Seminar stresses reforms

Successive governments have made many land-related laws over the years but those have failed to establish people's land rights, speakers said at a seminar yesterday.

The country now has 146 landrelated laws that are causing endless sufferings to people, as many of those are either too complex or contradictory to one another.

The governments at times took initiatives to reduce people's sufferings but they didn't suc-

ceed most of the time due to bureaucratic tangles, they said. If the present government doesn't reform the laws with a people-oriented approach, it would not be possible to establish land rights of the vulnerable group that includes women, indigenous communities and marginal people, according to the speakers.

Prof Abul Barkat presented the keynote speech on "Land Laws of Bangladesh: A Right-based Analysis and Proposed Changes" at the seminar organised by Manusher Jonno Foundation at The Daily Star Centre in the capital.

Around 59 percent of the country's population are landless. If the government fails to establish people's land rights, marginal people would not benefit from the country's economic growth, said Barkat.

Even if Bangladesh becomes a middleincome country, people wouldn't gain from it if their land rights are not established, he said. Barkat led a team of researchers that analysed all 146

land-related laws dividing those in 20 categories. The team suggested that the government draft nine new laws and reforms 11 laws. He said they proposed making a law that would not

allow any individual to posses more than 40 bighas of agricultural land and 20 bighas of non-agricultural land.

Land gone, so is his kingdom

Urang King Rathindra now survives by selling milk of nine cows

Once their forefathers had ruled a fairly large territory; once they had a royal throne. But all those glories have faded into a distant past.

Still, members of the Urang community, a small ethnic group mainly based in the Sylhet region, treat them as "the royal family".

Raja Rathindra Urang, currently regarded as "a king", cannot afford to donate money for his people or to ensure justice for them anymore. Ironically enough, now he himself is a victim of gross injustice; now he him-

self has to work hard to make both ends meet. During a recent visit to Rathindra's house in Chandantila area under Sylhet Sadar upazila, this


A group of human rights organisations has appealed to the US government to allow in Bangladeshi writers and publishers, targeted by Islamist extremists for their secular beliefs.

In a letter to Secretary of State John F Kerry, the rights bodies also asked for measures to arrange emergency relocation of those Bangladeshi writer-bloggers to other like-minded nations in case America is unable to take them all in.

They cited killing of four writerbloggers and a publisher this year since February. Islamist extremist groups like Ansar al-Islam, Ansarullah Bangla Team and Al-Qaeda in the Indian subcontinent have claimed responsibility for these murders.

In an act of horrendous cruelty, a bus driver yesterday ran a man over and killed him in the capital following an argument.

The dead, Mohammad Faruk, 40, was a CNG-run auto-rickshaw driver.

According to witnesses, a Tetulia Paribahan bus, which runs on Mohammadpur-Mirpur-Abdullahpur route, hit Faruk's auto-rickshaw from behind on Mymensingh Road near Jasim Uddin intersection around 11:40am.
