, a legal source told AFP yesterday.

The negligence charge comes over Lagarde's failure to challenge the award that was hugely beneficial to Tapie but prejudicial to

Putin launches scathing attack on Turkey leadership over jet row

Russia's Vladimir Putin subjected Turkey to a furious tirade yesterday, using barrack-room language to wonder aloud whether it had shot down a Russian warplane last month to curry favour with the United States.

Addressing almost 1,400 reporters in a cavernous hall inside a Moscow conference centre, the Russian president dedicated a chunk of his annual news conference to spelling out why he saw no prospect of a rapprochement with Ankara. "If someone in the Turkish leader-

ship decided to lick the Americans in a particular place I don't know whether they acted correctly or not and I don't know ... whether the Americans needed that," said Putin, referring to the shooting down. Putin said he could imagine a

scenario where there was a deal for Turkey to shoot down a Russian plane in return for Washington turning a blind eye to Turkish troops entering Iraq. Putin made clear Russian sanctions

would stay in place for some time, saying it was hard for the Kremlin to reach any kind of agreement with the

When dreams fall apart

Five years ago, on December 17, Mohamed Bouazizi, a 26year-old street vendor, set himself on fire outside a local municipal office in his hometown of Sidi Bouzid to protest against police corruption - a solitary act that would set off a stunning chain of events throughout the Arab world.

In the years since Bouazizi's death, Tunisia has gone through tremendous change. After street protests forced President Zine El Abidine Ben Ali into exile after two decades of his rule, Tunisia adopted a new constitution and held national elections in 2014. Earlier this month, the country's National Dialogue Quartet was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for assisting Tunisia's transition to democracy.

But despite the changes that have taken place around them, residents of Sidi Bouzid say their lives are no better than they were before the uprising.

"Before the toppling of the regime of Ben Ali, we had hopes," Ramzi Abdouli, 29, a graduate from Sidi Bouzid, told

Al Jazeera. "We thought that maybe when Ben Ali left our



reality would change. Unfortunately, it was not the case." Like many of Tunisia's youth, Abdouli participated in the

2010-2011 protests, hoisting banners against the regime. Even after Ben Ali was deposed, Abdouli marched more than 250km from Sidi Bouzid to Tunis in April 2012 to reiterate demands for social justice and employment.

Today, via social media, he remains a relentless critic of the current government. "The youth now in Sidi Bouzid feel that we have been excluded, ignored and marginalised," he said. Employment was one of the key demands of protesters

during Tunisia's 2010-2011 uprising. But things have gone worse since then. Due to the overwhelming sense of hopelessness, many

EU leaders yesterday warned Britain over its "unacceptable" reform demands and urged greater unity on the migrant crisis at a summit marking the end of one of the bloc's toughest ever years. David Cameron was told by

Francois Hollande and other top officials in the European Union that his calls for limits to benefits for EU workers in Britain threatened the 28nation club's core principles. The British premier vowed to "battle

through the night" to make progress towards a deal at the next EU gathering in February, before holding a referendum on Britain's membership by the end of 2017.

2015 likely to be hottest ever: report

The globe shattered yet another heat record in November, continuing a warming trend that is all but certain to make 2015 the hottest in modern history, US government

scientists said yesterday. Last month was the warmest November in 136 years and marked seven months in a row of recordbreaking temperatures, said the National Oceanic and Atmospheric

Administration (NOAA) in its monthly climate report. The November tempera-

ture across global land and ocean surfaces was 1.75 degrees Fahrenheit (0.97 degrees Celsius) above the 20th century average. That means 2015 is

poised to overtake 2014 as the most scorching year in contemporary times.

Scientists say the trend is likely a result of humandriven climate change, whereby the burning of fossil fuels spews greenhouses gases into the atmosphere and traps heat.
