

#### "Money Monster" reunites Clooney-Roberts

George Clooney becomes a hostage on network TV in the first trailer for TriStar Pictures' "Money Monster". Clooney is playing a glib investment guru with the TV show "Money Monster" who has to deal with a gun-toting investor played by Jack O'Connell after the investor takes a bath on a tech stock.

"Is this a union thing?" Clooney asks when he spots O'Connell's weapon.

Julia Roberts stars as the producer, who tells the crew

## Four-day memorial festival on Selim Al Deen begins

Selim Al Deen, a towering figure of Bangla theatre in post-Rabindranath era, breathed his last on this day in 2008. The playwright, fondly called Natyacharya, is credited as ushering in a new era in our theatre scene trough his plays and extensive research in the field.

Marking the death anniversary of Natyacharya, Dhaka Theatre is holding a four-day programme at Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy. The event, Selim Al Deen Memorial Festival, is supported by the Shilapakala Academy and Bangladesh Graam Theatre.

Cultural Affairs Minister Asaduzzaman Noor inaugurated the event at the Experimental Theatre Hall of BSA on January 12 evening. Following the inauguration ceremony, Bunon Theatre from Savar staged their play "Nakshi Kanthar Maath". Written by Poet Jasimuddin, the play has been directed by Anan Zaman.

On January 13, two plays were staged at the festival. Jalalpur Theatre from Jamalpur staged "Shomoy Er Shonglap", and Drama and Dramatics Department of Jahangirnagar University staged "Kobi" at the Experimental Theatre Hall.

The four-day event features staging of plays by troupes from outside Dhaka, an open seminar, and placing wreaths at the grave of the playwright at JU campus on January 14. The featured plays are "Nakshi Kanthar Maath", "Shomoy Er Shonglap", "Kobi", "Birangana Bimolara", "Usha Utshab", "Krishti" and Kongkal O Sharey Tin Haat".

Selim Al-Deen was born on August 18, 1949 in Sonagazi Upazila of Feni. He was attracted to Bangla literature at a young age, and wrote a few poems. But later, with encouragement from Munier Chowdhury, he focused on theatre.

## Dhaka International Film Fest opens today

The 14th edition of the Dhaka International Film Festival opens today in the capital, with the theme "Better Film, Better Audience, Better Society". Organised by Rainbow Film Society, the weeklong festival

will screen 184 films from 60 countries across four venues: National Museum Auditorium, Shawkat Osman Memorial Auditorium of the Sufia Kamal Public Library, Alliance Française de Dhaka Auditorium and EMK Center Auditorium.

Information Minister Hasanul Haq Inu will inaugurate the festival at the National Museum Auditorium, alongside prolific Syrian director Mohammad Malas and Norwegian filmmaker Anja Breien. The festival will open with Rubaiyar Hossain's film "Under Construction".

Festival Director Ahmed Mujtaba Jamal also informed

that the festival will be divided into several sections: the Australasia competitive section, retrospective section, cinema of the world section, tributes, children's films, spiritual films, women's films and independent films. Around 88 foreign guests are expected to attend the festival, 60 of whom are already in town, he added.

#### Bowie's recordings set to surge into **UK Charts**

television channels.

Many of David Bowie's classic recordings are expected to sweep into this week's U.K. charts as fans of the music legend mourn his

recent death. Bowie's latest and final studio album "Blackstar" remains on track for the No. 1 position on the next Official UK Albums Chart. It's one of 14 Bowie albums impacting the Top 100, according to the OCC, ahead of the publication this Friday of the latest charts.

"Blackstar", which arrived just two days prior to Bowie's death, is out in front with 90,000 combined sales, according to a sales flash report. The new set is also heading for what would be Bowie's first ever No. 1 on the Billboard 200.



Bowie logged nine UK No. 1 albums in his lifetime, including his previous set, "The Next Day", which led the list on its debut in March 2013 with 94,000 sales.

Meanwhile, the UK singles chart should also have a strong Bowie feel to it with nine titles impacting, led by 1977's "Heroes" at 25, just a solitary position below its peak position of No. 24. Across his career, Bowie landed atop the Official Singles Chart on five occasions.

Organisers of next month's Brit Awards have vowed to pay a "fitting tribute" to "honor his extraordinary life and work" of the homegrown icon.

Bowie died on January 10 after an 18-month battle with cancer.
