Court uses inherent power amid labour ministry's refusal; issues arrest order for 24

COURT CORRESPONDENT

A Dhaka court yesterday used its inherent power to include three labour ministry officials in the charge sheet of the murder case filed over the Rana Plaza collapse in Savar in April 2013. The investigating officer (IO) of the

case found involvement of the three in the crimes. But the labour ministry

refused to give its approval to bring charges against them. According to law, government's prior approval is required to give a charge sheet against a government official.

The IO, however, put their names in the charge sheet

along with 38 other accused, and the court yesterday showed them as accused in the case filed over the country's deadliest industrial disaster. At least 1,136 people, mostly garment workers, were

killed and more than 2,500 injured in the building collapse that evoked bitter global criticism of the standard of labour and human rights in Bangladesh.

Since then, the ready-made garment sector, considered as the lifeline of the country's economy, has been going through a massive reform to regain the confidence of international buyers and the global community.

New policy hailed

But shortage of workers feared

WELFARE OF DOMESTIC HELPS

Different stakeholders have hailed a government policy to protect the rights of domestic workers, but working parents fear it may create a shortage of domestic helps causing a crisis for them.

Members of National Domestic Women Workers Union believe that the policy, if implemented, will go a long way to stop violence and torture on domestic helps. They also think it will increase safety and security for both the employers and the helps.

The policy, approved by the cabinet

yesterday, has fixed the minimum age for domestic helps at 14. It also focuses on fair wage, decent working conditions, fixed working hours, identity cards, contract of employment, maternity leave and legal actions against physical or verbal abuse and sexual harassment.

"I thank the prime minister for enacting the policy for domestic workers for which we have been waging a movement since long. People's awareness will increase. As a result, torture on domestic workers will lessen too," said Murshida Akter, general SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

Blatter, 79, and Platini, 60, were then "immediately" banned from all **Platini** football activity. Blatter's


career is now almost certainly over while Platini's hopes of taking over FIFA are all but finished.

Probe goes slow amid rampant rules violation

Although the municipality polls are only eight days away, many returning officers are falling behind with the probes into alleged violations of electoral laws by the ruling Awami League men.



The Election Commission in the last one and a half weeks sent letters in phases to about 50 returning officers (RO), including 10 yesterday, asking them to investigate the allegations raised in the media.
