Khaleda again skips trial

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia yesterday again skipped trial proceedings in Zia Charitable Trust corruption case due to her physical illness

Meantime, advocate Abdur Rezak Khan started cross-examining Harunur Rashid, deputy director of the Anti-Corruption Commission and also the investigation officer of the case.

The lawyer asked the witness questions on different matters about the case for over three hours.

Judge Abu Ahmed Jomadar of the Special Judge's Court-3 of Dhaka recorded statement of the witness and, later, fixed January 21 for the hearing. On that day, Khaleda's lawyer will crossexamine the witness.

Earlier on January 7, the IO gave his deposition before the same court. On that day, Khaleda was absent due to her personal affairs. The other accused are

Harris Chowdhury; Ziaul Islam Munna, former assistant private secretary of Harris Chowdhury; and Monirul Islam Khan, who was APS of former Dhaka city mayor Sadeque Hossain Khoka. Of them, Khaleda, Munna

and Monirul are on bail while Harris is on the run. She could not appear before the court due to illness, said Sanaullah Mia, one of her counsels.

The ACC on August 8, 2011 filed the case, accusing the four of abusing power to raise fund in the name of Zia Charitable Trust. Harun pressed charge against Khaleda and three others on January 16, 2012.

Cotton mill fined for assaulting workers

A mobile court yesterday fined the authorities of a cotton mill Tk 15,000 on the charge of assaulting its workers, hurling expletives and misbehaving with them in Gazipur.

Workers of Aman Cotton Mills Ltd of Aman Group in Shreepur said they had been applying for resignation for 15 days over "low salaries".

The authorities, however, forced them to work instead of accepting their resignation, leading the workers to abstain from work yesterday. At one stage, some people loyal to the mill Director Shafiullah attacked the protesters with sticks, injuring at least 10 workers. Of them, Chandni, 18, and

Kantna, 18, took treatment at a local hospital. The workers made a complaint to the upazila nirbahi office and the mobile court which summoned Shafiullah and fined him under the labour act, said Executive

Magistrate of the court Masum Reza. Shah Kamal, senior administrative manager of Amantex Ltd of Aman Group, said the workers were injured while



He sought the government's cooperation to arrange funds to introduce an alternative transport service, apart from the trains, for students.
