AL Nominations in UP Polls

MPs to have no role this time

The ruling Awami League has decided to drop its lawmakers from the selection boards tasked with picking candidates for the forthcoming union parishad (UP) polls.

A meeting at the Gono Bhaban, with party president Sheikh Hasina in the chair, took the decision yesterday considering that some AL MPs had meddled in party's mayoral aspirants' selection in the just concluded municipality elections.

"We have brought a little change in the selection board for the union parishad polls. No local lawmaker will be there this time," AL Joint General Secretary Mahbubul Alam Hanif told reporters after the meeting of party's selection board for local government polls.

Party's lone chairman candidate for a UP would first be selected by a committee comprising presidents and general secretaries of the AL committees in the respective district, upazila and UP, said meeting sources. Later, the grassroots units would send the names to the

nod. In case the units fail to select any one, the central body itself will decide, added the sources. Responding to a query, Hanif said this time there would be

no scope for anyone to violate the party decision. All will have to work for the party-nominated candidates, he warned. Another meeting participant, wishing not to be named,

said, "During the recent municipality polls, the party had a bitter experience because of the role of some MPs. That's why we have decided to keep the lawmakers out of the selection process."

Drive goes on to stop misuse of parking lot

Rajuk on the second day of a fortnight-long eviction drive yesterday recovered basement parking spaces of a dozen buildings and dismantled scores of access ramps built occupying footpaths and roads in Dhanmondi, Uttara, and Gulshan in the capital.

A mobile court fined super store Swapno on Green Road in Dhanmondi Tk 5 lakh for occupying basement car parking space for commercial use, said Rajuk Executive Magistrate Nasir Uddin, who led the drive in Dhanmondi.

It also sealed off Rasana Bilash restaurant for occupying footpath, he added.

Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei yesterday welcomed the lifting of international sanctions against Iran, but warned that Tehran should remain wary of its old enemy the United States.

State television reported that Khamenei wrote to President Hassan Rouhani to congratulate him on implementing the nuclear deal, which resulted in US, European Union and United Nations sanctions being lifted over the weekend.

In his first comments since the deal took effect, Iran's highest authority made clear that Washington should still be treated with suspicion. He made no mention of a surprise prisoner exchange that also took place this weekend.

"I reiterate the need to be vigilant about the deceit and treachery of arrogant countries, especially the United States, in this (nuclear) issue and other issues," Khamenei said.

"Be careful that the other side fully meets its commitments. The comments made by some American politicians in last two, three days are suspicious," he added.

Meanwhile, Americans freed by Iran over the weekend reunited with their families Monday at a US military base in Germany, but relatives of another hostage expressed serious disappointment he had not been released.

'Plant backpack' to fight air pollution

Five Dutch students have hit on a unique idea to replace face masks used against air pollution, and are developing a "plant backpack" to give wearers instant fresh air.

"The bag allows fine particles to be filtered out and cleans the air," said Marnix de Kroon, the leader of the team.

"The Plant Bag" is fitted with a filter which takes in the outside air and sifts it through the roots of a

Writing judgment after retirement unconstitutional

Says chief justice

Some judges make unusual delays to write verdicts while others continue to write it even long after their retirement, which goes against the law and the constitution, Chief Justice Surendra Kumar Sinha said yesterday. He made the comment in a message on the occasion of

the first anniversary of his taking office as the 21st chief justice of the country. Supreme Court judges take oath of upholding laws and

the constitution. But after retirement, a judge is not under oath anymore and is a common citizen then, the CJ noted. Court documents are public documents. A judge after his

retirement loses the rights to keep court documents in his possession, and prepare, review or sign verdicts, he said in the message available on the SC website.

He added he hoped judges would refrain from doing | ment came at a time when such unlawful activities, showing some respect for the law. Sinha became chief justice on January 17 last year.

The Appellate Division of the SC disposed of 9,356 cases till November 30 since his appointment, he said.


Refusal to allow search led to Rabbi incident: IG

Pak suicide bombing kills 10

A suicide bomber blew himself up close to a police checkpoint in northwestern Pakistan yesterday, killing at least 10 people and wounding more than 20, officials said.
