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Campaign ends, tension remains

As the three-week electioneering ended yesterday midnight, the Election Commission imposed a restriction on outsiders' stay in electoral areas.

The EC asked all the returning officers to make sure

that no outsiders were in electoral areas. Like the previous days, the last day of campaigning

also saw violence across the country, report district correspondents.

A BNP leader was killed in Matiranga of Khagrachhari and some 200 people were injured in violence during electioneering in the last three weeks, according to media reports.

A total of 234 municipalities will go to polls tomorrow. Candidates officially started campaigning on December 9, five days before the Election Commission allotted electoral symbols to them.

The electoral code of conduct bars any kind of electioneering 32 hours ahead of voting. Besides, movement of vehicles on roads and vessels on waterways would be restricted for 24 hours from midnight today.

Movement of auto-rickshaw, taxicab, human haulier, microbus, jeep, pick-up, car, bus, truck, launch and speedboat would remain banned.

Motorcycles also stayed off roads from midnight yesterday. The restriction will remain in force till 6:00am Thursday.

2 'robbers' killed in 'gunfight'

Two alleged robbers, including the chief of infamous "Akash Babu Bahini", were killed in a "gunfight" with members of Rapid Action Battalion on the Tambulbunia canal in the Sundarbans yesterday.

The deceased are Kashem alias Akash, 40, the chief of the gang, and Farid alias Maijja, 45, its second-incommand, Rab said.

Acting on a tip-off, a team of Rab-8 conducted a drive on the canal under Chandpai Range of the mangrove forest in the morning, said Rab-8 Deputy Director Maj Adnan Kabir, who led the drive.

Sensing the Rab men's presence, a gang of 10 to 12 robbers opened fire on them. As the Rab members retaliated, a "gunfight" ensued, which lasted for SEE PAGE 10 COL 3

KOREAN 'COMFORT WOMEN' Japan offers \$8.3m for WWII sex slaves

Japan and South Korea have agreed to settle the issue of "comfort women" forced to work in Japanese brothels during World War Two, in their first such deal since 1965.

Japan has apologised and will pay 1bn yen (\$8.3m, £5.6m) - the amount South Korea asked for to fund victims. The issue has been the key cause for strained ties. South Korea has demanded stronger apologies and compensation. Only 46 former "comfort women" are still alive in South Korea.

The announcement came after Japan's foreign minister Fumio Kishida arrived in Seoul for discussions with his counterpart Yun Byung-se, following moves to speed up talks.

Treasure found in 2,000-yr-old China tomb

Gold coins are among the valuable items unearthed at the tomb of a Chinese emperor who died thousands of years ago.

Archaeologists digging at the royal tombs of the Marquis of Haihun State of the Western Han Dynasty (206 BC-AD 24) uncovered large quantities of gold over the festive period.

The cemetery, which contains eight tombs and a chariot burial site, has been studied for five years and has produced Wuzhu bronze coins, jade and thousands of other gold, bronze and iron items.

According to China Daily, the royal tombs are the best preserved of the Western Han Dynasty ever found in the country.

It is thought the main tomb at the site in Jiangxi, an eastern Chinese province where archaeologists SEE PAGE 10 COL 6
