Cops collect toll for use of road

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Vehicles using road in front of trade fair venue forced to pay 'parking toll'; EPB awarded job to police without tender

Police are forcibly and illegally taking money in the name of "parking tolls" from any car using the road in front of the Dhaka International Trade Fair (DITF) in Agargaon.

The road that connects Rokeya Sarani with Mirpur Road -- on which several important establishments like public schools and hospitals, including Suhrawardy Medical College Hospital, are located -has also been made off-limits to regular traffic.

Exceptions are made only for those working and living in Agargaon and Sher-e-Bangla Nagar areas.



This particular stretch of the road becomes especially important for vehicles on Rokeya Sarani to cut through to Mirpur Road when Crescent Road remains closed for security of the prime minister's residence, Gono Bhaban.

Though the job of parking fee collection there is usually leased out to private firms, the Export Promotion Bureau (EPB), the main organiser of the month-long yearly fair, this year has given the job to police, that too without tender.

Several thousand vehicles use the road regularly, according to a former in-charge of a police box there. SEE PAGE 2 COL 4

For 91 days from January 5 to April 5 last year, there was hardly a single day when innocent people were not burnt to death or

At least 95 people were killed and about 1,500 injured. Most of them were ordinary citizens, living from hand to mouth. Another 45 got

killed in "shootouts" with law enforcement agencies. About half of them were allegedly involved in arson attacks.

The economic loss from the blockade and shutdown was enormous.

Overall, the salaries and allowances for the civil servants have nearly doubled. They are also getting Bengali New Year bonus from the current fiscal year.

Instead of gratitude the government is hearing unhappy outbursts from the very people it is supposed to please. The causes are the exclusion of time scale and the selection grade as well as difference in pay among different cadres.

Amid movements and confusions among different government service employees, a puzzled finance minister commented that the ongoing movement is because of a lack of correct information.

Elimination of time scale, selection grade a right decision, Farashuddin, head of Pay Commission, tells Star

Mohammed Farashuddin firmly believes it was wise to drop the time scale and selection grade from the Eighth National Pay Scale.

The head of the Pay and Services Commission, however, said that more incentives could be given to civil servants.

"I strongly stand by the commission's recommendations on the selection grade and time scale. The alternative [annual increment] to those has been approved by the government. It should be continued, perhaps with more incentives," he told The Daily Star in an interview on Thursday.

He said the time scale and selection grade were imperfect, incomplete and riddled with irregularities.

Many public servants, who took the facilities, didn't get

It has always been her dream to live in a pukka house, which she has got now. It's a small, tinroofed house in her small homestead. But she cannot live in it as it came at a high price -- her son Matin Biswas's life.

"All our life we longed for a house and we have it now. But my Moni [Matin] is no more to live in it," she said, crying incessantly.

Sakiran Begum lives in their old, decrepit hut, made of bamboo fence and corrugated iron sheets. The tiny hut says it all about her family's poverty. A cot, a mosquito net, a small table, and some utensils are all she has in the hut, which was partitioned by a bamboo fence. In one pat of it, she keeps her goats.

"I feel bad to live in that house. I can't live in there," she said, taking a pause before beginning SEE PAGE 2 COL 2


