The night is dark, the weather cold. Through winter's silence, I move from Kashimpur in Gazipur towards Namabazar. The clock says it's the time when the world is supposed to rest, when people usually sleep. But with activity, Namabazar is alive. Hundreds of people work tirelessly in these wee hours. Would you believe it? They're here for one

thing: fish. Partners, labourers and buyers busy at auction, all are busy. Freezer vans are available, ready to transport fish across the country. For fisher folk on the 3,000 acre floodplain of Kashimpur there is no difference between night and day, during this season. A unique, fish farming cooperative has made the floodplain a place of handsome profit.

"I buy at least two tonnes of fish every night," says Kismat Ali Sarker, a whole-

"There are 120 shareholders in this project," says Mahbub, one of the project's main entrepreneurs. "Each holds a Tk. 50,000

21 schools in Nilphamari still struggle to get back normalcy

Twenty-one educational institutions in Dimla and Jaldhaka upazilas of the district are still struggling to restore normalcy, two years after Jamaat-Shibir men wreaked havoc on those, in desperate bid to resist the 10th parliamentary elections on January 5 in 2014.

The institutions, including 14 primary schools, four high schools and three madrasas are conducting regular classes as the government provided financial and technical support for the purpose.

But most of them are still facing difficulties as official records like old registers containing SSC certificates of students and MPO sheets and service books of teachers and other staff were burnt to

There are still complications regarding drawing of salaries due to the situa-

Science students are the most sufferers as laboratory apparatuses of those schools are either burnt or looted.

Visiting badly affected Satjan High School in Dimla upazila on Monday noon, it was found that students gathered at the school ground as new books were being distributed.

Repair for the structural damage has been done with Tk 12.5 lakh allocated by the government, said advocate Nurul Islam, president of the school managing committee (SMC).

"We had a school library with 2,000 books and a rich science laboratory but the attackers destroyed both.
