

## Paeans to a wordsmith

### Tributes pour in for Syed Haque

Syed Shamsul Haque, fondly called Syed Haque, is one of the few litterateurs who tremendously enriched Bangla literature in the post-Rabindranath era. He has left his marks in every branch of literature -be it poetry, novel, plays, essays or translation. The celebrated writer turned 80 on December 27.

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Marking the day, Syed Haque Jayanti Udjapon Parishad--a group of cultural personalities--arranged a celebration programme at the National Theatre Hall of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy on Sunday evening.

The event began with a welcome

speech by Akhtaruzzaman, general secretary of Bangladesh Group Theatre Federation. Natyajan Ataur Rahman welcomed Syed Haque and his wife, noted writer Anowara Syed Haque, on stage. He also presided over the programme. Noted thespian Ramendu

Majumdar gave a speech citing Syed Haque as a mentor, colleague and inspiration. He urged the writer to write at least one play every year. Another speaker, eminent actor Aly


Zaker walked down memory lane to reminisce on the good days when he played lead roles in Syed Haque's plays. Seasoned thespian Shimul Yousuff sang a song for the playwright.

Nasiruddin Yousuff also talked about the writer. Renowned thespian Ferdousi Majumdar came up on the stage to pay tribute to the writer. She recalled the good old days. Members of different cultural

organisations and theatre troupe wished Syed Haque on his birthday. Hasan Arif recited from Syed Haq's poem, while noted Tagore artiste Aditi Mohsin presented two songs--"Jogoter Anandojogge Amar Nimontron" and "Sarthok Jonmo Amar". Syed Shamsul Haq was born in

Kurigram in 1935. After finishing secondary education in Kurigram, he fled to Bombay (Mumbai) in 1951 where he worked as an assistant at a production company. The next year, he returned to Bangladesh and enrolled at Jagannath College (now Jagannath University) to study humanities. Later, he enrolled himself in Dhaka University to study English Literature, but dropped out without earning his degree. His first novel "Deyaler Desh" was published shortly after, and since then, he has not stopped writing poetry, fictions, plays, novels, essays and even songs. In recognition to his contributions


to Bangla literature, Syed Haque was honoured with the Bangla Academy Award (1966), Ekushey Padak (1984), Independence Day Award (2000) and many more prestigious accolades.



leadership qualities in organising artists and art movements, Abedin took the initiative to found the Government Institute of Arts and Crafts (now Faculty of Fine Arts) in 1948 on Dhaka University campus, of which he was the founding principal. This institute trained and nurtured an entire generation of artists whose works reflected the changing times. Qamrul Hassan, Safiuddin Ahmed, Shafiqul Amin, Anwarul Haq were contemporaries of Zainul Abedin. This was the generation that depicted the changing social reality in their art. It was his rare contribution to


depict the miseries of the starving people during the great famine of Bengal (in 1943). He made his own ink by burning charcoal; using it on cheap ordinary packaging paper, he depicted the starving people. In his sketches, the famine showed its sinister face through the skeletal figures of people. Zainul Abedin depicted this inhuman story with human emotions. These sketches helped him find his way in a realistic approach that focused the human sufferings, struggle and protest. The Rebel Crow marks a high point of that style.

"Abedin Sir was a man of great heart. His masterpieces are priceless assets for us. His contributions to art creation and education through establishing Dhaka Art College are immense. I have many fond memo-

ries with Sir. Once, Sir went to my home district in Chandpur where we painted together on a boat around the confluence of the rivers -- Meghna, Padma and Dakatia," recalls reputed artist Monirul Islam.

"We must go down memory lane to have a close look at our respective artistic efforts and contributions to judge what Shilpacharya Zainul Abedin did single-handedly for fine art, fine art education, and overall culture of this part of the world. Have we collectively carried forward the rich legacy that he left? We have to think of the country's citizens, fine art, art education and culture with a sacrificing mind beyond mere personal interests and pursuits," said Professor Nisar Hossain,

Dean of FFA, DU.

Born in Mymensingh, Abedin grew up in the serene landscape by the river Brahmaputra. In 1933, he enrolled at Calcutta Government Art School, and later taught at the institute. He was an influential member of the Calcutta Group of progressive artists.

Abedin was involved in the Liberation War movement. He was in the forefront of the cultural move ment to re-establish the Bangalee identity. In 1975, Zainul Abedin set up a folk museum at Sonargaon, and a permanent gallery in Mymensingh (Shilpacharya Zainul Abedin Sangrahashala) to display some of his works.

Abedin died in 1976 in Dhaka.





# A Colossal Year for Hollywood Box Office

### Most films overshadowed by monumental blockbusters

At the multiplexes this year, it was a clear case of the haves and have nots. Thanks to monster hits such as "Furious

7", "Jurassic World", "Avengers: Age of Ultron" and "Star Wars: The Force Awakens" — all four of which will end up among the top seven highest-grossing films — ticket sales soared to record levels. For the first time in history, the domestic box office will hit \$11 billion, but that hefty

number was achieved on the back of a small collection of pictures. Through Christmas weekend, the top ten films in 2015 accounted for nearly 35% of overall ticket sales. Last year that num-

ber was less than 25%. "A significant portion of the overall gross was coming from far fewer films," notes Chris Aronson, Fox's domestic distri-

bution chief. And while there was a great preponderance of global-spanning blockbusters than ever before, with five movies likely to exceed \$1 billion in revenue for the first time, the wealth was more concentrated. Here's a sign of how the riches weren't divided as equitably. In 2013 and 2014, thirteen films made more than \$200 million domestically, while in 2012, eleven pictures exceeded that threshold. This year, only nine films have eclipsed that figure.

For studios that do manage to tap into the zeitgeist, the rewards are plentiful. That latest "Star Wars" is already the fastest to record \$1 billion globally, and stands a good chance of blowing past "Avatar" to become the highest-grossing film. The

mammoth hauls for "Jurassic World" and "Furious 7" demonstrate that even after a decade, these franchises are only increasing in popularity. And films like "The Martian" and "Inside Out" rode a wave of critical raves to commercial riches both at home and abroad. They manage to enjoy what in television is referred to as "water-cooler status" - a cultural primacy that has people rushing out to multiplexes to see them so they won't be left out of the conversa-

The one-percenters' slice of the overall pie was far greater too. Universal, which fielded "Jurassic World", "Furious 7", and "Minions", commanded 22% of the market share and earned a massive \$6.8 billion globally. In the past fifteen years, no studio has gobbled up more 20% of the market and exceeded \$6 billion in receipts.

For its part, Disney, armed with popular brands such as Marvel, Pixar, and Lucasfilm, exceed \$5 billion globally for the first time -- and currently seen as a studio superpower without equal.

"The rich got richer and the poor got poorer," said Jeff Bock, a box office analyst with Exhibitor Relations. "This isn't just something we're going to see more of in the future. This is the future. Disney is now a super studio. The other studios can't touch them right now."

The discrepancy in wealth accumulation is squeezing out mid-range hits, Bock and others argue. There is still a week left in 2015, but it appears as though the number

of films that gross \$100 million or more will likely be at its lowest levels in five

The new model also allows films to land with a louder thud than previously suffered. The year had three of the 10 best openings in history with "Jurassic World" and "Avengers: Age of Ultron", but also suffered six of the worst widerelease debuts ever with "We Are Your Friends", "Jem and the Holograms", "Burnt", "The Walk", "Victor Frankenstein" and "Rock the Kasbah". Many of these pictures had big stars and high-profile directors and it didn't make a difference with audiences.


