## activists reaches new height

Says Ireland-based group Front Line Defenders STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Offence against human rights activists has reached new heights in many countries including Bangladesh but international reaction to the circumstances remains weak, Ireland-based rights group Front Line Defenders said in its annual report. "Extreme violence is being used more frequently and in

more countries, while fabricated prosecutions and unfair trials have become the norm in many parts of the world," said Executive Director of the organisation Mary Lawlor.

The 2016 report launched yesterday said 156 human rights activists were killed or died in detention in 25 countries in the first eleven months of 2015.

As of November, 52 were killed in Afghanistan, Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Myanmar, Pakistan, the Philippines, and Thailand. Almost 70 percent of these killings involved environmental, land or indigenous peoples' rights. In reference to Bangladesh, the report cited the killings of five bloggers. Rights activists also received death threats from religious extremists. Physical assaults by police, plainclothes agents or unidentified thugs were on the rise, and occurred in Afghanistan, Bangladesh, China, India, the Maldives, Nepal and Vietnam.

# Offence against rights PM for exploiting global TIB seeks organic food market

Distributes Bangabandhu National Agriculture Award

UNB, Dhaka

Stressing the importance of diversifying the country's export basket with various agroproducts, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said Bangladesh can exploit the opportunity of exporting organic foods as those have huge demand in the global market. A special demand for organic foods has

been created across the globe, she said, adding that the prices of organic foods are much higher than the foods produced through chemical fertilisers. Hasina was addressing a function after

handing over the Bangabandhu National Agriculture Award 1420 to some 28 individuals and four organisations at the Osmani Memorial Auditorium in Dhaka. The prime minister also underlined the

need for greater investment in agro-based industries in 100 economic zones being set up across the country.

Once the 100 economic zones are set up, she said, the country will be able to earn more foreign currencies through producing, processing and exporting agro-based prod-

"Bangladesh is no longer a country of food deficit...it has attained food autarky and also made its place in global arena in many things, including rice, wheat, fish, vegetable and fruit production," she said, urging people not to keep their land fallow and maintain the production momentum. On the country's economic progress,

Hasina said no one will be able to undermine Bangladesh as it has demonstrated its strength by going for constructing Padma Bridge with its own fund. Apart from boosting the agricultural

production, steps should continue so that the farmers get the due prices of their produces alongside diversifying the export basket of the agricultural products through setting up more agro-processed factories, Hasina said.

The prime minister renewed her firm resolve to turn Bangladesh into a hunger- and poverty-free middle-income country by 2021

industrialisation and smoking were major contributors to the rise of cancer cases.

Malaysia is working with local universities and global experts to assess its health system, Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah, director general of Health Malaysia, wrote in a letter to the New Straits Times on June 22 last year.

It has adopted the "family doctor" concept to strengthen the primary healthcare service in Malaysia in which each family will be assigned to a doctor who will take the responsibility of their

healthcare "from womb to tomb", he said. These initiatives are underway when Malaysia already heavily subsidises the health sector. Its health ministry recovers less than 3 percent of actual expenditure in the public healthcare system.

Kavitha Mathuvay, regional director of market development at the Malaysia Healthcare Travel Council (MHTC), said Malaysia was focusing on wellness care rather than treatment.

The argument is "why not educate people towards preventive care and take care of their health" in terms of lifestyle, eating pattern, smoking, and sugar intake, she said.

The picture of preventive care in Bangladesh, however, is still dismal.

According to the Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) 1997-2012, spending on preventive care -- primary healthcare, immunisation, nutrition and public health awareness -- was only 13 percent of the total healthcare expenditure in 2012.

On the other hand, expenditure on medicines and curative purposes accounts for 67 percent.

Prof AK Azad Khan, president of the Diabetic Association of Bangladesh, said lifestyle diseases were emerging as an epidemic, but authorities did not seem to be proactive in taking appropriate policies on prevention. "For example, we sent a proposal to the

government on a national policy on prevention of diabetes five years back, but nothing has happened," he told The Daily Star last week.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh High Commissioner to Malaysia Shahidul Islam said they were planning exchange of learning visits by the health ministers of Bangladesh and Malaysia.

"We can share our experience on medical science and exchange research personnel for the benefit of both the countries," he told a group of journalists in Kuala Lumpur last month.

## Charges against 11 'militants' accepted at court

alleged members of banned Islamist outfits --Ansarullah Bangla Team and Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB), according to the charge sheet.

After scrutinising the case diary and other relevant documents, Judge SM Kuddus Zaman of the District and Sessions Judge's Court passed the

order yesterday. The court also fixed January 18 for a hearing on charge framing in the case against the accused. On December 1 last year, Dipak Chandra

Saha, officer-in-charge (investigation) of Ashulia Police Station, submitted two charge sheets -- one for the killings and robbery, and the other for possessing explosives -- to the Chief Judicial Magistrate's Court of Dhaka.

The case lodged for possessing explosives is pending with another Dhaka court.

In broad daylight on April 21 that year, robbers shot eight people dead and injured several others in Bangladesh Commerce Bank Ltd in Ashulia, on the outskirts of the capital, before leaving with

Tk 35 lakh.

A mob captured and beat one of the robbers to death.

During the investigation into the case, Dipak discovered the involvement of 13 people in the robbery and the killings.

One of the 13 was beaten to death by the mob, and the alleged mastermind behind the robbery, Abdullah Al Baki, was killed in a "shootout" with law enforcers in Gabtoli last November.
